### LOCAL NEWS

Mr. J. L. Kendall, who is here from Pittsburg, this morning placed with the Aills-Chalmers Co., of Milwaukee, Wis., an order for a 500-horsepower engine to be placed in the Kendall Bros. water and light plant at Winchester. The boiler capacity there will also be increased to meet the requirements of this big engine, which will be ready at all times to furnish ample power to the pumps and dynamos, regardless of the stage of water in the river. Flooding of the water wheels by occasional high water in the winter season will not hereafter affect the water and light service as the necessary power will be available at all times in this big engine. It is to be shipped here and put in place at an early date.

Shortage of housekeeping apartment and houses for rent has caused Roseburg to lose three prospective residents, at least. Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Phillips and child arrived here this week from St. Louis, Mo. They liked Roseburg better than any place they had visited and they decided to locate here. been appointed Clerk in the General Land Office from the 16th Pennsylvania district, that he went from that position to Senator Bourne's office at the Capitol and then was appointed special agent of the General Land Office.

Kester first went to Oregon on June 29, 1909, and remained as special agent until furloughed April 20 last. Records of the land office show him still a resident of Pennsylvania.

Representative Ellis laid these facts before the President and then filed a written protest against the appointment of the Pennsylvania citizen to the Federal office in Oregon.

The recommendation of Guild was not as obnoxious to Ellis as that of Kester, although Ellis told President Taft there was plenty of good and qualified men living in the new land district to fill both offices, and he deemed it unwise to appoint a man from the extreme western part of the state to fill an office in the extreme east. His protest was made solely in the interest of residents of the Vale land district, he said.

**Hughes Demands Primary Law.**  
ALBANY, N. Y., June 21.—The state legislature in special session today received a message from Gov. Hughes, recommending the passage of a direct primary law. He said it was demanded by a people dissatisfied with the present system of choosing candidates.

### Crops in Bad Way.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 21.—A serious drought is threatening the crops of Northwestern Minnesota, North Dakota and Eastern Montana with destruction. There has been about half as much rainfall as usual, and the farmers are apprehensive. Unless the hot winds and the high temperatures cease, there will be a half crop failure. The temperature yesterday was 110.
