BEGINS WORK ON CANAL AROUND CELLIA FALLS.

THE DALLES, Or., July 20.—The Government began work on the construction of a canal around Cellia Falls, in the Columbia River, today. The canal when completed will open the Columbia River for steamer traffic in the interior.

The work will be under the supervision of Government engineers. The canal will be approximately 8 1/2 miles in length. It probably will not be completed before the expiration of four years.

About 500 laborers will be employed by the Government, but only a small percentage of that number was put to work today. The structures to house them have not yet been completed.

PORTLAND, Or., July 20.—James J. Hill will be given a great welcome when he comes to Portland to participate in the Harvest Festival early next September. The announcement just made that he will accept the invitation of Portland rather than speak at St. Paul at that time before the Conservation Congress has made a great hit locally and there is a corresponding degree of enthusiasm in helping formulate a programme of welcome that will express to some extent at least, the pleasure this city will feel in entertaining him.

A notable banquet for Mr. Hill is already announced. Grateful Oregonians are determined to show the Sage of St. Paul that they appreciate his work so far in the development of this state, his great railroads he has built here and is now pushing further into new territory and his manifested spirit of helpfulness to Oregon.

The Portland Commercial Club will take up the banquet feature immediately and complete the plans already mapped out. It is proposed to limit the attendance at this banquet to Mr. Hill himself and the livestock breeders who exhibit at the Harvest Festival, thus bringing him into close touch with this great growing industry of the Pacific Northwest. Julius Meier, chairman of the Livestock Association committee, and C. C. Chapman, manager of the promotion committee of the Commercial Club, are getting busy on the banquet and other features of entertainment that are not yet made public.

It is hoped to make the demonstration for Mr. Hill the warmest greeting he has ever received from territory tributary to his lines. It is known that he has a warm spot in his heart for Portland and it is planned to make these relations still closer on his coming visit.

FRANCHISES, RIGHTS OF WAY AND SOME MONEY.

That's All Eastern Capitalists Need in Order to Supply Power to Umpqua Valley.

MYRTLE CREEK, July 20.—A report made by Engineer Jerome L. Blaisdell, representing some Eastern capitalists, indicate the Umpqua Valley is soon to have electricity for light, heat and power. The gist of Mr. Blaisdell's report is as follows: It has been proposed to develop some parts of the Umpqua Valley, where at least 20,000 horsepower is available during low water, and transmit it over the entire valley. Power will be supplied to all towns, mines, mills and farmers who wish it. The service will be continuous. This will give the mines power for hoists, stamps, etc., and will develop many mines that are lying idle because of the lack of cheaper power. The power can be used in the lumber camps for cutting trees.

Farmers will be able to use this power. Separators can be run by a small motor. A simple pumping system can be installed and the water pumped for irrigation, besides using it for the house and for fire protection. Lights in the barns and out-houses will be of great service. The power plant and system will be built immediately if encouragement is shown. All asked is assistance in the form of franchises, right of way for the transmission line and subscriptions to the bond issue.

PEACE FOLLOWS DEATH OF PRESIDENT VANCLAVE.

Buck Stove and Range Company Tells Gompers it Will Employ Only Union Men Hereafter.

CINCINNATI, July 20.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, announced tonight that the Buck Stove and Range Company, of St. Louis, had agreed to abandon its open shop policy and hereafter to employ only union men.

J. W. Vanclave, head of the Buck Company, and former president of the National Association of Manufacturers, died July 15 last, after six years of incessant warfare against the Federation of Labor. His friends attributed his death after six months' illness to the strain of the fight he had waged since 1905 with union labor, which he had once described as the "muscle trust."

In the course of that fight he had

obtained an injunction from the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia forbidding the Federation to boycott his company or to print its name on the "unfair list" in the "Federationist," the organ of the Gompers organization. For violation of that injunction Judge Wright imposed a sentence of one year's imprisonment upon Gompers, one of six months on Secretary Morrison and one of nine months on John Mitchell.

The settlement of the differences between the company and the Federation will not affect the case pending in the Supreme Court and that tribunal next winter is expected to pass on the question of whether the courts below violated freedom of speech or whether labor men offended against law and order.

113,000,000 HEATHEN.

The millions still unreached by the Gospel are these: Asia, 42,000,000; Africa, 70,000,000; Arabia, 3,000,000; Syria, 550,000; the Sinalitic peninsula, 50,000; eastern Samatra and adjacent islands, 3,250,000; Madura, Ball and Lombok islands, 2,000,000; Malay peninsula, 1,000,000; total, 113,000,000. In all, 788 Protestant missionary societies are at work in foreign fields. The annual combined contributions are \$25,350,000. There are 5,522 ordained missionaries, 982 physicians, 2503 men lay missionaries, 5406 married women, 4988 unmarried women, or a total of 19,280 foreign missionaries. There are 5045 ordained natives and 92,918 unordained teachers, preachers, Bible women, etc. The total living baptized Christians are 3,006,373; adherents, 5,281,871. The native gifts aggregate \$2,800,000.—Ex.
