ECLIPSE AS SEEN IN MID-SEA DESCRIBED.

LONDON, July 19.—The Rev. Al-gerson C. E. Thord, of Hougham Rectory, Grantham, sends to the Daily Mail a vivid description of the recent total eclipse of the sun as seen from the R. M. S. Corinthic when at sea 600 miles north of Hobart, Tasmania.

"The eclipse began at 1:30 and lasted until 4. At 2:45 it was total, and the sun went out entirely. A bright corona shone round its disc. Totality lasted several minutes.

"The sight was weird in the extreme. The darkness was ominous, and the temperature went down suddenly from a mild 65 to 40. The clouds on the horizon turned opal, dove-gray, and black as the last rim of the sun was covered up, and when the light finally went out the effect was like the sudden switching off of an electric lamp. The sun itself was a black ball with a pale but distinct crown of brilliance burning arrow-wise unevenly on every side. Round the corona was a halo like the blurred radiance that surrounds a misty moon.

"The sea looked black like ink and the sky seemed to disappear, because it was neither measurable with stars nor realizable with clouds. It became, in fact, negligible, and the only proof that day and night had not come to an end was the extraordinary phenomenon of a black ball fringed with fire—a fire that gave little light to the earth, but seemed sputtering toward the stars in indignation at an insult offered by the moon."

STARTS FOR SOUTH POLE.

Capt. Scott Expects to Reach World's Axis in December, 1911.

LONDON, July 19.—Captain Robert F. Scott, commander of the British Antarctic expedition, left today for New Zealand, where he will join the others of his party on board the exploring steamer Terra Nova. Captain Scott plans to arrive at the South Pole in December, 1911.

SEASON'S WHEAT CROP.

PORTLAND, Or., July 20.—According to a Portland authority who has made an extended trip through the grain growing districts of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, the Pacific Northwest will harvest a crop of about 42,000,000 bushels of wheat, as compared with 52,500,000 bushels last year. Considering the weather conditions the crop has had to contend with, this showing is considered excellent. The past winter was very severe and did great damage, particularly in the state of Washington.

Oregon is credited with a crop this season of 15,000,000 bushels, or 2,000,000 bushels more than last season. The gain is due to the showing made by the light lands and the increased acreage in Central Oregon, where railroad construction has stimulated production.

Idaho also shows a gain over last year with an estimated yield this season of 9,000,000 bushels as compared with 8,343,000 bushels for last year.

The elements were unkind to Washington. In the Palouse and Big Bend districts the cold winter inflicted serious damage to fall wheat and greatly cut down the yield. Washington growers are harvesting a crop calculated at 18,000,000 bushels, compared with 30,000,000 bushels a year ago.

Better rainfall south of the Snake River is the secret of Oregon's good showing. A peculiarity of the present season is that the lands usually classed as the best producers are making the poorest showing, while the light lands, due to a good rainfall, are coming along with 15 bushels an acre. Because of heavy rains the heavy lands formed a crust on top that was hard to break through, and the fall sown grain did not make its usual showing.

Central Oregon, the new district now being opened by railroads, will have 1,000,000 bushels more at harvest than last year. This is chiefly because of raw land being broken up during the past year, as well as the good showing of the light lands.

ROOSEVELT'S EDITORIAL BARS OUTLOOK FROM SALE.

HUTCHINSON, Kan., July 13.—The latest issue of the Outlook Magazine has been barred from sale in this city because of an editorial article written by Theodore Roosevelt. Recently an order was passed by the city council prohibiting prize fight pictures, newspapers containing stories of prizefights, and magazines, books or pamphlets containing articles or references to pugilistic combats. Because of the editorial comment in the Outlook on the Reno prize fight, the magazine came in conflict with the ordinance and the publication was barred from sale.
