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DOUGLAS COUNTY MAKES A MAGNIFICENT EXHIBIT.

Not only did its wonderful variety of products attract market attention, but the riotous abundance that filled the whole south end of the pavilion was also a great feature—50 boxes of apples; and a wonderful exhibit of the finest pears on earth.

Salem Journal: The state fair is over, insofar as existence goes, but the effects of the displays and exhibitions have yet hardly begun. In the county exhibits there was keen rivalry, and the result was at least half a dozen showings of what the counties could do in the shape of agriculture and horticulture, that would in themselves have made a creditable state exhibit for any average Eastern state fair. To make comparisons between them would be a difficult task, for where all is apparently perfect, there is nothing left to criticize. The writer did not visit the fair until the last day and such time as he spent there was in the pavilion, where a whole week might have been spent profitably. Although Benton county was awarded the first premium, the justness of which is not questioned, the Douglas county exhibit somehow appealed most strongly to the writer, partly perhaps from its magnitude. It occupied the whole south end of the pavilion and was a display of which Douglas county may well feel proud for it attracted much attention, not only for the magnificent quality of the products shown but for their abundance. In apples alone there were 80 boxes, some 26 varieties. And all perfect as to shape and color; and they were as pleasing to the palate as to the eye, for we had 2 1/2 bushels of sampling them. Besides Yellow Newtown, Spitz and one other standard varieties, was a very attractive reddish-purple apple, about medium size, and known as the "Pride of Douglas." I have one of it laid away ripening and some day I shall take the pride out of Douglas, and "there won't be any core," for it looks and smells good. There was a wagon load of man-gel wuzzels and potatoes, the latter perfect in shape and almost eyeless enough for a police officer or a "blind pig." Everything else was on the same scale of abundance. Dozens of big watermelons, weighing from 30 to 50 pounds—table beets that weighed 25 pounds; "punks" as big as Teddy Roosevelt or at least as heavy, squashes, sweet potatoes, sugar beets, citrons piled in riotous confusion in a great pyramid. Then in another place a dozen great glass vases, supported

ONE FORM OF "WEALTH" And the Commonwealth.—"Home Rule" Up to Date—Facts for Voters.

A great deal is said and written about the increase of wealth, the centralization of wealth, and the power of the trust and the corporation. A fact that is often overlooked, however, is that the beer and whiskey business is now very largely in the hands of such corporations, and owing to close organization and the great wealth controlled, these corporations and trusts are as great a menace to the country as any other when they are considered merely as ordinary selfish moneyed institutions.

The exhibit was in charge of the right kind of men, too—men of pleasant address and a smiling way about them that made them fit into and rival and be a part of the Douglas county exhibit. Mr. R. E. Smith was in charge, assisted by A. L. Kitchen, and there was certainly a fine lot of the latter gentleman's kind of vegetables. One of them remarked that the really best exhibit of Douglas county was not on exhibition—that was the real "Peaches," the girls—but I am not going to give either of them away as it gives each a chance to square himself at home. An enthusiastic Douglas county man remarked to some one, a lady who spoke of the variety of products, "Yes, yes, yes, we can raise anything in Douglas county from hell to the American flag, and we can raise 'em higher."

At the present time in the state of Oregon the liquor business is unquestionably under the guise of the "Hotel-Keoper's Association" and the so-called "Home Rule Association" and alleged "Personal Liberty Leagues" which are advocating measures which will promote the interests of the business and yet no distiller, brewer, wholesaler liquor dealer or saloon-keeper will come out openly before the public, it appears, and champion his cause. At any rate, we read nothing whatever in the Oregon press in favor of the liquor business; we do read a great deal of boasting of all sorts of fraudulent devices and hush-hugs that are gotten up to mask the business and deceive the voter.

The "Greater Oregon Home Rule Association" gives great prominence to the statement that brewers, distillers and saloon-keepers can not be members of its organization. They do not anywhere say that such people will not be permitted to contribute the sinews of war. One does not need to be a prophet or the son of a prophet to know that the six thousand dollars a year paid by this institution to Bro. McAllister, and the other thousands upon thousands of dollars that are expended in various forms of advertising, comes from the coffers of the liquor traffic and from nowhere else. No one believes seriously that the eminent business men of the city of Portland who are allowing their names to be bandied about for the benefit of the liquor traffic in Oregon under the name of the "Greater Oregon Home Rule Association" expect to pay the bill. They will do very well for staking horses. But it must be rather hard for these self-sacrificing booze vendors to read in print repeatedly that they are not worthy to become members of this high-minded organization.

The state at large pays the bill for keeping up the Circuit and Supreme Courts, the district attorney's offices, the penitentiary, the insane asylum, but the "Greater Oregon Home Rule Association" proposes that the exclusive right to make

business for these courts and district attorneys, and to make inmates for these institutions shall be voted solely and exclusively in the incorporated towns of the state. The liquor dealer is now merely skulking in the background without being regarded as worthy to be a member of the "Greater Oregon Home Rule Association," but he hopes that his day is coming. He sits at the second table and pays the bills now. When the Constitution of the state shall have been amended so as to give incorporated towns the exclusive right to deal with the liquor question, the liquor dealer knows that it will be the turn of the farmer and the taxpayer in the unincorporated town to sit at the second table and pay the bills.

Those who have lived in Oregon for many years know that the growth of civic pride has been very slow, and progressive movements that have involved moral issues have been fought every step of the way. There is scarcely a town in Oregon where an issue has been drawn between law and order and morality and decency on one side and lawlessness and disorder, and booze and gambling and prostitution on the other, but what the decent citizen has had to see his ballot time and again offset by the ballot of the "old soak," the "tin horn gambler," or the hobo or the transient voter imported into a town for the purpose. And the expense of the importation has generally been met by the saloon-keeper or those closely identified with their business. It was not until the advent of the local option law that the power of the people of the country, joined with the better elements of the towns to get and keep the upper hand of the other elements, was realized. Now that it has been demonstrated that the people have this great power, we are in Oregon in the presence of a desperate movement to overcome and destroy the local option law by a proposed amendment to the state Constitution which will give to every incorporated town the exclusive right to deal with the liquor business as it sees fit. If this amendment should be adopted the good people of the towns will find themselves at the mercy of a traffic which has violated every law

ever put on the statute books for its regulation and which attracts to itself every form of vice and evil known to men. Rosy pictures are painted of what will be done under the License Law when saloons are to be "regulated." But there is not a man or woman of mature years in Oregon who does not know that when we had the License Law everywhere and the law imposed a severe penalty upon the liquor dealer who would sell to minors or to habitual drunkards, or keep his place of business open on Sunday, or permit gambling, or allow women to frequent his place; he violated every one of these provisions and impudently gave his time and his money to defeat any officer who undertook to enforce the law. This history of our towns in Oregon shows that under the License System the saloon-keeper has fought as desperately to prevent the enforcement of the reasonable regulations of the License Law as he is now fighting to undermine the law which is putting him out of business.

The wall of the liquor men that "prohibition does not prohibit" is nothing more or less than the threat that they will not obey the law. No one need be surprised at this. They never have obeyed the law and never seriously intend to obey any law. It is up to the people to see that they are COMPELLED to do what they will never do of their own free will. It is true that there are many "blind pigs" and that there is much liquor sold contrary to law, but this has always been the case. It has openly been charged and not denied that while there are five hundred saloons in the City of Portland, there are also four hundred "blind pigs," and any man who doubts that liquor is sold contrary to law in the city of Portland has only to read carefully the Portland papers. Just the other day, Mayor Simon called the Chief of Police on the "carpet" and admonished him that he would have to better the enforcement of the law and that the illegal selling of liquor must stop. A conspicuous case of a prosecution for selling liquor without a license in the city of Portland was that of the "Quelle," a prominent and fashionable resort holding itself out as a place where food and drink are furnished, but as has been developed by the prosecution in question, a place where a great deal more drink than food has been dispensed.

One saloon row in Grant county cost the taxpayers in that county \$7,500.00, and the farmers have to pay their share of the expense that never would have occurred had there been no saloons. Yet the "Greater Oregon Home Rule Association" wants to prohibit the farmer from having any vote as to whether there shall be saloons in his home county or not.
