NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Charles R. Heike, former secretary and treasurer of the American Sugar Refining Company, who has been called the "man higher up" in the sugar trust, was sentenced today by Judge Martin in the United States Circuit Court to serve eight months in the New York penitentiary on Blackwell's Island, and pay a fine of \$5000 on conviction of conspiring to defraud the United States Government by the underweighing of sugar.

Judge Martin granted a stay of execution of the sentence pending an appeal to the United States Court of appeals. Heike's sentence is the culminating point in the Federal Government's prosecution of the American Sugar Refining Company's officials and employees, growing out of the extended underweighing frauds on the Williamsburg docks of the trust.

Oliver Spitzer, superintendent of the Williamsburg dock of the American Sugar Refining Company, was convicted in connection with the frauds. After some months in Federal prison he turned Government witness, and through his testimony, Heike, secretary of the company, was convicted.

It was shown at the trial that the Government had been defrauded of large sums. The company refunded \$2,000,000 in reparation.

Gierbracht, a checker, was sentenced to two years in the Atlanta penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$5000, but was allowed a stay pending an appeal.

WHAT DID THE CLAIM AGENT DO?

MAIL BOXES MUST BE INSTALLED AT HOME.

Postoffice Department Requests All Patrons to Establish Conventions for Carriers.

If you want your mail delivered you had better provide a receptacle or letter slot where it may be slipped in by the mail man. If you don't the postoffice department may order the carrier to discontinue delivery of your mail. The following self-explanatory circular has been issued:

"By direction of the postoffice department the attention of patrons of this office is invited to the advantages of providing facilities for the receipt of their mail by erecting conveniently accessible boxes or cutting suitable slots in their doors. Such action would enable the postman to give a prompter and better delivery service with the means at his disposal, since the carriers can cover much more territory in less time than where they wait for people to answer to their ring. Private receptacles for mail are also a great convenience to the household, obviating the necessity of responding to the carrier's call at inconvenient moments and permitting the safe delivery of mail in the absence of members of the household. They also prevent the occasional necessity of a carrier's proceeding on his route without delivering mail because of failure to answer his ring within a reasonable time, and enable him to make deliveries to patrons living on or near the end of the route at an earlier hour."

"It has been shown by actual experience that the benefits derived by patrons of city delivery from the use of such receptacles far outweigh the expense involved. As this office is interested in furnishing the best possible service at the least expense, your compliance with the foregoing suggestions will be much appreciated."

COLONIST RATES WILL PREVAIL DURING FALL.

The flow of immigration into the Northwest has received a new impetus this month through the inauguration by leading railroads of colonist rates from Eastern points to the Northwest. These rates have formerly been confined to a few months in the spring, when the westward travel of new settlers has always been heavy. People have the moving spirit in the spring season, and for that reason the special rates have always been advertised at that season. Now the railroads have decided that when settlers will come at least in the fall, when business is at its best. If they settle in cities they have the advantage of starting in when the return of activity comes after the summer lull. If they take up land or buy farms, they have the winter to prepare for the spring sowing, to erect necessary buildings, fences, etc. Reports of the first few days of the autumn colonist rates on the Northern Pacific indicate that the plan will be a success, and other roads will probably handle a good business. A uniform west-bound rate of \$25 from St. Paul and Missouri River points, \$35 from Chicago and \$32 from St. Louis has been made to attract newcomers.
