OBITUARY OF THE LATE

JOSEPH C. QUANT

Joseph Clarke Quant was born near Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 16, 1851, of German descent. At the age of 4 years the family moved to Illinois, thence to Michigan, residing near the now flourishing city of Clarksville, which was named by himself and a friend named Clarke Howard. On May 27, 1884, he was married to Miss Ella Cook. To this union were born three children, Seymour C. and Blanche L. being born in Michigan, and Ora, the youngest child, was born near Oakland, Oregon. In the spring of 1897 he moved to near Roseburg, living on the North Umpqua river near the old Trask mill. The following fall he moved to English settlement, eight miles east of Oakland, in which vicinity he lived till the fall of 1904, when he left the farm and moved to Oakland. Since that time he has been engaged in the meat market business, first under the firm name of McCulloch & Quant, and later as Quant & Son.

The day of his tragic death he and his only son, S. C. Quant, had been at work as usual, and at about 2:20 p. m. they parted near the shop, the son going to the depot to board the 2:30 train for Eugene, while Mr. Quant went to the market. After a short conversation with the meat cutter, J. H. Neas, he said he would go to the rear and clean his gun. This was the last seen of him until about five minutes later, when E. L. Settle on going to the back room to see him on business, found him dead, a bullet from the rifle he was cleaning having struck him just above the ear. As near as can be ascertained from the surroundings he was cleaning the

gun, as the oil can, cleaning rags and rod were near. It is supposed he unknowingly loaded the gun, it being automatic, and in some manner it was discharged with the fatal result. His death was such a sudden shock the family were prostrated.

Of Mr. Quant's family two brothers survive him, A. S. Quant of Pendleton, Oregon, and Wallace Quant of Lake Odessa, Michigan. His father, mother, one brother, J. H., and only sister, Jennie, preceding him to the great beyond. His widow, son and two daughters survive him and are all living in Oakland, Oregon.

A. S. Quant arrived Monday morning and on account of delayed trains was too late for the funeral. Mr. Quant was a member of the local lodge of W. O. W., and carried a policy of \$2000 for the benefit of his widow and children. He was a man of sterling worth, industrious, upright in all his dealings and honored by all. We think it can be said truthfully of him, "He died without a single enemy." The family have the entire sympathy of the community in this, their sad hour of grief. Interment took place at the Fair Oaks cemetery on his birthday anniversary, Sunday, October 16, 1910. The Rev. Mr. Davis, late of Nebraska, conducted the funeral services. The floral offerings were many and beautifully arranged and were appreciated to the fullest extent by the bereaved family. XXX.
