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ITEMS OF INTEREST FROM DRAIN AND VICINITY.

Drain, Or., Nov. 20, 1910.

Mrs. Ivan Haines arrived here Sunday afternoon from Salslaw on a visit with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Taylor, in the Hardscrabble neighborhood.

Floyd and Joe Craig have both returned home after spending the summer working in the logging camps on Scofield Creek, near Gardiner.

Moses Mack, now a resident of Salem, was here during the past week looking after business matters.

Mrs. Bounds, an aunt of Mrs. C. P. Counts, of this city, died at her home in Cottage Grove last Wednesday, and was buried at that place on Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. Counts attended the funeral. Mrs. Bounds was formerly the wife of H. W. Churchill, of Drain.

Eugene Joslyn has sold his mountain farm, four miles west of town, to Southern California people named Turner. This farm is locally known as the Hasard place. The Turner folks were former neighbors of the Pattersons, who now reside on the John Allen place, and they will again be neighbors.

"Aunt" Jackson has been seriously ill during the past week with pneumonia, but at this writing is somewhat improved and is believed to be on the road to recovery. Her daughter, Mrs. Maud Estes, and grand-daughter, Mrs. Bertha Fraley, both of Portland, have been at her bedside for several days past.

About 10,000 pounds of dressed turkeys were shipped from here the past week for the Thanksgiving trade.

Excellent work is being done in the Drain high school this winter. Prof. J. E. Bowers is at the helm and is ably assisted by Mrs. C. W. Devore and Miss Esmer Mixer. The grammar grades are also doing nicely.

A telephone line is being constructed for the benefit of four or five families in the neighborhood up Elk Creek, east of town. It is being built by the people of the neighborhood and will be connected with the central office in town.

The local grain mill will soon be ready for operation. The machinery now being installed was brought here from a mill at Ashland, in this state, where its use had ceased to be profitable. It is being installed in the building formerly used by E. A. Johnson, who is now successfully operating a mill at Albany.

We are informed that John Haney has a contract to plow and put into cultivation four hundred acres of the Sunnydale tract, recently purchased by the Churchill-Matthews Company, of Portland, an orchard syndicate doing an extensive business throughout the country. This company bought about two thousand acres in Sunnydale Valley last summer and it will be planted to orchards as fast as it can be put into good state of cultivation. The land in this valley has already proved to be splendid fruit land, for other apples, pears or prunes, and is bound to become one of the most profitable industries in the country.
