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SUPREME COURT LINE-UP.

Personnel of its Membership Believed to be Conservative.

It is conceded that the new Supreme Court, as rounded out by the appointments of President Taft, is conservative.

Members of the bar who have been endeavoring to classify the probable attitude of the United States Supreme Court under the new membership have concluded that it is more conservative than it was when the Standard Oil case and the American Tobacco case were heard last term. Leading lawyers of National reputation align the membership in about the following fashion:

Conservatives—Chief Justice White and Justices Day, Holmes, Lurton and Hughes.

Radicals—Justices Harlan and Van Devanter.

Uncertain—Justices Lamar and McKenna.

Some are inclined to put Hughes on the uncertain list because he is regarded as a politician, but Hughes' friends say he will decide according to the facts in the case, and that his mental makeup in matters pertaining to the law is extremely conservative.

A PERMANENT BUILDING.

Spokane Asked to Erect Structure For National Apple Show.

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 20.—E. F. Van Diesel, vice president of chairman of the Board of Trustees of the National Apple Show, Inc., has submitted a proposition to the trustees of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce to erect a permanent structure to house the annual competitive exposition in Spokane next year and make this city the headquarters for an apple show circuit. The wheel is to include St. Louis or Kansas City, Omaha, Minneapolis, Detroit, Philadelphia, Boston, New York, Atlanta, Ga., and several cities in the Middle Western and Southern states. The plans have not yet been worked out. Mr. Van Diesel said, but it is likely these will be in tangible shape early in January. Several cities on the Pacific Coast, including Portland, have asked to be visited in 1911, but it is not believed the exhibits will be sent into the Northwestern country. He added that the fourth annual show will be larger and more complete than any two others combined. The cost of the two shows in Spokane and Chicago this year was \$45,000.

GOVERNMENT DREDGE AT WORK IN COOS BAY.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Dec. 20.—Considerable harbor work is now being done on Coos Bay and much more is being planned. The Government dredge Oregon is now at work in front of North Bend, dredging the channel and making it deeper. The dredge is working on the \$50,000 appropriation made by Congress, and will dredge the bay at different places, making the channel wider and deeper. The work of dredging Coos River and removing the snags has been finished and the waterway is in much better condition than heretofore.

The Commissioners of the Port of Coos Bay are also planning some extensive work. They have made a tax levy of three mills on the dollar, and the proposition to float a bond issue of \$200,000 was carried at the last election. This money will be used in improvement work and in the purchase of a site for a public wharf to be built in the future when it may be needed. The Port Commission has two lawsuits to fight which are holding back the public work. One of these is in the Supreme Court, the other in the Federal Court. Both have been argued and decisions are expected soon.

Congress appropriated \$400,000 for building and maintaining a bar dredge for Coos Bay and an additional \$40,000 for harbor work. The Chamber of Commerce is now urging that further appropriation be made for the purpose of repairing the jetty at the bar in order that the shoaling of the sand can be stopped.

LANE COUNTY APPLES BRING GOOD PRICES.

EUGENE, Or., Dec. 20.—The secretary of the Eugene Fruit Growers' Association has made his report on the quantity of apples shipped from Eugene this fall. He reports that 51 carloads were sent East, bringing in a revenue of about \$25,000. The price received for the fruit was from \$1.25 to \$2.25 a box, which is as much as was received in any fruit district in the state with the exception of Hood River and Rogue River, which communities have sent thousands of dollars advertising and making a reputation. While the price of the apples did not come up to the expectation of some of the local growers, the results have been highly satisfactory as a whole.

The apple acreage is constantly increasing in the vicinity of Eugene, many landowners and farmers this year setting out thousands of trees each.
