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AMERICANS BUY HEAVILY OF DIAMONDS AND LACES.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—That the year 1910 must have been a reasonably prosperous one in the United States is indicated by the figures of importation of the class of articles usually termed "luxuries."

This is illustrated by a glance at the yearly record of imports as recorded by the bureau of statistics of the Department of Commerce and Labor. In years of marked depression, 1894 and 1895, for example, the value of diamonds and other precious stones imported dropped from \$16,000,000 in 1893 to \$5,500,000 in '94, \$7,500,000 in 1895, and about \$6,750,000 in 1896, gradually moving upward again until 1899 and 1900, and reaching a total of \$32,000,000 in 1903 and \$42,000,000 in 1907. In the fiscal year 1908, a year of business depression, the total fell to \$16,750,000, returning to \$29,000,000 in 1909, and \$48,000,000 in the fiscal year 1910, while the figures of the calendar year will not materially differ from those of the fiscal year.

Laces and Embroideries. The figures of diamond importations above cited are merely an example of the evidences of prosperity supplied by the figures of imports. In automobiles, art works, laces, feathers, furs, wines and liquors, tobacco, decorated chinaware and numerous other articles named in the list of importations, the figures of 1910 are large, and the importation of articles usually classed as luxuries will

GOVERNOR WEST NAMES STATE LAND AGENT.

T. A. Rhinehart, Assessor of Union County, Has Geographic Talent Ahead of Him.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 11.—Governor Oswald West this morning announced the appointment of T. A. Rhinehart, of Union county, to succeed Peter Applegate as state land agent. Mr. Rhinehart is at present county assessor of Union and will assume his duties of his new position as soon as the present session of the legislature has adjourned.

Immediately upon qualifying for the office Mr. Rhinehart will have a big task confronting him. The state has loaned more than \$5,000,000 in securities and it will be the duty of Mr. Rhinehart to see whether or not these securities are good, and, if not, to take the necessary steps to protect the state. The task will require Rhinehart to visit practically every county in Oregon. The securities are of varied character and owing to his wide acquaintance and his knowledge of farming lands and other properties, Rhinehart is expected to tell the status of the securities given in exchange for the state's money.

R. A. Harris, of Polk county, was also named state printing expert by Governor West yesterday afternoon soon after he was inaugurated. Mr. Harris succeeds Lou Stinson. Stinson and Applegate both were appointed named by Governor Benson. Mr. Harris says his appointment as printing expert came to him from the Governor entirely unlooked for.

CHURCH MAY NOT GET MRS. EDDY'S \$3,000,000.

Size of Such Requests Prohibited by Law of Two States—Hears Contest in Courts.

CONCORD, N. H., Jan. 12.—The residuary clause in the will of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, founder of the Christian Science Church, is null and void. In the opinion of ex-United States Senator William E. Chandler, Hannis Taylor, professor of constitutional and international law at George Washington University, and others, according to a statement given out for publication.

The clause in question provides for a gift of \$3,000,000 to the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston, known as the "Mother Church." A statute of New Hampshire, prohibiting a bequest to a church of more than \$5000 annually and one of Massachusetts forbidding more than \$2000 annually are the basis of the opinion, which was written by Professor Taylor, formerly Minister to Spain. According to the residuary clause held "null and void," the opinion says:

"As to the void gift, the testatrix died intestate and its subject matter passed on her death to her next of kin under the New Hampshire statute of distribution."

Later today a petition was filed in the Superior Court here by Mr. Chandler and other attorneys, asking the court for a construction of Mrs. Eddy's will, particularly the clause relating to the residuary estate. The petitioners also pray for an injunction against any disposition of the property in question, pending the construction of the residuary clause.

It is said to be the plan of the attorneys for George W. Glover and Dr. E. J. Foster-Eddy, sons of Mrs. Eddy, to try to have the question regarding the residuary bequest transferred from the Superior Court to the Supreme Court for a decision.
