

## PARDONING LIFE CONVICTS WILL BE MADE DIFFICULT.

Judiciary Committee Reports Favorably on Abolition of Capital Punishment; Bill is Amended.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 20.—While favoring the abolition of capital punishment, the pardoning of a life convict sentenced for murder in the first degree will be made difficult if the bill reported by the Senate committee on Judiciary today becomes a law. With this amendment, which is intended to make punishment more certain, once a conviction is secured, the bill removing the death penalty commanded the support of Chairman Malarkey and Senators Bowerman, Bean, and Barrett of Washington. Slaughter and McCulloch would not sign the report, but made no minority report. Norton was absent when the bill was considered.

The bill reported is a substitute for Senator Patton's bill, which merely abolished punishment by death for murder in the first degree. The substitute perfects the idea of reducing to life imprisonment the penalty for treason and assault on an officer by a convict, which are also punished with death under the existing law.

The punishment for murder in the second degree is left at life imprisonment, the same as for murder in the first degree, but the provision of the present law relative to pardon after good conduct for 15 years is not made applicable to those sentenced for first degree murder.

To those convicted of first degree murder, the following section applies:

"A written application for the requested pardon or commutation shall be presented to the Supreme Court. In and by said application it must appear that new and additional evidence which could not have been discovered by the use of diligence prior to the sentencing of such convict.

and which tends to show that such convict was innocent of the crime for which he was convicted, has been discovered since such sentencing; and said application shall be accompanied by a transcript of all the evidence adduced at the trial for such convict and by written statements of the newly discovered evidence duly sworn to by the persons proposing to furnish the same.

Upon receipt of such application the Supreme Court shall fix a time for the hearing thereof and cause notice of the time of such hearing to be given to the Attorney-General and to the district attorney of the district in which such convict was convicted. Upon such hearing the Supreme Court may receive and consider oral evidence in addition to or confirmation of said affidavits, but no evidence either oral or affidavit, shall be considered except such as is newly discovered and material as above provided.

If, upon said hearing, said Supreme Court is of the opinion that said convict is not innocent of the crime for which he was convicted, the proceedings shall be dismissed; but if upon said hearing the Supreme Court is of the opinion that said convict is innocent of the crime for which he was convicted, the clerk of the Supreme Court shall transmit to the Governor said application and the affidavits and transcripts that accompanied the same and transcript of any evidence received by the Supreme Court, together with the opinion of said court thereon, and the Governor may, at any time after receipt of said papers, pardon or commute the sentence of such convict."

## SCHOONER LAKME TOWED TO SAFETY; CREW UNHURT.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Jan. 20.—The steam schooner Lakme, waterlogged and in distress, was saved from destruction near Cape Blanco when the steamer Nan Smith late this afternoon succeeded in getting a tow line aboard.

All of the crew, 15 in number, were taken aboard the Smith and are now on their way to San Francisco. With her fires extinguished, and helpless before the storm, the Lakme drifted more than 50 miles during the 24 hours she was at the mercy of the gale. The men aboard her, although suffering no injuries, were in immediate danger of death.
