West Sign Astoria Bill.
SALEM, Or., Feb. 11.—Senator Lester's bill carrying an appropriation of \$50,000 for the celebration of the Astoria centennial this year has become a law, being sent to the Secretary of State's office today with the signature of the Governor affixed thereto.

The bill provides that \$40,000 additional must be raised by Astoria and Clatsop county before the appropriation will be made by the state. With only 10 dissenting votes, the House today passed two bills by the Lane county delegation appropriating in the aggregate \$503,258.92 for the increased maintenance and additional buildings for the University of Oregon.

Ballot-Counting Bill Passed.
With only one or two dissenting votes, Sutton's bill changing the present method of counting ballots in primary and general elections, passed the House today. It provides that the night election boards instead of taking up their duties when the polls are closed shall report at their respective polling places at 9 o'clock in the morning of election day.

Compromise on Road Bills.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 11.—The House tonight out the last serious difference of opinion this afternoon and smoothed over the ways for the passage of the good roads bills on Monday.

For an hour and a half a bitter struggle was waged over the Gill bonding act and was brought to an end by Thompson, of Lake, with a suggestion for another compromise acceptable to both factions. The bill all provided originally that before people of any county could vote on a road bonding act it would be necessary to state on which roads the money was to be spent.

The special committee on roads, composed of McKinney, Mariner, Higelow, Thompson and Clemens, brought in a report with this provision stricken out. Gill immediately started the fight with the statement that the provision was the most important of any of the road bills and that if it were removed he would vote against all bills "All the way down the line."

The contentions made by Gill and Seamer and Huntington of Douglas, were that the people should know where they were going to spend their money instead of leaving the matter in the hands of the court.

Neuner asserted that Douglas county would be in the throes of a civil war with a few such as proposed by the special committee.

The committee considered the bill carefully," said Chairman McKinney, "and while House bill No. 16, covered the subject in a better manner, out of consideration for Mr. Gill we spent a whole lot of time to get his bill into shape. The reason in my judgment, why the provision was asked should be stricken out is that building will be made entirely impossible because of sectional jealousy. I have been mixed up in road fights and I know. There is no reason why the county courts should not elect the roads and why they would not be able to do it fairly."

Thompson also asserted that road building would be practically impossible because of the factional jealousies which would develop under the bill.

Peterson, of Umatilla, joined in the debate with a defense of the bill, while Buchanan, of Douglas, asserted that the Gill measure with the amendment was better than either of the other two, but with the objectionable provision stricken out it could not be of any benefit.

Holla, of Washington, and Clemens, of Multnomah, declared that with the stipulation that the money from bonds must be used on certain roads, bond buyers would probably not buy them, because of question over their legality.

"The Gill measure in its original form is absolutely ineffective," said Clemens.

Neuner again jumped to the floor to declare that with politicians as judges of the county courts, it would be a case of where roads were built wherever their friends asked them, without the provision demanded. He threatened that the referendum could be invoked unless the House bid as he desired.

Brownhill, of Yamhill, made a bitter attack upon the attempt to remove the clause, saying that "joy riders" and automobilists were behind the move.

He also strongly criticized Judge Webster.

McKinney concluded the debate with the statement that he had confidence in the county courts, despite the attacks made upon them during the debate, and that he believed they would not abuse the confidence placed in them.

As the question of whether or not the Gill bill should be amended was coming to a vote, Thompson came to the front with the compromise suggestion. He asked that the bill be referred back to the committee to be changed so as to leave it optional with the people as to whether or not they should know on what roads the money would be spent before voting on the bonds. This suggestion was embraced and tranquility again restored.

The new bill provides that "the state highway board shall consist of three citizens of this state, one of whom shall be a bona fide resident of that portion of the state which lies east of the Cascade mountains, one a resident of Southern Oregon, south of the Willamette Valley, and the third member of the board to be selected by the Governor from the remaining portion of the state."

Another provision inserted on the request of Judge Mariner and other granters reads as follows:

"When so requested by the county court, the permanent engineering locations and the construction of the county roads to be constructed by the expenditure of money secured by the county under authority granted by section 19, article 11, of the constitution of this state, shall be under the supervision of an engineer or road contractor appointed by the state highway commissioner with such detailed information regarding the character of construction needed, and such other information as will aid him in selecting an engineer or road construction man for the particular road in question, it being understood that other things being equal, the state highway commissioner shall give preference to local men in making the appointments."

Another Mariner provision reads: "It shall be the duty of the state highway commissioner to pass on all bills and contracts pertaining to the construction of roads mentioned in sections three and five of this act (The bill paid for in whole or in part by the state) and in a general way to co-operate with the several county courts with a view to making the best possible use of all money expended. Prior to the letting of any contract, plans and specifications should be submitted the state highway commissioner and he is hereby directed to make such criticisms or give such advice as he may deem appropriate."

Another change in the bill compels the board and the commissioner to make a joint report to the Governor on December 1 of each year.

According to the latest estimate, the total amount of money now in circulation is \$3,211,550,475, as against \$3,125,587,729 a year ago.
