HIGH SCHOOL POSTPONED: GRADE SCHOOL PROPOSED.

At Monday afternoon's meeting of the Roseburg school board it was finally decided to postpone further action toward the new high school for the present. Instead, a proposition will be submitted to the voters for the building of a grade school. A petition for an election voting a bond issue for \$40,000 for a grade school and site therefor was in circulation today. This bond issue and the proposed site for a grade school will both be submitted to the voters of the district at an election to be held at an early date, the time therefor not being fixed as yet. In the opinion of the school board the present high school building is no longer adequate for all present high school purposes at a nominal cost, by the rearrangement of some partitions in the building. More room must be secured for the grade schools which now occupy some of the rooms there and which are also badly overcrowding the other school buildings in the district. Some objection has been heard in regard to voting \$40,000 for another grade school, the belief being expressed that \$25,000 should be sufficient.

This indefinite postponement of the high school movement will be generally accepted as killing the whole matter. This, as The Review predicted, was the real object sought by those who aroused the senseless agitation about sites therefor several weeks ago. Now the question arises: Will they turn in and kill the grade school movement also?
