VOTE IS DUE TODAY

Fate of Canadian Reciprocity Bill in Balance

IRON CONCERNS SHOW HANDS

Experiment on Farmer, Prouty Assets—Hopkins Finally Talks on Lorimer Bribery

Special to the Evening Review.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Final debate in the House on the reciprocity bill was begun today by Senator Cull, Republican, of Massachusetts, who fathered the measure passed in the house at the last Congress. He defended Underwood's identical measure today. Dazell, Republican, attacked Underwood and occupied the final hour of the debate. A vote on the measure is expected this afternoon.

McCall charged that the interest were using the farmers of the country to try to defeat reciprocity. Underwood in closing charged that protected interests in his district had just shut down work on some iron plants and threw 3000 men out of work in an effort to make him stop favoring reciprocity.

Prouty Makes Maiden Speech.
Offering an amendment to the reciprocity bill, which provides for placing on the free list all manufactured articles to compensate the agricultural interests of the country, Representative Prouty, of Iowa, made his maiden speech in the House yesterday in opposition to the proposed agreement as submitted by the ways and means committee.

"This treaty," said Mr. Prouty, "compels the farmer to sell his product in competition with Canada, but compels him to buy in a protected market. That is unfair to the farmer. Representing as I do a farming community, I would rather like to see it tried out on somebody else first. Must all these experiments be tried on the farmer? I think it is time to try them on somebody else."

An attack on "farmers free-list" bill, the next measure to be taken up by the Democrats, was made by Goode of Iowa, Republican, during the reciprocity debate.

Goode said the enactment of the

free-list bill would throw the farmers and stockraisers of the West into direct competition with the cheap cattle, cheap labor and cheap lands of Mexico. He declared that the protective measures keep up protection for the Southern farmer and reduce it for the Northern.

Light on Lorimer Bribery.
SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 21.—Reports of bribery being adopted to elect William Lorimer United States Senator were related by Albert J. Hopkins, the co-Senator who was nominated at the primaries for reelection, but was defeated by a combination of Republicans and Democrats in the legislature.

Hopkins, testifying before the Senate committee on the Lorimer bribery charges, related the incidents which surrounded his nomination for Senator early in the year 1909 and events in the period of the long deadlock.

"Senator McCormick, of Madison county," said Hopkins, "told my private secretary that he had been offered \$2500 to vote for Lorimer."

William Burgess, an electrical contractor from Joliet, Minn., told of a tall order for a train from Joliet to Chicago and Virginia, Minn., in March, 1911.

Burgess said a man named Johnson, Ralldolph, John and Carl Weyershauser, C. E. Welke, a brother-in-law of Edward Hines, and another man, were in the smoking apartment of a car.

"I know what I am talking about," Welke was quoted by Burgess as saying, "because I put up \$10,000 for that jackpot."

Welke is secretary of the Edward Hines Lumber Company.

DIAZ MUST RESIGN

Only Condition on Which Rebel Army Will Cease War

TIME UP AT 3 P. M. TODAY

Madero Ready to Attack Juarez, but City is Prepared to Make Heavy Resistance

Special to the Evening Review.

EL PASO, Texas, April 21.—The town is on edge today awaiting the hour of 3 o'clock, when General Madero said he would attack the town unless President Diaz abdicates or General Navarro surrenders. The rebel battle lines are spread through the hills west and south of Juarez. The opinion is that a general battle will be fought.

American troops are drawing up a double cordon to prevent American citizens from getting in the danger zone. The chief source of apprehension is that Americans may be hurt by flying bullets if the rebels attack Juarez from the Buache side. It is almost certain that bullets will strike El Paso under those circumstances. Feeling is high here. If anyone is hurt probably American citizens will return the fire.

A movement of 500 rebels from the hills toward Juarez at noon today marked what is believed to be the beginning of evolutions preceding the attack on Juarez. Colonel Chlapas, with 500 federals, left Agua Prieta this afternoon to go overland to the relief of Juarez.

Diaz Must Quit, Madero Says.

Madero yesterday refused to consider an armistice, asserting that the federals were playing for time in which to bring up more reinforcements. "I will give Diaz 24 hours to resign," he said, when a delegation of El Pasoans and Mexican citizens called upon him in his camp in the hills near Juarez and asked him to consider peace terms. He said it was his final reply to all attempts to secure peace; that Diaz must surrender the presidency.

The main command is in the mountains toward Rancho Flores, almost due west of Juarez. Garibaldi's command of more than 200 is north-west of Juarez, where the insurgents' artillery is mounted and where the insurgents' chief and his lieutenants have been meeting during the day.

In case of an attack the only danger to El Paso from bullets will be from the men at Buache. If they should attack from the southwest, the insurgents' cannon will fire parallel with the Rio Grande past El Paso into Juarez.

According to United States army officers here, Juarez is well prepared for the expected attack. The trenches outside the city, they say, have been so well constructed as virtually to defy discovery, and the fortifications within the city show unusual military skill. Juarez, in their opinion, is in a position to resist the attack of a force far greater than its garrison.

Diaz Shaves Note.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—In telegrams to the State Department today, the Mexican foreign office withdrew portions of President Diaz's reply to Taft that gave offense here. Last night Minister De La Barra told the President that Mexico desired no intervention and that the note did not intend to be offensive. It is believed that part of Diaz's answer was intended for home effect and that it was inserted with the full intention of withdrawing it as soon as the Mexican people had time to digest the independent "play" of Diaz.

Mexico City advices this afternoon stated that Lawrence Converse and Louis Platt, Americans, confined in Juarez as suspected spies, have been released by Diaz, who heard the plea of Converse's father.

Asks Withdrawal of Troops.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Victor Berger, the Socialist Congressman, today presented a petition signed by 80,000 American citizens, to the House demanding that the troops on the Mexican border be recalled. Berger said the petition was drafted by the bloody character of Diaz's government was understood and that the justice of the uprising was appreciated by a majority of Americans.

NO REMEDY FOR INFANTILE PARALYSIS—DR. FLEXNER.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The control of infantile paralysis today must be by prevention, since no specific remedy or cure for it is known," said Dr. Simon Flexner, of the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research, today before the National Academy of Sciences. The determined effort by many states to deal with the epidemic through prevention, by requiring notification and quarantine, was commended by Dr. Flexner.

Pointing out that 20,000 cases had occurred since its appearance in the United States in epidemic form, Dr. Flexner said that from 10,000 to 15,000 cripples had been left by the disease. No more convincing and impressive example of the value of the employment of a serious and baffling disease could be cited, he said, than the experiments from which accurate knowledge of infantile paralysis had been obtained.

PICKPOCKET, 73 YEARS OLD, TRIALS ROOSEVELT.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 20.—Convicted by a jury in ten minutes, John Brown, 73 years of age, holds the local record as the oldest pickpocket. He admitted on the witness stand that he got on the Roosevelt train at San Antonio, Texas, and was in every crowd the former President addressed on his last tour.

A. F. Haynes, aged 60, captured Brown after the old man had extracted a gold watch and \$14 from his pocket. Brown, Haynes said, was in a crowd packed onto a streetcar after Roosevelt's speech here. While he was holding Mrs. Haynes on the car Brown picked his pocket.

CORVALLIS, Or., April 20.—The new stallion law which was passed by the last session of the legislature will go into effect May 25. The stallion board has been organized, and plans for the work are being made, but no licenses will be issued until after May 25. Stallion owners should, however, get in their applications before that date.

It will not be possible to register and have examined all the horses in the state in a day or two, so that some time may intervene between the receipt of the application and the issuance of the license. It is not expected that the owners stop using their horses during that period, but it is expected that no horses will be used after May 25 until an application for license has been made.

Animals having county licenses will also have to get state licenses under the new law, as there is no connection between the state license and that issued by the county. Money paid for county licenses will not count toward securing state licenses. Copies of the law and application blanks may be obtained from the secretary of the board at Corvallis.

It is not necessary, however, that the application be made on the regular blanks. A letter will do as well, providing the necessary information is included. All applications must be accompanied by the \$10 fee, and, in case of registered horses, by the pedigree certificate. These pedigrees will be returned.
