ROSEBURG PRISONER MUCH WANTED MAN.

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 12.—Papers were issued here today by the Governor's office for the return to Spokane of Frank Holt, alias Frank Howard, alias Adelbert Haskins, now under arrest at Roseburg, Or., on a charge of having passed a bogus check for \$100 on a bank at Cheney, Wash. According to J. E. Clark, Deputy Sheriff of Spokane, who will go for the prisoner, Holt, Howard or Haskins is one of the cleverest forgers that ever operated in the West, for he has evaded arrest for years, although wanted in Eastern Washington, Idaho and Montana.

The authorities of that section of the United States have searched far and near for him and circulars have been sent broadcast, and while every town of any size is reported to have been a victim of his activities until he was captured in Oregon, he has escaped being landed in jail. He was arrested on descriptions sent out by Spokane and, if he is not convicted in Spokane, the other states want him, having notified Spokane to that effect.

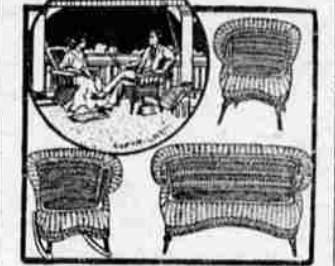

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STATE GRANGERS DESIRE ABOLITION OF LEGISLATURE.

Reports "Scandalous Proceedings" and Proposes Substitution of Commission.

CORVALLIS, Or., May 12.—This afternoon opened with the special order of locating the meeting of the next State Grange. Bailey of Roseburg presented that city's claim, promising a flower and fruit show at the time. A telegram from Tillamook invited the Grange to try that place. Grant's Pass presented an invitation through Mr. Babcock. Roseburg won by about 19 to 1. The next meeting will occur at that city about May 20, 1912.

The fourth day of the meeting of the Oregon State Grange is well advanced. The lateness of last evening's session, due to the invitation of 67 patrons, who took the fifth degree, and of an even 100 who took the sixth, causing business to lag a little this morning.

A resolution from Benton county, based on the report of the legislative committee in regard to some of the "scandalous proceedings" of the state legislature, proposed the abolishing of the state legislature and the substitution of a commission form of government and the initiative and referendum.

Johnson of Malheur proposed a rule that state deputies be allowed mileage and per diem to the State Grange.

Vasco county proposed a plan for electing a Lieutenant Governor. Mrs. G. A. Keller, of Union county, introduced a resolution stating that since the order approved of a six days a week labor for men, that it be resolved that a law be requested that the women be relieved of all labor from Saturday evening till 6 o'clock Mondays. A good deal of opposition to this proposition was made by the men, who evidently feared the result.

Mr. Parsons, of the Portland Labor Press, was accorded the floor. He spoke at some length on the educational appropriation referendum movement unfavorably and declared in favor of submitting all legislative measures by initiative.

Marion county introduced a resolution favoring a little of everything, including judicious management of county affairs and bonding for roads, but it was lost by motion of A. C. Miller, of Albany.

A resolution was presented favoring the nomination of officers in the Grange and it was carried.

The committee on by-laws reported in favor of changing the by-laws to read that the election of officers shall occur at the first meeting in the month of December.

The committee on by-laws also presented a lengthy change for the purpose of electing delegates from each Grange to the state meetings. As it was so important a measure it was decided to refer it to the subordinate granges for their opinion, as was also that of raising dues, that question to be settled at the next state Grange.

Indications are that the work will not be completed today.
