## IDENTITY KNOWN

Mail Car Robbers Said to be  
Yoncalla Ranchmen

## MISSING, WITH THEIR GUNS

Familiarity With Wild Coast Region  
May Enable Them to Escape  
Posse Altogether

That the identity of the two men who robbed the mail car of the Shasta Limited between Drain and Yoncalla last Friday night is positively known to the authorities is the information imparted in Roseburg today by Deputy Sheriff Z. L. Davis, who was in the city. Davis, who gained fame locally in the recent beer crusade, participated in the early part of the hunt for the fugitives.

Davis knows the names of the bandits, but he refuses to divulge them. He stated that the robbers owned a ranch eight miles from Yoncalla, that they had been making from their home since the night of the hold-up and that their personal description tallies exactly with that of the robbers, as given by the mail clerks, who turned over to them the pouches of registered packages.

Missing with the outlaws are their rifles and revolvers, a fact ascertained by a search of their home. Being experienced woodsmen and knowing every foot of the wild region in which they are being trailed fully explains why they have continued to evade capture with such apparent ease. Both men are splendid shots, Davis says. If they should be traced, the Douglas County posse behind them and the Coos County posse in front of them, a bloody battle would probably result. That the outlaws possess nerve in addition to their ability to shoot straight is evidenced by their performance of the mail car robbery so close to home without concealing their faces.

The Douglas County posse is under the leadership of Deputy Sheriff E. G. Stewart and ex-Deputy Sam W. Starnes. The Coos County posse, where the search for the outlaws was progressing late Tuesday afternoon, is among the wildest in the state. The Umpqua there breaks through the Coast Range by means of a rugged canyon, which barely affords a stage road. The hold-ups, however, so far as can be ascertained by telephone communication here, have been avoiding the stage road. They are now believed to have turned southwest. Allegany, the next point in their path, is well on the western slope of the Coast Range and it is a comparatively easy trip from there to Coos Bay. Sheriff Gage, of Coos County, is expected to go on soon as the two men are definitely located in that county. Deputy Sheriff Fred Stewart was at Allegany this afternoon and phoned that he would go to Marshfield tonight. No definite trace of the robbers was reported.

Loot May Total \$1000.  
Postoffice Inspector Morse, who has in his possession a quantity of stolen loot, said today that he believed the outlaws secured money aggregating at least \$1000. Twenty-nine registered letters, many of which contained money, were overlooked by the robbers and were forwarded to the postoffice officials at Spokane. Many of the packages containing jewelry and other articles of value were simply ripped open, the contents mutilated and cast aside.

From the manner in which the contents of the sacks were examined the postoffice inspector believes that the robbers were amateurs and have had little experience in holding up trains. It is Mr. Morse's opinion that most of the money secured by the bandits was found in the pouch consigned to San Francisco. In this pouch might have been a substantial remittance to one of the San Francisco depositors.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The House of Representatives by a vote of 221 to 100 today passed the Underwood wool tariff revision bill, providing for a 50 per cent reduction of the duty on wool and woolen goods. The measure was introduced by the Democrats for the passage of the measure and one Democrat Representative, Francisco, of Ohio, voted against it.

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS  
ELECT GRAND OFFICERS.

ASTORIA, Or., June 20.—After a stormy afternoon, in which several men prominent in Pythian affairs were defeated, officers of the grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias were chosen by the 200 delegates in session.

Marion F. Davis, of Union, past grand chancellor, was elected supreme representative from Oregon to attend the grand lodge meeting, together with L. M. Carl, of Albany, the holdover.

L. R. Stinson, of Salem, was accorded fresh honors by his election for the 16th consecutive time to the office of grand recorder and keeper of the seal. J. W. Maloney, of Pendleton, was elected for the eighth consecutive time to the office of grand master of the exchequer.

Others chosen were: Frank T. Wrightman, of Salem, grand chancellor; J. H. Gwinn, of Pendleton, grand vice-chancellor; J. H. Westcott, of Gaston, grand prelate; Geo. Ross, of Marshfield, grand master at arms; Roy Williams, of Brownsville, grand inner guard; Nathaniel Jones, of Astoria, grand inner guard.

A GOOD INVESTMENT.

KILLED; LOSS \$100,000.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., June 20.—Fred Ball, a prominent business man of Maricopa, and chief of the fire department, was instantly killed by a fire while fighting a fire which destroyed half of the business section of Maricopa at an early hour this morning. Many firefighters were injured by falling timbers.

The loss will reach more than \$100,000. More than a dozen business concerns, a hotel, two banks and the telephone exchange were destroyed.

## NOSTRUMS RAPPED

Taft Urges Congress to Act on  
Medicine Frauds

## 2,000 CASES TO PROSECUTE

Staggering Losses From Preventable  
Diseases Shown at "White  
Plague" Congress

(Special to the Evening Review).  
WASHINGTON, June 21.—Denouncing the false statements of curative properties of patent medicines, President Taft today sent a special message to Congress urging an emergency amendment to the pure food law, prohibiting such deceptions on labels of proprietary medicines. The message says that over 2000 cases against medical firms making false claims concerning their compounds have been prepared under the pure food and drug act. More than 150 of these, he said, had been dismissed under the Supreme Court ruling holding that such statements could not be construed as misbranding. The cases investigated, Taft said, involved the rankest frauds that the Department of Justice had ever discovered.

TUBERCULOSIS LOSS WOULD PAY  
NATIONAL DEBT.

DENVER, Colo., June 21.—Amazing figures on the "White Plague" were presented today in a paper on "Tuberculosis as a Factor in the Increased Cost of Living," by Edward F. McSweeney, chairman of the trustees of the Boston Consumptives Hospital, delivered before the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis. Mr. McSweeney said in part:

"Senator Aldrich's statement that waste and inefficiency was causing a loss of 300 millions every year of the United States Government made the Nation sit up and take notice, and has been the cause of instituting reforms in Governmental methods that have already saved scores of millions of dollars; yet even if Senator Aldrich's figures of loss to the Government by inefficiency could be proven to be true, it would still be only two-thirds of the actual annual cost in loss of wages, in maintenance, medical attention and financial expenses of the persons who die from tuberculosis in the United States every year.

"Two years' loss from preventable disease in the United States, including tuberculosis, would purchase all the wheat, corn, oats, rye, barley, buckwheat, potatoes, hay and tobacco produced last year in the United States.

"One year's loss from preventable diseases, including tuberculosis, in the United States, would pay the National debt."

"It would pay the annual interest on the national debt of the world."

"It would reimburse England and the Transvaal for the Boer war."

"It would repay the cost to the United States of the Spanish-American war."

"It is equal to the combined stock and bond issues of all the railroads in the United States."

"It would provide for the capitalization of all the National banks in the Nation and leave money over enough to build the Panama Canal."

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONGRESS IS  
OPENED IN "FRISCO."

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—Departmental conferences under the direction of the international superintendents and secretaries occupied the delegates to the thirteenth triennial international Sunday School Convention today. The first formal general session will be held this evening, with addresses of welcome by Governor Johnson of California, Mayor McCarthy of San Francisco, Rolla V. Watt, representing the business interests of the city, and Dr. H. H. Bell, representing the California local committee. The responses will be by John Stiles of Louisville, Ky., president of the international association, and Justice McClure, of the Ontario Court of Appeals. There will also be addresses by the Rev. David B. Downey, of Chicago, secretary of the Methodist Sunday school board, on "The Sunday School in the Christian Conquest of North America," and Rev. Dr. Chapman on "The Open Bible and the Uplifted Cross."

Tomorrow evening the convention will celebrate the bicentennial of the King James version, with addresses by Dr. Charles F. Aked, of San Francisco, formerly pastor of "Rockefeller's Church," in New York; Dr. H. M. Hamill, of Nashville, Tenn.; and Dr. R. F. Coyle, of Denver, Colo. Friday evening a parade of 15,000 men of adult Bible classes will be held. Each man will carry a Bible and the volumes will later be placed in the rooms of San Francisco hotels.

## Special to the Evening Review.

LONDON, June 21.—In anticipation of the climax of coronation week, 2000 ambulances, hundreds of physicians and nurses and all emergency hospitals have been engaged to care for the casualties which are considered inevitable. Preparations are being made against accident in case any grand stands collapse or fire breaks out. Precautions were redoubled today to guard visiting royalty. All houses along the line of march were inspected by Scotland Yard men to see that no plots existed or bombs were set.

Tonight the big city gates will be closed and a rectangle, two and a half miles across and three miles long in that part of London where the ceremonies occur tomorrow will be closed to traffic for two days. This includes hotels and business houses and none will be allowed to enter or depart from the rectangle save those with passes.

EXPLOSION OF BOMB LAID TO  
UNION "SLUGGERS."

CHICAGO, June 21.—A bomb exploded today in the manhole of the Commonwealth Edison Electric Company's building and caused a panic in the Blackstone and Congress hotels and shattered windows for a radius of three blocks. The company is involved in trouble with its union electrical workers. It charges that "Sluggers" are responsible for the outrage.

UNITED STATES TO RECOGNIZE  
NEW REPUBLIC.

LISBON, June 21.—Anselmo Braamcamp was elected president of Portugal today. He will succeed Braga, who has been the provisional head of the government since King Manuel was deposed. Braamcamp, who has been president of the Lisbon Municipal Council, was elected by the Constitutional Assembly recently chosen by popular election. The powers, including England and the United States, will recognize the new republic when the new president is installed.
