LEPER CURED BY
EX-PORTLAND MAN.

Dr. J. T. Wayson, of Honolulu, Makes
Wonderful Discovery—Freezing
Method Used.

Portland Oregonian: What is
reputed to be a cure for leprosy has
been discovered by Dr. J. T. Wayson,
formerly of Portland, now of Honolulu.
The main feature of the treatment,
the success of which has been fully
demonstrated, it is declared in
Honolulu, is the use of carbon dioxide
snow. With this snow, which is
ordinary carbonic acid gas solidified
under cold and pressure, the lesions
caused by the disease are frozen and
the bacilli are killed by the intense
cold.

For two or three years, beginning
with 1892, Dr. Wayson was house
physician of the old Portland Hospital,
located in Sunnyside. This was
while Rev. John L. Dennison, D. D.,
was superintendent of the institution.
Dr. Wayson lived when a youth in
Port Townsend, Wash. He graduated
in 1892 from the Cooper Medical Col-
lege, San Francisco. For the past
16 years he has been a resident of
Honolulu and is now a member of
the board of health of that city.

Discovery is Related.

Telling of his discovery a Honolulu
daily newspaper says:

"On January 21, 1910, Charles
F., five and a half years old, was
taken to the Kailhi receiving station,
officially declared a leper. His body
bore external evidence of the ravages
of the disease. Bacteriological tests
proved the presence of the bacilli of
leprosy in his blood.

"Today he will be taken from the

receiving station and restored to his
father, his body without a blemish,
his blood cleared of the taint of the
disease declared through certainties
incurable. He is now officially de-
clared cured.

"The release of the little German
boy from detention marks the first
step in the proof of an absolutely new
cure for leprosy. The cure, for such
it is, proven by bacteriological tests,
clinical tests made by three leading
physicians and every proof which can
be obtained in any way, is the result
of the experimental work of Dr. J.
T. Wayson, who has had charge of the
case since the boy's admission to
the receiving station.

Snow is Used.

"The main departure in the treatment
consists in the use of carbon
dioxide snow, a substance resembling
yellow icecream, formed by compress-
ing carbon dioxide gas into a solid
form. This substance is intensely
cold, having a temperature of 190
degrees below zero, Fahrenheit. This
snow is applied to the leprous lesions
and so cold is it that it immediately
freezes the flesh.

"The bitter cold apparently kills
the bacilli, the lesion sloughs off, as
does the skin of a healthy person after
a frostbite, and there remains
pink, healthy flesh.

"In other cases under treatment by
Dr. Wayson marked improvement is
shown and the brightest hope exists
that before the present year is closed
there will have been a sufficient num-
ber of cases officially declared cured
to have leprosy removed from the list
of incurable diseases.

Tuberculin Injections Given.

"The little boy has leprous lesions
on his face, arms and legs, and bacilli
were found plentiful in each lesion.
Doctor Brinkerhoff applied Koch's
tuberculin, with which experiments
were being made at the time, but the
only appreciable result was to hasten
the external ravages of the disease
and by May 20, at which time Dr.

Wayson retained entire charge of the
case, no progress had been made.
The last tuberculin injection was
made on May 12, a few days over a
year ago. By that time eleven dis-
tinct leprous lesions had developed.

"Doctor Wayson began systematic
treatment on May 20, using chauli-
moogra oil, elixir phosphate of iron,
quinine and strychnine internally and
locally applying carbon dioxide
snow. The freezing and thawing pro-
cess was kept up intermittently until
December last, when it was put to a
test. Snips were taken from the mar-
gin of the old leprous lesion on the
cheek and examined for bacilli. A
few were found showing that the
treatment had so far failed. Again
the flesh was frozen, this time the
lesion and half an inch of flesh all
around being treated, the whole 11
lesions being gone over. On January
27 another bacteriological test was
made, each lesion being snipped
from. On acid test bacillus was
found, only one where therefor-
e had been hundreds, and this lone
bacillus was not definitely dis-
tinguished as a leprous bacillus.

Third Test is Made.

"On March 17 last Dr. Wayson and
Bacteriologist Reinecke made their
third test. Snips were taken from
each lesion, or where the lesions had
been, from the centers, the margins
and the healthy flesh without. Not
an acid fast bacillus was found in
any of the lesions. The boy was free
from leprosy.

"Other lepers have been freed as
'arrested cases.' Others have been set
free as no longer dangerous to the
health of the community and to all
intents and purposes free from the
disease, but for the first time in
history of the disease a proven leper
has been cured and his cure demon-
strated beyond possibility of contra-
diction or doubt."

DR. MAGUIRE IN AFRICA.



The study of
savages, braving the dangers of
fever, and the still greater danger
from the hostile natives. Dr. Maguire
was the first white man to
ascend the Congo after Stanley came
down. In a few years he had mas-
tered the native language, founded a
Mission among a people that had
before been in heathen darkness and
had Christianized a community of
barbarians. A severe illness finally
necessitated a return to civilization
and gave to this country one of its
greatest lecturers.

Horrors of the Dark Continent.

Dr. Maguire followed in the steps
of Stanley and remained to work
where the noted explorer had
opened the way. His mission work
and hunting trips covered much of
the same territory visited recently by
Theodore Roosevelt and his expedi-
tion. His initial journey started at
Wombi, the headquarters of the in-
famous traffic exploited by the
notorious King Leopold, and which at
that time was in the very zenith of
its prosperity. His journey up the
Congo exhibited all the various
brutal phases of the traffic in blood.
He saw the wretched gangs of native
workers chained like criminals, beaten
and maimed in order to extort the
last vestige of wealth from the
tropical forests. He witnessed the
oppression of a simple people—an
oppression more terrible, a cruelty
more revolting than that of the
Egyptian slaves of three thousand
years ago. Beyond the blighting in-
fluences of King Leopold and his
various King Leopolds, he still found
the Africa of his dreams to be a coun-
try of terrors, for the slaves of the coast
country were still recruited from the
highlands of the upper Congo and the
wretchedness of a slave train on the
Congo had horrors of its own be-
side which the terrors of Dore's in-
ferno might well seem tame.
