A. Q. JOHNSON AND STEVE PEARSON ON STATE TEAM.

PORTLAND, Or., July 21.—After a special competitive shoot lasting two days, selections of the 15 rifle-men, who will represent the Oregon National Guard in the National rifle matches next month, were made on Wednesday by Adjutant-General Finzer.

Twenty-four marksmen, the pick of the entire National Guard, tried out for place on the National team. Under the direction of Major Creed C. Hammond, state inspector of small arms practice, the crack shots went over the range course three times. The 15 men selected, all but one of them enlisted men, are: First Lieutenant Enver Todd, Woodburn; sergeant O. A. Stevens, Portland; sergeant R. L. Perdue, Eugene; sergeants L. H. Spooner, G. A. Pickard, Charles White, Frank Guerin, A. A. Schwarz, O. P. Romaine, all of Portland; Corporal A. Q. Johnson, Portland; Corporal Frank H. Mapes, Salem; Private H. T. Connor, Cottage Grove; Private Steve Pearson, Roseburg; Private R. J. Snyder, Portland.

Remarkably high scores were made throughout in the range work, and there is every indication that the Oregon team will not only re-

main one of the 12 leading teams of the entire military service of the country, but will capture one of the National awards. Every one of the 15 men shot several points above "center," and a number of "possibles" were registered.

The members of the team will go to their home stations today and will reassemble August 1 for a couple of weeks preliminary practice at the Clackamas Station rifle range before starting East. The National matches are to be held at Camp Perry, Ohio, on the south shore of Lake Erie, and teams will compete representing every branch of the regular service and every state in the Union.

His clothes were found on the river bank by his mother.

Schools Man Drowns.

HILLSBORO, Or., July 20.—Percy Jaquith, 23 years old and a son of W. W. Jaquith, a prominent resident of the Scholls neighborhood, was drowned Tuesday night while bathing in the Tualatin River. He had spent the evening at the home of friends and on leaving remarked he would take a swim before returning home. He did not appear at his home during the night and in the morning search resulted in finding his bicycle and clothing on the river bank. The river was dragged all day but the body was not recovered.

CONFESSES TO MURDERING WIFE SIX YEARS AGO.

CHARLOTTE, Mich., July 19.—William E. Lonsberry, a farmer, charged with killing his wife January 1, 1905, confessed his crime tonight on it being inferred that Sheriff Donovan had dug up the body on the Lonsberry farm. Lonsberry said he hit his wife several times and when she fell her head struck the floor with enough force to kill her. Both he and his mother tried to revive the woman, but could not. Lonsberry says the trouble started because his wife and his aged mother could not get along together. When informed of the finding of the body, he exclaimed: "I am undone; I am ruined, and my own mother is the cause of it all."

SPECIAL S. P. RATES FOR FRUITS AND VEGETABLES.

A special tariff has been issued by the Southern Pacific Company effective July 25th, providing reduced rates on fresh fruit and vegetables from points along their lines for canning, cider and vinegar making and for packing and concentrating purposes. The object of establishing these special rates is for the purpose of encouraging and stimulating the growth and development of the fruit and vegetable industries in Western and Southern Oregon, and to enable the growers to market fruit and vegetables that have hitherto gone to waste. In addition to the reduction in rates, a further concession has been made in allowing different shippers to go in together to make up a car which is subject to the low minimum of 10,000 pounds. This privilege of consolidation to different shippers in the same car must be from one shipping point, consigned to one consignee, at one destination on the same date. This should be of very material assistance to fruit and vegetable growers in marketing their products. Further particulars desired as to application of these rates can be secured from agents or traffic officials of the S. P. Co.
