**ROSEBURG'S CHANCE  
TO ADVERTISE APPLES  
AT EASTERN EXHIBIT.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 24.—Big Oregon apples will be distributed at the Pittsburg Land Show, October 12-25, this year, through the efforts of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange and the Oregon Development League. The Exchange will contribute a carload of fine apples and the League will attend to their free distribution. Space has been taken at the Land Show by the League and an information bureau will be maintained there. Literature descriptive of the whole state will be handed out to Land Show visitors and representatives of the Northwest will be on hand to answer questions about this section of the country. Each community in the state should forward literature to the Portland Commercial Club, so it can be sent to Pittsburg.

This land show will be one of the important avenues for reaching colonists for the Pacific Northwest. Located as it is where the three states of West Virginia, Ohio and Pennsylvania corner, the show attracts a great many farmers from this whole territory and the exhibits

of what the West can do agriculturally will prove an inducement to many of them to move out here and occupy our vacant lands.

The Government announces that the following lights will be established on the Umpqua River about September 1, 1911:

- Front light—A white post-lantern light, to be shown about 20 feet above water from a white cross arm attached to a white post on land abutment at southerly side of entrance.
- Umpqua River life-saving station—26 degs. true (N. 7-16 E. mag.).
- Winchester Bay entrance—Southerly side, 34 1/2 degs. true (N. by E. 5 E. mag.).
- Umpqua River light-house—293 1/2 degs. true (S. 1/4 W. mag.).
- Rear light—A white post-lantern light, to be shown about 21 feet above water from a cross arm attached to a post, about 250 yards 50 degs. true (NE. by E. 1/4 E. mag.), in rear of front light.
- West side channel light—A white post-lantern light, to be shown 12 feet above water from a cross arm attached to a three-pile dolphin in about nine feet of water on westerly side of channel over flats abreast of Brushy Hill.
- Umpqua River light-house—204 1/2 degs. true (S. 5-16 W. mag.).
- Stage house—237 1/2 degs. true (SW. 3/4 S. mag.).
- Barrett's house—198 1/2 degs. true (S. 3-16 mag.).
- Ballast Point light—A red post-lantern light, to be shown 12 feet above water from a cross arm attached to a three-pile dolphin in about six feet of water at northerly end of sand spit forming the bend in river below Gardiner.
- Gardiner mill wharf, R. T.—115 1/2 degs. true (E. 3-16 S. mag.).
- Reed's cannery—134 1/2 degs. true (SE. by E. 15-16 E. mag.).
- Stage house—218 1/2 degs. true (S. by W. 9-16 W. mag.).
- North side channel light—A white post-lantern light, to be shown 12 feet above water from an arm attached to a three-pile dolphin in about six feet of water at northerly side of channel about 1 1/2 miles below Gardiner.
- Gardiner mill wharf, R. T.—115 1/2 degs. true (SE. by E. 3 E. mag.).
- Reed's cannery—134 1/2 degs. true (SE. 15-16 W. mag.).
- Stage house—228 degs. true (SSW. 1/2 W. mag.).

The following lights at up-river points which are not shown on any published charts:

- Doanes Creek Bar light—A white post-lantern light, to be shown 12 feet above water from a cross arm attached to a three-pile dolphin marking the steamboat crossing at the bar, about six miles above Gardiner.
- Echo Island Bar light—A red post-lantern light, to be shown from cross arm attached to a post on southerly bank of river, marking crossing at the bar, about 8 1/2 miles above Gardiner.
- Wade's ranch light—A white post-lantern light, to be shown from a cross arm attached to a post on southerly bank of river in bend just above The Narrows, about 1 1/2 miles below Scottsburg.
- Cape Horn light—A red post-lantern light, to be shown from an arm attached to a post on southerly bank of river about one mile below Scottsburg.
- Scottsburg light—A red post-lantern light, to be shown from a cross arm attached to a post on southerly bank of river abreast of the rocks just below Scottsburg.
