Speaking of the expense of main- taining state schools, here is a news item clipped from an issue of the St. Paul Pioneer Press of Sept. 14: "During the fiscal year that ended July 31, 1911, there was expended at the University of Minnesota \$1, 404,278.06, and there was to its credit in the state treasury in addi- tion, \$1,029,415.64. These figures were compiled by State Treasurer Walter J. Smith. Incidentally, the fact is noted that in 1883, the total receipts of the school from all sources amounted to \$1,875,198.99. These are big figures compared with the \$125,000 annual appropriation for Oregon's State University, out of which several new buildings, one of them the large gymnasium, were built in the last four years. And before that the University had an annual income of less than \$50,000. There is not a state in the Union which has spent less money on its University than Oregon, and now the attempt to appropriate money to erect two good buildings which will be permanent is branded a graft in certain quarters, and held up by referendum petitions in which fraud and forgery figured with undue prominence. It would seem as if state pride alone would demand that Oregon have educational facilities and institutions equal at least to those of other states in the Union. That the people generally take this view no doubt explains the necessity of resorting to forgery in order to secure the requisite number of names to hold up the appropriation.—Eng- eene Guard. FROM THE SOUTH SEAS. Former Edenbrow Resident Writes of Conditions There. Papeete, Tahiti, Sept. 12, 1911. Gentlemen: After 12 days steam- ing our ship arrived here on time. At first view the island seemed to be a high mountain rising out of the ocean. A nearer view showed the foothills and lowlands, extending as far as we could see, covered with vegetation; the mountains are green, as they are well watered by frequent showers. We fell among friends at once, and were able to rent a nice little house where we are very com- fortable. The price of living at the hotels is fully as expensive as in the States, but very different. Meat, butter, cheese, etc., are brought from New Zealand. Pigs are plenty here. The city (popula- tion 1000) is the home of the French government and other officials for the Society group of islands. We have seen several of these islands. Each one is governed by a resident chief or prominent man, elected by the people. I met the governor of "Rye Roar" (you cannot find it on any map), a fine appearing native, who always goes to church bare- footed. The natives seem very kind and happy. They don't spend much for clothing. The law requires them to wear some. All the ladies but visitors wear a dress fitted to the shoulders (and no where else); it hangs like a curtain. They wear nice hats, trimmed with artificial and natural flowers. They sit on the floor or ground while eating. Shoes are not an article of dress, and you may sometimes see a native lady come out on the street with her dress in one hand and put it on as she goes along the street. You may sometimes see a youth "dressed up" with only a hat on or with only a "bare skin" coat on. We find it hot here, but cool at night. The weather here is just what we need. The natives are friendly and all the stores but the Chinese, close from 11 to 2 o'clock, and all busi- ness stops at 5 p. m. To converse with the people one needs here it would be well to know some words in Chinese, Tahitian, French and English, and to be quick to make and understand signs. As we stood one evening on the street, a native, who had picked up some English, came up and politely said: "Have you got a better?" evidently supposing it to be a salutation. These are the most polite and kind people I have ever met. Living is easy to them; they don't seem to worry, or plan to skin the other fellow. Our vacation has been one of con- stant activity. Where I have been I have noticed the products of the island, viz.: Copra, or dried cocon- ut meats, vanilla, bean pods, coffee and sugar. The sugar plantations are ploughed and the crop is treated very much as the corn is raised in the corn-growing sections of the U. S. They seem to cut and use the cane, and I think it comes up again without replanting. They only pro- duce brown sugar here; loaf sugar can be bought, but is granulated. Some enterprising people some- times plant nuts, or seeds, but after that the plant or tree must care for itself. Some few things as vanilla, bread fruit, coffee, pepper, etc., etc., it seems to me, have few enemies. The scale is killing the orange trees. The orange trees grow wild and re- ceive no attention until they gather the ripe fruit with a pole. The fruit is very fine and one can eat all they desire without bad results. We get baskets for one franc (25 cents) containing 40 to 45 oranges. Coffee is planted in the woods and has no care at all (as far as cap bee). I like the native coffee very much, as I can drink all I want and it does not hurt me or make me wakeful. A planter invited me to visit his
