HOW CAN WE GET EGGS **FROM HENS IN WINTER?**

(By J. A. Linderman, In Successful
 Poultry Journal).

This subject has probably filled the
 minds of all keepers of hens at one
 time or another, at least with such
 as keep hens for eggs mostly and
 those eggs intended for market. It
 is a fact, that with some people, es-
 pecially such as keep poultry for
 show purposes, or for selling eggs at
 fancy prices, during what is termed
 by poultrymen the hatching season,
 that eggs are not desired during a
 part of the winter. Every keeper of
 fancy stock that enters to the public
 with the products of his yards makes
 it a point to have his hens in a con-
 dition to receive the greatest number
 of eggs when the orders for such
 begin to pour upon him and it is very
 proper and surely to his interest so
 to do. A hen that has laid all winter,
 will not lay much if any in the
 spring, and a hen that has rested
 during the winter, or at least has not
 been a prolific layer, ought and will
 with the proper care and food, be a
 good layer. But this article is not
 so much for fanciers as for such that
 make it a business of eggs for the
 general market.

I have found through years of close
 association with almost every breed
 of chickens, that as a rule it is not
 the hen's fault if no eggs are received
 as much as it is the owner of the hen.
 We have breeds enough to select
 from, so that the most exacting can
 and should be pleased. Some breeds
 are known better than others, some
 are favored more than others. There
 are breeds and breeds, but I will say
 that proper care and food will make
 most, if not all, of them good layers.
 We have breeds that are known for
 their good laying qualities, others

are not so well thought of, while
 from others we hear of only poor
 success. I say again that it is not so
 much the breed as it is the care they
 receive, that makes the result a good
 or poor one. A person that keeps
 poultry for eggs, and wants a part
 of these eggs in winter, when as a
 rule fresh eggs are scarce, and prices
 high, this person must of his duty at-
 tention to work for the end he seeks.
 A hen, no matter whether good med-
 ium or poor in laying qualities,
 will lay, if at all, in the spring of
 the year. It is the time that nature
 has provided her for such and as I
 say, if a hen lays in the spring, that
 is no thermometer at all as to her
 being a good layer. A hen that can
 be kept at it and that lays the great-
 est number in a year, and a goodly
 part of these are laid when they bring
 the best price, that is the hen to have
 and that is what we must strive to ob-
 tain. But how? We must go back
 to the beginning. In order to get hens
 to have them laying when the winter
 comes on, it is necessary to have
 them hatched early enough in the
 spring, to get them grown and in fit
 condition today. This can be done
 with most, yes I believe with all
 breeds, even in the north. Some
 mature earlier than others and we
 must act accordingly. A hen that
 starts to lay, say, October, with prop-
 er housing, food and care, can be
 kept at it very easily. But let cold
 weather come on and catch your hens
 so that they will be chilled and
 frosted, and you will find it the hard-
 est kind of work to overcome it and
 get them in shape. The best of houses
 and all the proper foods will have
 little effect on them. If your old
 hens are wanting to supply your winter
 eggs, you have also a duty to
 perform, to get them in shape.

A hen that has come through
 moult poorly or not at all, will never
 be good in a layer. We must get
 them through moulting early in the
 fall, so they will be in tip-top shape.
 Help them along with proper food
 to aid them in getting a new coat of
 feathers. I don't intend to go into
 details at this time as to food, so
 much has been written about the
 proper laying ration and they all
 have their merits or demerits. It
 would make this subject entirely too
 long. Nor shall I say what breed to
 keep. I say keep any breed that is
 known for its good winter-laying
 qualities, or for that matter, any
 breed one desires.

Take the breed that is most at-
 tractive to you and one that you will
 take pride in. Then give it your best
 attention and care and you won't go
 amiss. Remember the breed alone

DOUGLAS COUNTY SAFE **BLOWER PROVES ALIBI.**

Hendricks Did Not Shoot Sheriff, but
 Hasn't Cleared Himself of
 Murder Charge.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 20.—
 That John Hendricks, in jail here on
 the charge that he knows something
 of the murder of W. H. Shores, at
 Butler, last Tuesday, was in Wood-
 land, Wash., Wednesday night, when
 Sheriff Ira Cresap, of this county,
 was shot in the local railroad yards,
 was learned today when the sheriff
 went to Woodland and compared the
 writing of Hendricks with that on the
 hotel register.
 Hendricks said he was in Van-
 couver Tuesday night, and this was
 substantiated by his father and
 mother, Mr. and Mrs. John Hend-
 ricks, who live here, and that he was
 in the hotel at Woodland Wednes-
 day night. Hendricks told Sheriff
 Cresap he registered there under the
 name of J. Murray, and was in room
 6, which was learned to be true. Mr.
 Swartz, owner of the hotel, identified
 Hendricks, alias Murray, today, and
 said that the man arrived there
 Wednesday afternoon between 5 and
 6 o'clock and left at 7 o'clock the
 following morning. He had ample
 time to walk from Woodland to
 where he was captured by the au-
 thorities of Cowlitz County.
 Hendricks' parents and a married
 sister, who lives in Portland, have
 visited him at the county courthouse.
 The prisoner alleges he was never on
 the North Bank Road, but his mother
 said he came down that way from
 Idaho.

Hendricks was born in Polk Coun-
 ty, Or., and before he was 21 years
 old was sent to prison for stealing
 horses, being released when he was
 21. The second time he was con-
 victed of cracking a safe in the Owl
 saloon at Glendale, and was given
 a five-year term. He was released
 August 25, last.

Hendricks asserts his innocence,
 but will not say more.

PERMANENT ROADS **ASSURED IN COOS**

County Court Plans to Build a Rail-
 road to Stone Quarry Near
 Coquille.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Nov. 20.—De-
 termined in their efforts to build
 permanent roads in Coos County, the
 County Court has decided to make
 use of stone which can be procured
 in the locality. Near Coquille there
 is a quarry where a first class quality
 of stone for roadmaking can be pro-
 cured. The commissioners will build
 a railroad to reach the quarry so
 that the stone can be distributed
 along the roadways and used in mak-
 ing permanent roads. Some of the
 stone used in this county has proved
 to have no lasting value, but the
 stone which will be taken from the
 quarry is of a hard variety, which
 will make a good wearing surface.

Although much money was ex-
 pended last year on the roads of the
 county the main highways between
 Coos Bay and Roseburg are still in
 bad condition. The present move-
 ment for a good highway from Coos
 Bay to Roseburg is being advocated
 by the people in general more than
 ever, and if the commissioners are
 enabled next summer to get rock for
 road building they will probably be
 able to build highways that will with-
 stand the rainy season.
