### NEW TREATY IMPOSSIBLE FOR NEXT FEW MONTHS, ONE DUMA LEADER SAYS.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 20.—Declaring that the adoption of the Salzer resolution abrogating the treaty of 1832 with the United States would have created feeling here of a national collision with that country, Professor Paul Nokolaiyevitch Milukoff, leader of the constitutional and Social Democrats in the duma and one of the most talked of men in Russia, today expressed his views on the abrogation situation. The statesman predicted that the next few months would be filled with anxiety for both Russia and the United States and that it will be impossible to negotiate a new treaty while the present sentiment exists. The members of the opposition in the duma, he said, support the attitude of the United States, but are glad President Taft put the matter through on a diplomatic basis, rather than allowing the Salzer resolution, with its charge that Russia had violated the treaty, to pass.

**Ratification Pleases Taft.**  
NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—A strenuous program which will last until his departure for Washington at midnight tonight greeted President Taft here today. After laying the cornerstone of the new settlement house building for the blind, the President was kept busy receiving visitors from numerous Republican leaders. Tonight he will be the guest of honor at two banquets, being dined by the Automobile Club of America and by the Brooklyn Young Men's Republican Club. President Taft was in high spirits today over the ratification.

### SAYS COUNTRIES BREAK STATE EIGHT HOUR LAW.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 20.—Because of reported violations of the eight-hour law, especially on public works, State Labor Commissioner O. P. Hoff has addressed a letter to all the members of all County Courts in Oregon. There are 102 commissioners and county judges in the state. One reported reason for much of the law breaking along these lines is a false impression among commissioners that to employ men and pay them by the hour makes it legal to work them over the eight hour limit. Commissioner Hoff calls attention to the opinion rendered by the Attorney-General in which it is declared that it is a violation of the law to "permit mechanics or laborers employed by the state or any county to work more than eight hours a day in any calendar month, regardless of whether they are employed by the day, hour or minute."

"Permit me to suggest," writes Commissioner Hoff, "that you send notices to all supervisors, superintendents, etc., for whom you may be responsible, calling attention to this matter. It is my duty as well as yours to see that this law is enforced. The penalty for violation is a fine of \$100 to \$1000 or imprisonment not more than six months, or both."

**Thousands of Mediocre Musicians, But Very Few Positions Open.**  
In the January Woman's Home Companion there are some interesting figures showing the immense number of young people who are encouraged to study music with a view of becoming performers. There are a surprisingly small number of places which these people can fill with financial profit to themselves. Following is an extract from the Companion:

"In the city of Berlin alone there are twenty-five thousand non-German students, mostly American and principally girls. It is estimated that each student spends an average of one thousand dollars a year for living and tuition."

"In New York there are sixteen conservatories of music; in Chicago, eight. It is estimated that in the former city there are more than ten thousand students enrolled in the conservatories and with teachers of recognized standing."

"At the public hearings of applicants for roles during the season at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York City not less than thirty young women are given hearings each week. The majority of these girls have spent small fortunes in European study; and they are absolutely unfitted for operatic work."

"And this, remember, is after they have spent money lavishly with this big teacher or that, always with faith in the ultimate fabulous success of a grand-opera career, a faith that is fostered by the teachers who reap the benefits."

"There are other sides to the story: the girl who borrows money for her music lessons, the girl who is supported by an ambitious patroness, the girl whose education is purchased by pitiful self-denial on the part of her family, all these are familiar types in musical centers of Europe and America. It is high time that the true condition of affairs and the chances of success or failure be looked squarely in the face, both by the girl with a voice and by those who share her faith in it."

Mrs. Mary E. McCall, of Ashland, enjoys the distinction of having been the first grand worthy patron of the grand chapter of Oregon, Order of Eastern Star, Alpha Chapter No. 1, of that ladies' auxiliary of Masonry, was instituted in Ashland in 1880, by officials from the jurisdiction of California. Later a grand chapter for Oregon was organized at a meeting held at Roseburg and Mrs. McCall was elected grand matron. She is one of the widely-known pioneer women of Southern Oregon, while her husband, the late General John M. McCall, for many years was prominent in the business and political affairs of Southern Oregon. Mrs. McCall came to Oregon in 1854. She graduated in 1856 from the Umpqua Academy and taught the first public school opened in Ashland.
