The best basketball game of the season is to be played tonight at Sykes rink between Roseburg High and Ashland High, who arrived this afternoon.

About 50 Juniors and invited guests were assembled at the high school last night. Games played while the Roseburg High School Orchestra furnished some delightful music, after which refreshments were served.

While helping to unload a car of pipe in the railroad yards Friday, J. L. Grimes fell upon a piece of steel in such a manner as to cut a severe gash above his right eye, a heavy piece of pipe falling on him. He is on duty today, however.

New petitions for paving North Jackson street will be presented to the city council Monday night, the specifications being as heretofore published. It is already practically assured that at least 12 blocks will be paved in that part of town this year.

Riley Russell, the aged man who swallowed strychnine at Canyonville three weeks ago, following a stroke of paralysis, died at the county hospital at Edenbower Friday night, January 12, at the age of 78 years. The remains were given burial today.

"Mother Jones," the aged woman, now nearly 80, who has been traveling for years in behalf of laboring men, will deliver an address at the Palace Theater at 2 p. m. tomorrow (Sunday) under auspices of the local shop federation of the Hardman lines. Everybody invited. Admission free.

Five dogs, dead from poisoning were found on Flint street and vicinity this morning. G. W. Keeney found there a piece of ham literally covered with poison, which he burned up. Who the perpetrator was is unknown, but his act was not only reprehensible but dangerous, as some child might have been poisoned as well as the dogs.

About \$2000 in city license fees have already been paid in to the city treasurer since January 1; the largest sum on record. Less than 25 business and professional licenses for the current half year now remain unpaid, so Mayor Meehl announced this morning, and these will probably be turned in without further delay, instead of dragging along for months as in the past. The new administration is getting the city's affairs on a business basis, and will call in \$2000 worth of outstanding warrants and stop interest thereon.

The citizens of Gardiner will vote for the second time on the question of municipal incorporation on February 14, the date fixed by the County Court before adjourning for the term Friday evening. No action was taken by the court on the petition to place the city of Roseburg in an exclusive road district. Although the next regular term does not occur until March, it is likely that the court will hold a special session next month to take up some deferred matters.

LOCAL NEWS.

Hon. J. A. Buchanan returned home from Salem this morning. He says Roseburg's claim is first for the \$20,000 appropriation for this year for building armories, giving final assurance of the erection of a fine armory here this year.

J. S. Elliott, Justice of the Peace of Orchard, Colorado, writes to Sheriff Quinn that F. L. Coziah, alias Foster, the Drain stage robber, was there four years ago. That he drank, gambled, was a cigarette fiend and had a bad reputation generally. He was also suspected of having burned a building there, either carelessly or purposely.

Road Supervisor J. M. Schaeffer went out to Winston's this morning to remove a part of the approaches of the big bridge there. Although this bridge was condemned last fall and is in a dangerous condition, the barriers placed thereon had been removed and some traffic had been passing over it of late, although in danger of disaster at any time. L. A. Dean, Geo. Yokum, Fred Ball, Mrs. Sam Ball, Mrs. W. J. Hill, Misses Mary Crow, Etta Graham, Vera James and Clara Worthington came down from Riddle this afternoon. Most of them came to attend the I. O. O. F. association committee meeting and will return to Myrtle Creek this evening to attend a session of Odd Fellows and Rebekahs there.

Hon. C. E. Ricker, foreman of the grand jury, has had a neat watch charm made of the \$5 gold piece which was taken from him by the Drain stage robbers, and which was so marked as to make its identification positive. It was recovered when the robbers were caught. On one side of the coin Mr. Ricker has had engraved his initials, C. E. R., and the very significant words: "Hands up, Nov. 25, 1911."

Mr. and Mrs. John C. White returned this morning from their Eastern trip. Mr. White says the business hall that usually precedes a Presidential election is now prevalent in the East, with the larger concerns in sharp competition for even enough business to keep their organizations intact. Structural steel, he says, can be bought for a very low price, and on this account he congratulates Douglas County on its decision to build new steel bridges this year. He advises the county build every steel bridge it can afford this year, because the price of steel is sure to advance after the National election. Mr. White does not look for a large immigration of homeseekers next spring, as people are unable to sell their belongings there.

Eugene Guard: That A. Welch's promise to begin construction work on the Eugene extension of the Corvallis & Alsea railway, now the P. E. & E., southward from Monroe, early in the spring, as the weather and condition of the ground will permit, will be kept, is the assurance given a number of Eugene business men while in conversation with them a few days ago in Portland. Mr. Welch informed these men that he had been successful in securing the money on the bonds issued by him on the Corvallis and Monroe line, and he now has the sum of \$1,200,000 at his disposal. He will begin checking out of this sum in a very short time, or just as soon as it is possible to begin throwing up the grade on the new extension. The Guard a short time ago gave publicity to the fact that papers in which it was shown that the Corvallis & Alsea had been bonded for \$1,200,000 were filed for record with the Lane County Clerk. Everything now seems to be in shape for the beginning of construction work and Mr. Welch will do his best to fulfill his many repeated promises to build the electric line to connect Eugene and other western points.
