**46,200 POUNDS OF POWDER;
MILLION TONS OF ROCK.**

TENINO, Wash., Feb. 19.—To shatter and move 2,000,000,000 pounds of sandstone at Quarry No. 2 of the Hercules Sandstone Company, one mile north of Tenino today, 45,000 pounds of black powder and 1200 pounds of dynamite were used.

The blast was fired by a battery touched off by Major J. B. Cavanaugh, of Seattle, in charge of the Government's coast engineering department, at a point 15,000 feet distant. The shock was almost imperceptible a quarter of a mile away, but as the immense bluff was blown loose and the cloud of smoke filled the air, an imposing sight was presented.

Hundreds rushed to the scene to note the effect, which was the piling of monster boulders the size of houses in heaps.

To place the powder and dynamite effectively two tunnels and seven lat-

erals were made and wired. An area 200 feet deep, 150 feet wide and 80 feet high was uncovered.

The purpose was to loosen the seams and make quarrying easier. The stone is to be used on the Grays Harbor Jetty.

Last year 96,000 tons were shipped and this year 40 cars a day will go out.

The mass of stone moved exactly as predicted by the engineers in charge and nobody was injured.
