Portland Oregonian: It plans
 which are being worked out by
 County Commissioner Lightner prove
 to be economical, a new class of
 hard surface roads will be adopted as
 the standard for future roadbuilding
 in Multnomah County, and the
 present macadam roads will be im-
 proved with the product that they
 will be the same as the paved streets
 in the city.
 Tests which have been made have
 demonstrated the practicability of
 the new surfacing, and the only
 thing in the way of its immediate
 adoption is the probable cost. Mr.
 Lightner is preparing a report showing
 the cost of maintaining the present
 macadam roads, and will com-
 pare it with the cost of installing
 the hard surface and maintaining it.
 He says he expects the figures to
 show the hard surface proposition to
 be economical as well as desirable.
Asphalt Coating Proposed.
 The material is being used
 at present on a highway running be-

between Seattle and Tacoma, where
 formerly was a macadam road. The
 plan is to use the macadam as a
 foundation for a surface coating of
 asphalt, a trifle thinner than the sur-
 facing on the paved streets of the
 city. This surface, it is said, will
 last at least eight years, and will
 reduce the cost of repairs to such
 an extent that it will mean a saving
 to the county.

The present macadam roads give
 way to strain of speeding automob-
 iles to such an extent that repair
 bills run high each month. These
 bills totaled for five years show that
 the hard surface would be a financial
 saving as well as a means of improv-
 ing the roads not only for automob-
 iles but for team traffic.

Commissioner Lightner says a
 Portland company has agreed to
 furnish a mixing plant, the tools,
 experts to superintend the work, and
 the bitumen used in the surfacing,
 for 55 cents a yard. The county
 would be required to furnish the
 crushed rock and the labor. It has
 been estimated that the total cost
 would be less than \$1 a yard for the
 surfacing.

Plan is Studied.
 "I have given the proposition care-
 ful study," said Commissioner Light-
 ner yesterday, "and I believe it can
 be made a success. The object is
 to provide the county with the best

roads possible. This is to accom-
 modate the farmers, haulers of
 freight and autoists. Our present
 macadam roads are filling the bill
 to perfection, but there is much ex-
 pense necessary in repairs which
 could be avoided if there were a
 hard-surface coating over the ma-
 cadam. I believe that if the county
 should adopt the proposition and
 build this class of roads it would
 be but a short time before other
 counties followed the same course."

Specifications which are being con-
 sidered by Commissioner Lightner
 and other members of the County
 Court show the following:

Surface to Be Rolled.
 The portion of the roadway to be
 improved shall be excavated or filled
 to the necessary depth below the
 established grade of the finished
 roadway, to provide for the thickness
 of the foundation and Warrentite sur-
 face and thoroughly rolled with a
 heavy steam roller until the surface
 of the subgrade is solid, and approxi-
 mately parallel to the proposed sur-
 face of the finished roadway.

Any soft, springy places not af-
 fording a firm foundation shall be
 dug out and refilled with suitable
 material as the engineer, supervisor
 or commissioner may direct, and re-
 rolled to the proper grade, such ex-
 tra excavation and refilling to be
 paid for at actual reasonable cost
 of labor and material, plus 15 per
 cent. All excavated material shall
 be disposed of by the contractor.

After the sub-grade has been com-
 pleted and passed the inspection of
 the engineer, supervisor or commis-
 sioner, the foundation of broken
 stone consisting of stone that will
 pass through a ring three inches in
 diameter and be retained on a ring
 1 1/2 inches in diameter, shall be de-
 posited in a uniform layer having a
 depth of six inches and rolled re-
 peatedly with a ten-ton standard
 steam macadam roller until com-
 pacted to the satisfaction of the en-
 gineer, supervisor or commissioner.

Pieces of stone larger than above
 specified may be used, provided they
 are separated and laid in a layer at
 the bottom of the foundation and
 the surface dressed with stone of the
 sizes above specified.

The depth of loose stone in this
 course must be measured by blocks
 the required thickness of said loose
 stone. These blocks must be placed
 at frequent intervals and the loose
 stone when being spread.

Stone Screenings Spread.
 After thorough rolling of the foun-
 dation, a quantity of stone screenings
 shall be spread in a uniform layer,
 and the whole rolled until the stone
 ceases to sink or creep in front of
 the roller. The quantity and quality
 of this binder is subject to the
 approval of the engineer, super-
 visor or commissioner. Gravel found
 along the line of the road or fur-
 nished by the contractor, of a quality
 approved by the engineer, supervisor
 or commissioner, may be used instead
 of the stone screenings as a binder.

No binder shall be applied in suffi-
 cient quantity to completely cover
 or form a coating upon this course
 of stone, but the angular particles
 of stone in the first course shall pro-
 trude above the binder, making an
 angular surfaced foundation to form
 a bond for the Warrentite surface.

Upon the foundation prepared, as
 above described, shall be spread two
 inches of Warrentite surface paving
 mixture, which shall consist of:

1. Stone (with or without the
 addition of sand) so graded and in
 such proportions as to give the wear-
 ing surface a useful degree of den-
 sity, rigidity, inherent stability and
 freedom from voids.

2. Warrentite cement, sufficient
 in quantity to coat each particle and
 fill the voids remaining between the
 stones.

The properly proportioned materi-
 als shall be combined at tempera-
 tures consistent with thorough mix-
 ing.

After the surface mixture has been
 brought to the proper grade, it shall
 be thoroughly rolled with a steam
 roller.

Upon this rolled surface shall be
 spread by suitable spreading machine
 enough Warrentite flush coat com-
 position to fill all superficial voids.
 Upon this flush coating, fine
 gravel, sand or stone screenings
 shall be spread in sufficient quantity
 to cover the flush coating.

Each layer of the work shall be
 kept as free as possible from dirt, so
 that it will unite with the succeeding
 layer.
