MOOSE BUILDING

Site Purchased For a Fine Four-Story Structure

NATATORIUM IN BASEMENT

Lodge, Business and Club Rooms—80 by 100-foot Structure to Cost \$65,000

A splendid four-story business and lodge building is to be erected in Roseburg in the very near future, according to plans outlined at the regular meeting Tuesday evening of Roseburg Lodge No. 1027, Loyal Order of Moose. Acting upon the report of the building committee, the lodge voted unanimously to purchase the grounds, 80 by 100 feet, fronting on Jackson, Douglas and Main streets, opposite the Hotel McCallen, as the site for this building. The building committee had secured temporary options on this property, and they and the lodge trustees were authorized to go ahead and complete the purchase of the same, the consideration being stated at \$10,000.

As a summary of the results of their investigation of the 12 or 15 sites offered, the committee reported the following:

Selection of Site. That the proposition offered by Alpha Lodge No. 47 K. of P. for the

HART'S TOGGERY.

North Half of lot number (4), block nineteen (19), in the City of Roseburg, for the sum of five thousand dollars, and the proposition of August Schlemm for the adjoining lot for five thousand dollars, appears to your committee to be the best proposition submitted for the following reasons:

That said property faces upon three paved streets, to-wit: Jackson, Douglas and Main, having a frontage of 80 feet on both Jackson and Main and a frontage of 101 or 102 feet on Douglas Street. That said property is in the business district, surrounded by cement walks, free from encumbrance, and is especially desirable for lodge and business purposes.

It has been stated and generally conceded that when this lodge erects a building it is the purpose and intention to erect one that will earn revenue commensurate with the expenditure. It has also been discussed and generally understood that if the lodge does build a home that in addition to the lodge rooms and business rooms, it is the intention to construct and have in connection a natatorium or swimming tank. With that point in view it is our judgment that no other piece of property in Roseburg is so desirable as the K. of P. property and the adjoining Schlemm property.

That if the proposition of the swimming pool is proposed according to the intention of the members of this lodge there is no other property from which sewer connection can be made for draining the swimming tank without the necessity of installing a pumping plant. That the sewer running down the center of Main Street is eight feet below the surface; that if the swimming tank is constructed according to the present plans, it will necessitate an excavation of approximately twenty feet bringing the bottom of the tank twelve feet below the sewer line in Main Street. That in order to make sewer connections from the bottom of the tank for drainage purposes it is only necessary to run a sewer across Douglas and down Main Street to approximately the lower line of the Court House yard.

We would therefore recommend that the lodge proceed to close a deal for the Schlemm and K. of P. property according to the proposition submitted by them.

Upon further investigation, we find that we can construct a modern up-to-date, four story, pressed brick building, do the excavation, install the swimming tank, construct three store rooms on the ground floor, establish a natatorium (together with a gymnasium in connection), dressing rooms, barber shop in front with the floor, marble steps, private baths, elevator to the upper floors, lodge room, club room and furnishings and office rooms, and bachelors apartments; together with kitchen and banquet hall; for about the sum of sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000.00).

That we believe the necessary funds can be readily raised by a sale of stock, subscription to be made principally by the members of the Lodge.

OAKLAND CREAMERY RAVAGED BY FIRE

OAKLAND, Or., Aug. 21.—Fire early this morning partly destroyed the Oakland Creamery, owned and operated by

Blaisdell Brothers. Insurance of \$5,000 probably covers all of the loss, which is chiefly confined to the engine room, where the fire apparently originated. The roof of the building was nearly all burned off and the butter-making equipment was considerably damaged.

That the plant was not wholly destroyed is due to the prompt response to the alarm, sounded at 2:30 o'clock. Within 20 minutes afterwards, the flames were gotten under control. Blaisdell Brothers bought the plant about one year ago and it was a flourishing institution. Arrangements have been made to divert the cream deliveries by local farmers to the creamery at Roseburg.

VETO IS REPEATED

Taft Clings to Commerce Court And Barely Wins Out

OVERRIDE BY HOUSE AGAIN

Senate, H. W. V. Fails to Produce Two Thirds Vote Needed—P. R. T. Tells Old Story

(Special to the Evening Review). WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—For the second time within a week, President Taft today vetoed the budget bill because it contained a provision abolishing the Court of Commerce. Again the House passed the bill over the veto and again the Senate sustained the veto.

Members of congress told President Taft beforehand that his veto would be overridden, but the President refused to recede from his original position. His message on the subject today was only ten lines in length. It called attention to the objections of the President as stated in his first message on the matter.

The vote in the House to override the veto was 154 to 53 in favor of the affirmative, 22 Republicans voting with the Democrats. It was confidently expected that the measure would also pass the Senate, but it failed by 7 votes. Thirty-four senators voted in favor of the bill, as against 27 in the negative, but under the two-thirds rule it required a total of 41 votes in the affirmative to enact the bill.

Antagonism to the Commerce Court developed out of its clashes with the Interstate Commerce Commission in matters of national importances.

PENROSE EXPLAINING (?) THE WHY OF THAT \$25,000 CHECK

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Rising to the question of personal privilege, Senator Boies Penrose, of Pennsylvania, today told the Senate the circumstances of the sending to him of a check for \$25,000 by John D. Archbold of the Standard Oil Co. The galleries were packed when Penrose started speaking.

The alleged transaction has been made the basis of general charges that Senator Penrose accepted financial aid from Archbold about the time of the Presidential campaign of 1904, and that the money received was used in connection with that campaign and Theodore Roosevelt's election.

USELESS CEREMONY ENACTED AT SHERMAN'S HOME

UTICA, N. Y., Aug. 21.—James B. Sherman was officially notified today of his nomination by the Republican National Convention for Vice-President. Senator Sutherland, of Utah, delivered the notification address. Sherman responded briefly.

NOMINATION OF HOWARD STIRS PEOPLE TO ANGER

Senate Will Be Asked to Reject Corporation Tool Named to Succeed Hanford.

Washington, Aug. 21.—A stubborn fight to prevent the confirmation by the senate of the nomination of Clinton W. Howard of Bellingham, to succeed Cornelius H. Hanford, as federal judge for the western district of Washington, will be made by progressive members of the upper house of congress.

"The people of Washington," said Senator Miles Polindexter, "objects to Howard's appointment and that is the reason I am opposed to him. He is affiliated with and controlled by the same interest that corrupted Hanford. He was a lobbyist for the interests before the state legislature."

Howard is counsel for the Great Northern Railway company, the Stone-Webster Tractor company, the Bellingham Bay Improvement company and other corporations. In his work for the corporation Howard has not only been legal counsel in the courts, but also has been their chief lobbyist before the legislature and the city council of Bellingham.

William J. Biggar, of Bellingham, candidate for congress on the progressive party ticket, this morning wired to Senator Polindexter, of this state, to the effect that Howard's appointment is an "outrageous insult" to the people, and that it ought not to be confirmed by the senate under any circumstances.

Seattle progressives are equally aroused. Plans are now being discussed to arrange for a monster protest meeting against the confirmation of Howard's appointment by the senate.

Whatcom Protests, Too.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Aug. 21.—Whatcom county is aroused over the appointment of Clinton W. Howard of Bellingham, as successor to C. H. Hanford, who was forced off the federal bench by congressional investigation. A mass meeting to protest against his confirmation by the senate is being arranged here.

NEGRO MAY HAVE KILLED MILDRED GREEN; SUSPECT SEEN BY S. P. BRAKEMAN

No trace has yet been found of the unknown negro suspected of the heinous murder of 12-year-old Mildred Green at her home in Eugene Monday night. The only information obtained by the authorities in regard to the negro was furnished by R. Morgan, a Southern Pacific brakeman, who arrived in Roseburg from Eugene Tuesday night on a work train.

He said that just as the train was pulling out of the Eugene yards a little after 6 o'clock in the morning, a negro came dashing down the track from the west and attempted to get aboard. The train was already in motion, and the man was unable to catch it. He chased it down the track for some distance, finally giving it up and dodging to one side, where he hid under a warehouse. Mr. Morgan says that he is positive that he can identify the negro if he should see him again. He has returned to Eugene.

Disturbed at the awful crime that took his child from him a few years after his wife had died, and bemoaning his thoughtlessness in having left his daughter to sleep alone in the isolated part of the house, Rev. R. A. Green, father of the murdered girl, is nearly prostrated, moaning and muttering lamentations for himself and prayers of mercy for the murderer.

The three other children, now visiting in St. Louis, have been sent for.

Miss Kathryn Dunham left for Medford this morning where she will teach in the public schools the coming year, beginning Sept. 2.

SOUTH UMPQUA IDEAL FOR BLACK BASS PROPAGATION

Deputy Fish Warden To Recommend Planting Them Here—Batch of Trout Fry Released.

The likelihood of black bass being planted in the South Umpqua River is again strong, after the discouraging statement made here two weeks ago by Deputy Fish Warden R. E. Clanton. Local anglers who have been trying to secure bass for the river here received substantial encouragement today from another deputy warden, Thomas J. Craig, who was sent here by Chief Warden Finley to plant trout fry in the North Umpqua. Mr. Craig, after an investigation of conditions, declared himself emphatically in favor of supplying the South Umpqua with bass and will make an unqualified recommendation to that effect to Mr. Finley.

Clanton when here expressed himself opposed to planting bass in the South Umpqua, not because he thought the stream was not adapted for their propagation, but because he feared they would migrate into the North Umpqua and exterminate the trout, as they are doing in other rivers. Craig declares that bass will not inhabit a stream as cold as the North Umpqua. Furthermore, he declared, the North Umpqua affords neither proper food for bass nor the right kind of places for spawning grounds. The South Umpqua, on the other hand, affords both. In fact, the South Umpqua River is the best stream in the state for the propagation of bass, according to Mr. Craig.

Mr. Craig today released 186,000 trout fry of the Rainbow and brook varieties. Some of them were planted in Deer Creek, but the bigger part went into the North Umpqua, up as far as Rock Creek, where 39,000 alone were planted.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—Eva Booth, commander of the Salvation Army in the United States, when officially notified of the death of her father, General William Booth, in London yesterday, at the age of 83, will open a sealed packet held at the headquarters here, a duplicate of which is in London, which designates a successor to General Booth. Many believe she will be the successor.
