Oregon Bull Moosers are doing everything they can to lessen Roosevelt's vote in the state in November by putting state and district tickets in the field. Roosevelt has a political right to oppose Taft for the Presidency so far as Oregon is concerned, because he received a greater vote at the primaries. At those same primaries the people also expressed their preference for candidates for minor offices on the Democratic and Republican tickets. That they will desert such candidates at the November election to support the so-called Progressive band of office-seekers is hardly within reason. Furthermore, the ill-timed ambitions of these minor candidates will surely cost Roosevelt many a vote that he received last April. Jonathan Bourne seems to be about the only prominent Oregon supporter of Roosevelt who has wisdom enough to abide by the primaries in order to not impair the chances of the National standard bearer. Bourne was beaten fairly by Ben Selling through an election law which he, himself, was largely instrumental in enacting. For him to run again for the Senate would be rank inconsistency. Bourne, however, owes no apology for his record in the Senate. It is a record that merited his re-nomination by his party.

PEREGRINATIONS NO. 4.

(In Canada).

Despite its unpropitious cognomen, Moose Jaw is a neat, ambitious and thriving young city of nearly 15,000 inhabitants. It has broad paved streets and large modern buildings with evidences of growth on every side. Here is the headquarters of upwards of 800 of the Mounted Police of Northwestern Canada—a semi-military organization, combining therewith the duties of government marshals as well as the detective service. From Moose Jaw great fields of wheat stretch away in every direction, and when crops are good, as they are this year, these bring to immense wealth. Farming here is on a broad scale, cultivation being done with plows often coupled together in large gangs and drawn by traction engines. Harvesting likewise is done with gasoline or oil engines, a single tractor operating four binders with far better speed and regularity than could be done with horses. This also saves a great expense for the care of teams and equipment and the employment of men to handle them. As it is, an army of men is needed for shocking, threshing and hauling the grain to the railroads. In this region the farms are large and two crops will bring a fortune to the owner. Or, settling this, however, is the very discouraging factor that only one crop in three, on the average, proves a success. This is from a variety of causes. Lack of seasonable rains often causes a crop failure. At other times a downpour comes when the grain is nearly ready to cut and most of the crop is lost. Again a cold wave may sweep down from the broad ocean extending toward the Arctic regions and bring a chilling frost before the wheat is ripened, ruining it for milling purposes.

Moose Jaw has a number of large banks, as well as other business institutions. Several railroads also radiate from here. The town is building rapidly and substantially and already it appears to be "the Winnipeg of the Saskatchewan." Between here and Winnipeg the chief towns are Regina and Brandon. The latter is about the same size as Moose Jaw and has attained much commendable recognition from abroad from its

summer and winter fairs, when highly creditable exhibits are made of livestock, agricultural products, local manufactures, etc. During the continuance of the last fair 100,000 visitors was the record of admissions. This is also a live railway center and the Canadian Northern system is erecting here a combined hotel and depot costing \$500,000.

Regina is now a city of upwards of 30,000 people and is the capital of the Province of Saskatchewan. This is also in the great wheat and livestock country. In 1911 the wheat produced by this Province was worth about \$65,000,000 to the farmers, and the total farm products for last year were valued at \$120,000,000. Is it any wonder that towns become cities in a decade, or that banks are everywhere? Railroads are building in every direction and the Canadian Pacific is being double tracked from Winnipeg to Moose Jaw and on toward the Rocky Mountains.

Winnipeg was reached at 7:30 a. m. Sunday, the train pulling in through the great system of shops and yards of the Canadian Pacific. These yards alone include more than 125 miles of railway tracks. A few blocks from this depot the Grand Trunk Pacific, Canadian Northern and the Great Northern Railways also have a splendid modern union depot. This great stone structure overlooks the confluence of the Assiniboine River with the Red River of the North. Here was the site of old Fort Garry, once a trading post of the Hudson Bay Company up to within a generation ago. Since then there has sprung up here the premier city of Canada West, now claiming a population of 175,000, or even more. Here are 50 miles of broad paved streets, where modern skyscraper buildings of 10 to 15 stories rise on every hand. There are 23 banks within immense aggregate of capital and upwards of 700 branches in other cities and towns of Canada. From here reach out 22 railway tracks, giving transportation to all the chief business centers of North America. Steamers also ply daily on the Red River, reaching Lake Winnipeg some 60 miles away. That great inland sea is a body of water having a shore line of over 1000 miles. Winnipeg claims to be the greatest grain market of North America, the record here the past year being 100,000,000 bushels. The city owns the water and street lighting systems and its own asphalt paving plant. Some idea of its remarkable building growth is shown by a record of over \$15,000,000 in 1910 and \$17,250,000 in 1911. For the first seven months of 1912 the aggregate was \$14,500,000, indicating a total of over \$22,000,000 this year.

A very cordial reception was accorded the Sovereign Grand Lodge I. O. O. F., addresses of welcome being given by Premier Roblin, of the Province of Manitoba, Mayor Wagh, of Winnipeg, as well as by the Provincial grand officers of the order. On Tuesday afternoon the Lieutenant Governor gave a reception to the visitors at his official residence. On Monday evening Grand Sire Cockburn held a reception, assisted by the other grand officers, at the Royal Alexandra Hotel. Lodge sessions and degree work will occupy the week, with a big parade Wednesday afternoon. As usual, all the jurisdictions on the North American continent are represented and the annual reports show an excellent growth of this "the greatest fraternal order in the world," now numbering upwards of two millions of men and women.

ROGUE RIVER BARTLETT'S BRING \$3.15 IN GOTHAM.

Madison Tribune: The top prices for Rogue River Bartlett pears this year were received September 17 on the New York market when \$3.15 were paid for fruit shipped by D. R. Hill of this valley. The sale was made through the Producers Fruit Company.

The company reports the sale of three cars. The first grossed \$1351 being a car made up of shipments from various orchards. Prices ranged from \$2.60 to \$2.90. The second car grossed \$1449, and was loaded with Hill fruit. Prices ranged from \$2.70 to \$3.15 a box. The third car, mostly from the Daggett orchard, grossed \$1541. Prices averaged \$3.05.

The Producers Fruit Company, hoping to duplicate the success of last year, has shipped four cars of Rogue to Glasgow via Montreal. They met with remarkable success in that market a year ago and hope to do better this year.

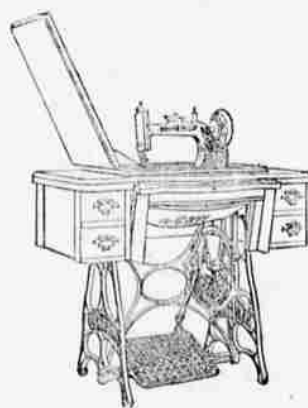
GENERAL NEWS.

OREGON NEWS.

R. A. Booth, of Eugene, was elected president of the Oregon Methodist Church official body at the annual session in Ashland Friday.

A reduction of 25 cents a barrel on patent flour takes effect today. The cut is due to the decline in the price of wheat. The new quotation, \$4.40 per barrel, is the lowest for several years. A year ago patents were selling at \$4.50, two years ago today the price was \$3.35, three years ago \$5.10 and four years ago it was \$4.70. The highest Northwestern flour price in recent years was \$6.35 a barrel, current in January, 1910.

The annual report of the Presbyterian Church, just issued, gives the following statistics of the Oregon Synod: Presbyteries, 5; ministers, 153; churches, 149; communicants, 13,985; Sunday school members, 16,623.
