WAR MAY SPREAD

Austria and Russia Prepare to Cheat Balkans of Spoils

TURKS LOSE ON ALL SIDES

Chicago Mob Hugs Colored Dummy as Warning to Jack Johnson, who Keeps in Hiding

(Special to the Evening Review).

LONDON, Oct. 21.—A gigantic war involving all Europe, instigated by the clash between Austria and Russia, is the alarming prediction of Kaimil Pasha, president of the Turkish council. In today's issue of the London Chronicle, Lloyd's Insurance Agency today is charging 15 per cent for insurance against war within six months between Russia and Austria. Both countries are standing ready to grab desirable Turkish territory that might be available from the Balkan wars.

An Athens dispatch to the Telegraph says that after a preliminary artillery duel between the Greeks and 6000 Turks at Ellassona, the Greek infantry charged repeatedly and finally dislodged the Turks, capturing their siege guns.

Crown Prince Constantine was in personal command and received a baptism of fire. The Greek troops showed great courage. Their losses were small.

The Turks retired toward Sarandapora Pass, where the main forces had concentrated. The Greeks occupy all the heights to the north of Ellassona and a decisive battle is imminent.

The Serbian army, under the Crown Prince, has captured Rulja Heights, a strategic position south of Bajano Ratz, some miles below Vranja.

An official report from the general staff at Nish says the Serbians have taken all the trenches in the Turkish territory around Vranja and the Turks have been driven across Morava Valley.

The Bulgarian forces operating against Adrianople have driven the Turks to the forts forming the outer line of the defenses. They took 100 prisoners.

The general advance of the Bulgarians continues. Several positions on the heights were taken at the bayonet point. In the villages the Turks are selling Bulgarian officials and holding them for ransom.

The Montenegrin forces captured the town of Plava yesterday. The battle lasted two days.

An investment of the Turkish military from the entrance to the Gulf

of Asia to Port Goumenitsa has been proclaimed by the Greek government.

JACK JOHNSON HUNG IN EFFIGY; STAYS IN HIDING.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—Following a night of seclusion on Jack Johnson's part, the negro pugilist fearing assassination, a mob here this morning strung up a black faced dummy bearing a placard with the words "This is what we will do to Jack Johnson." The police dispersed the crowd, but left the dummy hanging.

Federal Attorney Wilkerson this morning uttered a curt refusal to the offer that Johnson would furnish bail in any amount to effect the release from jail of 19-year-old Lucile Cameron, the white girl whom Johnson is accused of abducting and who is being detained as a witness against the negro, who will face a charge of white slavery.

Johnson kept himself carefully secluded yesterday, presumably in rooms above his cafe, and his bodyguard stationed in the saloon below and at his mother's residence, turned all questioners away with a statement that Johnson would see no one. Telephone calls failed to bring him to the instrument.

Following his rough experiences Saturday afternoon, when a mob of 1000 persons threatened to lynch him, Johnson realizes that his life is not safe here at any time.

He has received many warnings by telephone, by letter and personal messengers to the effect that plans are being made to kill him. These plans are openly discussed on cars, in saloons and everywhere that men congregate and everybody believes that Johnson will be assassinated.

Mayor Harrison says he is seeking some sort of legal excuse that will permit him to close up Johnson's cafe and drive him from the city.

The authorities realize that if Johnson is assassinated or an attempt made to kill him, it will precipitate a race war that will be extremely difficult to handle, not alone in this city, but in other places where "bad" negroes have been especially obnoxious since the Reno affair.

Johnson's friends, realizing the designs upon his life, are urging him to forfeit his \$1500 bond to the Government in the Lucile Cameron case and flee to Europe, as they fear he would not be safe anywhere in this country at present.

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 21.—Twenty-five hundred Detroit Y. M. C. A. members and their friends rose to their feet yesterday and tumultuously applauded Brother T. Washington when he declared that pugilist Jack Johnson should be repudiated by all right-thinking negroes, in view of his recent Chicago exploits.

"It is unfortunate," he said, "that a man with money should use it in a way to injure his own people with those who are seeking to uplift his race and improve its condition."

ENGINEERS HAVE CLOSE CALL FOR THEIR LIVES.

MCANAGAL NOT LIKELY TO GO ON STAND THIS WEEK.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 21.—There was little possibility when the trial of 47 laborers was resumed today that Gerie McAnagal would testify this week.

Federal Attorney Miller plans to conclude the preliminary evidence before calling the dynamiter-informant. He intimated that the Government plans to read 500 more letters before McAnagal is placed on the stand.

Mary Day, a stenographer, resumed this morning the identification of various letters by labor leaders in connection with the McAnagal case.

LEAVES FOR HOME

"I Had a Good Time Here," Parting Words of Roosevelt

WAVES HIS HAT AT CROWDS

Thos. F. Ryan Contributed \$400,000 to Parker Campaign "To Save Party From Disgrace"

(Special to the Evening Review).

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—Colonel Roosevelt started for Oyster Bay over the Pennsylvania line this morning. He was forced to walk a few steps from the hospital to an automobile. He reached his private car exhausted, but waved his hat and smiled at the crowds.

The Colonel is accompanied by Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Ethel, Theodore, Jr., Doctors Alexander, Lambert and Scurry Terrell, and Secretaries McGrath and Martin. The special correspondent's car is ahead of the Roosevelt car.

Roosevelt was escorted to the train by 30 uniformed and plain clothes men, with 10 motorcycle officers riding ahead. Leaving the hospital, he shook hands with the Sisters, nurses and newspapermen and said:

"I had a good time here. You may not believe it, but I did."

CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Thomas F. Ryan, the New York financier, was the first witness today before the Senate campaign contributions committee. He gave his occupation as a "farmer." He testified that in 1904 he opposed the nomination of Judge Alton B. Parker, favoring Senator Arthur P. Gorman, of Maryland. After the nomination, he testified, the adherents of Parker asked him to contribute.

"I contributed \$50,000 and later gave small amounts to the extent of \$100,000," said Ryan. "Toward the end of the campaign the committee said the campaign for Parker would collapse unless more funds were secured. Just before the end of the campaign I contributed \$300,000 to pay election debts. The result was that at the end of the campaign every party debt was paid. I contributed because I did not want to see the party disintegrated and disgraced. Every dollar was from me individually; not one dollar from a corporation or business interest."

George W. Perkins, of New York, was the next witness. He said his occupation was that of a retired workman, adding: "At present I am working 18 hours a day to secure an eight-hour law." He declared he did not know how the Republican campaign fund of 1904 was raised, although he alone contributed \$50,000 and \$75,000 for the same.

CANDIDATE WOULD CLEAR NAME BEFORE ELECTION DAY.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Oct. 21.—The alleged character assassination of Robert T. Hodge, Progressive candidate for Governor, were this morning given an opportunity to prove their case against him before election day. In the court, Wm. J. Biggar, Hodge's attorney, who brought four libel suits against the Bellingham Herald for \$70,000 damages, formally asked the management of the paper to waive time and immediately proceed to trial. According to law, the paper has 29 days in which to file an answer to the complaint and could by delay postpone the case until after election. The Herald and Samuel Perkins, National Republican com-

mitteeman from the state, attacked the private life of Hodge.

EQUALIZATION BOARD OF DOUGLAS COUNTY HEARING PETITIONS.

The Douglas County Board of Equalization met in County Assessor F. L. Calkins' office in the court house this morning and will continue in session for several days to receive and act on petitions for reductions in assessments. Up till noon today, petitions had been filed by the following:

Sutherland Fruit Growers' Association.—Objects to assessment of \$50 an acre on various tracts of land, because adjoining lands of like character are assessed at from \$25 to \$40 an acre.

H. M. Watkins.—Objects to assessment of \$1720 on NE 1/4 sec 32, 32-8, because \$1400 is the best offer he can get. Thinks \$1000 would be a fair valuation.

Mary C. Wells.—Objects to assessment of \$1000 on two unimportant lots in Drain which bring no revenue. Says they can't be sold for \$1000 and that \$500 would be a reasonable valuation.

Robert Connor.—Assessed at \$3300 for 160 acres at Millwood. Asks reduction to \$3000.

Ralph B. Krasche.—Has 160 acres in section 18, 26-7, assessed at \$1820. Asks for reduction to \$720.

E. H. Smith.—Has 80 acres in section 34, 27-4, assessed at \$510. Asks reduction to \$240.

Ryan H. Conant.—Has 160 acres in section 24, 25-8, which he says should be assessed at the minimum value of waste land because timber on the land is not marketable.

L. J. Klink.—Asks for reduction in assessment on 120 acres of section 16, 27-3, from \$1750 to \$1200.

Mrs. J. W. Johnson.—Owns lot 5, 2nd R. E. Add. to Roseburg, assessed at \$500. Alleges real value does not exceed \$400.

B. J. Shinabarger.—Has 160 acres section 12, 27-2, assessed at \$2820. Asks reduction to \$2000.

Nels Nelson.—Has 160 acres section 12, 27-2, assessed at \$2545. Asks reduction in assessment to \$2000.

Alfred T. Signs.—Owns timber claim in section 6, 33-4, on which she asks reduction in assessment to \$1081.50.

Mrs. Emma J. Pape.—Objects to \$600 valuation placed on improvement on her land and asks reduction to \$200, last year's assessment, which she says is the true value.

W. H. Graham.—Owns 160 acres section 34, 30-2, assessed at \$1310. Asks reduction to \$1000.

W. J. Moon.—Owns lots 19 and 20, block 31, Kinney's Addition to Roseburg, which contained a residence recently destroyed by fire. Petitioner asks cancellation of assessment for the residence and states he has already sustained a loss of \$1500 above insurance.

Mary E. Lieberman.—Wants 151 acres in section 20, 22-6, reduced in valuation to \$1000, the alleged actual market value.

Minnie Kabat.—Owns lands in sections 12, 30-9, and 22, 21-9, assessed for \$2470, which is alleged to be in excess of actual cash values.

Harvey Smith.—Owns part of section 24, 24-7, on which he asks assessment reduction to \$1000 or less.

O. A. Ritan.—Owns NE 1/4 section 10, 21-7. Claims assessment of \$4,075 is too high and disproportionate.

Adolph Haberly.—Objects to present assessment on 148 acres sec 18, 22-1, placed at \$1675, which he claims exceed the market value.

PERKINS BUILDING MAY ADD 3 STORIES.

J. W. Perkins has been in conference with Portland architects regarding the feasibility of adding three more stories to the fine Perkins building in this city. This building was so constructed that the present foundation, walls, etc., have plenty of strength to carry an additional three stories, so Mr. Perkins is assured by the architects. This would give it a height of seven stories and double the present number of office rooms. The present heating plant would suffice for the additional stories but the elevator capacity would be doubled. Estimates on the cost of three more stories have already been made, but nothing further than this will probably be done before next spring. Mr. Perkins anticipates great development in this portion of Oregon in the near future and believes that Roseburg will be a central feature in the coming growth.

NEW MOOSE BUILDING COMMITTEES AT WORK.

At the last meeting of the Roseburg Moose lodge a special committee of about 20 members was appointed to work with the building committee in securing subscriptions of stock in the big Moose building to be erected in this city. The members of the lodge will first be called upon to subscribe for one or more shares of stock and when this is done no difficulty is anticipated in placing the remainder, if any, of the 2000 shares. As this stock is payable at the rate of only one dollar per month per share, and as it will draw interest at the rate of 7 per cent from the date it is paid up, there should be no difficulty in getting the whole amount subscribed at an early date. As soon as this stock is subscribed active steps will be taken toward the erection of the building. Each committee has already chosen several assistants to help along with the work.
