The War Department has sent a statement to the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce that it cannot consider making a new survey of Coos bay harbor to include the rebuilding of the jetty. The bar dredge must first be tried out. It is stated, and the sum of \$150,000 offered by the port commission to help pay for the jetty work is regarded as small, as the jetty would cost about \$2,000,000 and the south jetty asked for will require more than a quarter million. The commerce of the port, it is stated, does not warrant the expenditure.
