About 15,000 Black Bass fry were "planted" yesterday in the South Umpqua River above the Roseburg dam and at the Sheffield place above Shady Point. These fish are from the Columbia River and were brought here by the Oregon Fish and Game Commission at the request of local fishermen. It is thought that they will thrive in the South Umpqua but will probably not enter the colder and swifter water of the North Umpqua and will not disturb the trout in the latter stream. The Bass are more inclined to sloughs and sluggish water.
