STATE GOVERNORS WHO BECAME PRESIDENTS.

The Governorship of a state appears to be one of the degrees essential to the final degree as President of the United States. The history of those who have filled the Presidential office is of interest along this line. Of the 26 acting Presidents and one who was counted out, the great Samuel J. Tilden, these have been Governors:

Thomas Jefferson twice served as Governor of Virginia, during the Revolutionary War. Twenty-six years later he became President. James Monroe served as Governor of the future birthplace of Presidents, and six years after he finished his term, took the oath of office as President of the United States. Martin Van Buren was Governor of New York, and after six years had elapsed became the Nation's President. William Henry Harrison was appointed to the Governorship of Indiana Territory, and forty years later took up his duties as President. John Tyler, who became President upon the death of William Henry Harrison, was 15 years before succeeding to the Presidency. Governor of Virginia. James K. Polk was elected Governor of Virginia in 1839, and President five years later. Andrew Johnson, the Democrat who was nominated for Vice-President with Lincoln at the time the regular Republicans were opposing Lincoln's nomination, was Governor of Tennessee eight years

before he succeeded to the Presidency. In 1872 Rutherford B. Hayes was elected Governor of Ohio over William Allen, which victory led to his nomination for President, but there are millions who agree with me that he never was elected to the Presidency. He filled the office nevertheless. Samuel J. Tilden, who was elected to the Presidency over Rutherford B. Hayes, but was counted out, was Governor of New York. Grover Cleveland, whom many contend was not elected to the Presidency in 1884, was elected Governor of New York in 1882, defeating Folger, the Republican nominee, by 209,000. Benjamin Harrison was a candidate for Governor of Indiana in 1876, but was defeated by "Blue Jeans" Williams. Twelve years later he distanced Grover Cleveland in the electoral college race and became President March 4, 1889. William McKinley was elected Governor of Ohio in 1891 and again in 1893, and in 1897 succeeded Grover Cleveland to the Presidency. Theodore Roosevelt, who has just made the most remarkable race ever run by a third party candidate, went from the Governorship of New York to the Vice-Presidency and succeeded to the Presidency in 1901. Mr. Taft was made Governor of Philippine Territory by ex-Governor Theodore Roosevelt, then President, and in 1908 succeeded Theodore Roosevelt in the White House. It may be mentioned that Mr. Taft, like his predecessor, has recently established a third party record. Thus we arrive at the year 1912 and we find Woodrow Wilson, a native of Virginia and Governor of New Jersey chosen to the Presidency, while for Vice-President is Tom Marshall, a native of Indiana, present Governor of his native state. And in the second political party in the race is found ex-Governor Theodore Roosevelt, of New York, the nominee for the Presidency, and Hiram Johnson, a native of California, and Governor of his native state, the Vice-Presidential nominee. Possibly in all this list there are only three whose Governorship led them directly to the White House prior to 1912, these three being Hayes, Cleveland and McKinley. Virginia and Ohio are good states in which to be born if one has Presidential aspirations. Some of these Governors believe that they were born through their own efforts.

MISSOURI LAYING CONTEST.

We have arrived at the last month of the first year in the National Egg Laying Contest at Mountain Grove, Mo. The year closes Oct. 31, and no variety is yet far enough in the lead to claim the honors for the year. The second contest begins Nov. 15th, and so much interest is being taken in this contest that all pens were filled nearly two months in advance of that date.

The best record for September was made by pen No. 33, S. S. Hamburgs which laid 97 eggs. Pen No. 52, White Wyandottes, was second with

94 eggs for the month, and Pen No. 40, Black Minorcas, was third. The total number of eggs laid by all pens for September was 5716 eggs, which makes a grand total of 84,011 eggs to Oct. 1st.

Seventeen pens have laid more than 800 eggs in 11 months. The best record made by a pen of Indian Runner ducks is pen No. 129, laying 547 eggs to date.

It will be seen that the R. C. Reds still lead by 15 eggs, but the White Leghorns and White Wyandottes are both gaining on the Reds and stand a good chance to pass them before the contest closes on October 31st. The race for first place has practically narrowed down to the Barred Rocks, White Leghorns, White Wyandottes and R. C. Reds.

Twenty-nine hens have laid more than 200 eggs in 11 months. The best individual record so far has been made by White Plymouth Rock hen No. 717, Lady Showdown. No other hen stands a chance to equal her remarkable record unless she should die, and even then, her nearest rival would have to lay practically every remaining day. She did not lay as many eggs this month as usual, but added 23 for the month, making her total for 11 months 260 eggs. She has 31 days yet in October to complete her year's record. If she does not moult and lays even half the days in the month, she will have made a record equalled by few hens. She has a chance to make a new world's record, but we are pleased and satisfied even if she does not lay another egg.

Twenty varieties of poultry have been entered in the second contest. Each variety is represented by 20 hens, making 600 hens in all. These hens come from England, Canada and the United States. An additional 100 hens will be used on the outside to try out a breeding and a feeding experiment along with the regular contest, the hens being trap-nested, records kept and reports made each month. For this experiment one contestant, from California, sends a pen of hens which he claims to have been so bred that he guarantees them to average 220 eggs each if no deaths or sickness takes place in this pen. He is also to send two males, one bred along the same lines as these females and the other one he claims is not bred to lay. The first of these males is to be used in the pen with these bred-to-lay females for a certain length of time, the eggs hatched and the chickens marked and the pullets from this mating to be trapped and the following year. This male is to be removed and the poor one after placed in the same pen with the bred-to-lay females. The eggs from this mating are to be hatched, the chicks marked and the pullets trapped. He claims that the pullets from the first male but from the same females will lay twice as many eggs as the pullets from the second male, showing that the laying quality of a flock depends more upon the breeding of the male than upon the female.

The result of this test will be awaited with interest—as will also the coming Douglas County show, Dec. 9-11, 1912, be awaited with interest. All the different breeds in the above table are entered—have you entered yours—if not, do so and see that your friends do the same.
