LETTER FROM POINTS ON
THE ADRIATIC SEA.

TRIESTE, Austria, Nov. 3.—(Editor Roseburg Review).—We have to apologize for the long silence. It is no fault of ours, however, for the reason that we wrote letters at every place we were, but inadvertently we placed them in our trunk, which we sent ahead, and later changed the route, perhaps due to the Turkish and Balkan war. We left Rome with regret, not expecting to find anything equal to it in antiquities, sculptures, historic monuments and mosaics. I will not say paintings, because Florence surpassed in that line anything else in the world. The frescoes in the Vatican, however, cannot be surpassed. As stated above, we left Rome for Florence, where we stopped for about a week, visiting all the picture galleries of the Medici's and the Pitti's and the old bridge crossing the Arno. We also visited Dante's home and the church in which he was married. It is the same today as it was then. We stood on the spot where Savonarola was burned on the public square for his long over patrie. We have known so much in Florence that a special letter, if you will permit us, will be sent to you in due time.

From there we came to Venice, the beautiful, lovely and inspiring Venice. We secured rooms in the old Ducal Palace, facing St. Mark's Square, so that every morning we could witness the beautiful sight, the feeding of thousands of pigeons by the tourists of every country in the world; a scene exclusively Venetian and never to be forgotten. We visited the Doge's palace with its prisoners, saw the mouth of the lion, where I deposited by visiting card. I charged no one, however, with any crime of treason or any other crime, as was the custom in the days when

crusades and oppression were considered the virtues of patriotism. We also stood on the Bridge of Sighs; on one hand the palace, on the other the prison. It looks more poetical in print than in reality.

We did not forget to see and cross the "Rialto," where Shakespeare laid his scene in the Merchant of Venice, and according to its surroundings it is the same market place, with the same rich stores, and the Venetian gondolier sings the same old songs as when Iago loved Desdemona. A separate letter has also been written about Venice, which, with your permission, will be sent to you.

From Venice we came by steamer to Trieste, from which place we intended to go to the Levant, but the declaration of war by the Balkan states changed our plans. We were compelled to abandon further advance in that direction. In the latter part of October we attempted, on the steamer Prinz Hohenlohe, to reach the seat of war.

It takes from Trieste to Cattaro, Montenegro, about sixteen and one-half hours, along one of the most interesting coasts seen anywhere. Cattaro is just opposite Scutari, where a fierce battle was fought between the Turks and Montenegrins, and it is now reported that the city and its forts surrendered to Montenegrins.

On reaching Cattaro we were informed that further advance would be dangerous. With other passengers we returned and stopped at Zara, the capital of Dalmatia, and within a few miles of Bosnia.

Zara is a very interesting place of about thirteen thousand inhabitants and thoroughly Italian in character. It is a busy, lively place, to which the costumes of the Croatian peasants impart an interesting air of variety.

This little city was strongly fortified during the days of the ancient Roman Empire and on its fall it was occupied by the Venetians, and its past influence can yet be seen on every hand. The famous Winged Lion is shown on every square and ancient building.

One of the most interesting and cruel sights was an old Corinthian column, crowned with a griffin. It was used as a pillory. You can still see the chains where the criminals were tied and publicly executed. It reminds us very much of the cruelties perpetrated at the castles of St. Angelo at Rome.

After being much pleased with our trip along the coast, gazing at intervals at the Austrian fortifications, we reached Pola, the chief naval station of Austria, where we counted at least twenty war vessels and as many torpedo boats. This city, with a population of 36,000, was, under the Roman Empire, a most important war harbor of the Adriatic. In the eleventh century Pola was taken by the Venetians and afterwards had much to suffer in the struggle with Genoa. Since 1815 it has been under the supremacy of Austria. Judging from its monuments, this city must

have been in a flourishing condition in the first three centuries of the Christian era. We saw the magnificent Temple of Augustus, erected in 19 B. C., and it is still in an excellent state of preservation, and which would be a credit to old Rome, and is greatly admired.

The most striking Roman monument in Pola is the Amphitheatre, it having had a seating capacity of 20,000. It was erected in the third century. It is also in a good state of preservation. After seeing all we wished we returned on the steamer bound for Trieste. The day was warm, but the sea was quite rough, and after paying five Kronen for my dinner, in less than an hour I lost it all in the sea—the first time that my stomach played me such a trick and the fun was enjoyed by Mrs. M. on account that she was never sick on sea.

OREGON VOTERS DEFEAT
INCOME TAX MEASURE.

County Tax and Household Amendments Win Out.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 19.—That the income tax amendment to the constitution lost instead of having carried, as previous reports would indicate, is shown by official figures received here for all but Malheur County. The amendment will lose by about 300 votes, the returns from Malheur County, it is certain not being able to overcome this lead of the negative vote.

Only two of the tax reform measures have carried. One is the repeal of the county tax amendment of 1910 and the other the household amendment.

The household exemption amendment makes the law stand as it has, with the exception that the following paragraph is added to the list of exemptions:

"All household furniture, domestic fixtures, household goods and effects, actually in use as such in homes and dwellings; also all wearing apparel, watches, jewelry and similar personal effects actually in use."

YEGGMEN HOLD TOWN AT BAY
AS BANK SAFE IS LOOTED.

BOWLING GREEN, Ohio, Nov. 19.—Yeggmens dynamited the safe in the Mann bank at Portage today, securing \$5000. It required five explosions to wreck the safe. Citizens aroused surrounded the bank, but were held off by confederates of the yeggmens until the robbery was completed.
