Orders were made on other petitions as follows:

Emma Pope—Improvements reduced from \$600 to \$200.

Nels Nelson—Reduction from \$2,545 to \$2000.

RESTRICTED EXTENT OF FEDERAL PATRONAGE.

So much has been said in discussion of the patronage which will be at the disposal of President Wilson after March 4, 1913, that it is interesting to know just how many officers and employees of the Government would be affected by the change did Woodrow Wilson decide not to follow the action of his Republican predecessors and throw out of office hundreds of thousands of Republicans now working for Uncle Sam.

There are 291,250 of these employees. Of these 227,457 hold positions subject to competitive examinations under the civil service rules, and their jobs have ceased to be "political appointments."

The civil service act has been in force 28 years. At first it was applied to less than ten per cent of the Government positions. Although no exact figures are at hand, it has been extended by one President after another until it includes nearly all except a few higher positions, such as first, second and third class postmasters, internal revenue and customs collectors, fiscal agents and certain supervisory officers in various branches of the Government.

President Taft transferred bodily more than 50,000 fourth-class postmasters from the field of political appointments to the classified service, and he added more than 4000 other positions to the classified list, making a record as against all Presidents.

Whether Mr. Wilson desires to revoke some of the civil service orders of his Republican predecessors or not there will be a great many Government positions to be filled by him, which may be distributed as rewards for political service. If he yields to the suggestions of many of his advisors in Congress there will be many thousands more.

Under the civil service rules as they stand today it is not the clerks getting salaries from \$750 to \$1500 and \$1800 a year that can be easily displaced, but it is the chiefs of bureaus and divisions, whose salaries begin at about \$2200 a year and run upwards, as for the most part they are unclassified.

After the appointment of Cabinet officers the first thing the new Democratic administration will do will be to name appointment clerks in the various departments, whose business it will be to cast about and see "how the land lies."

Senator Murrey's famous declaration, "To the victors belong the spoils," has lost much of its force in politics in the last decade. Grover Cleveland having set a precedent by allowing thousands of Republican office holders to serve their full terms. When he retired from office the Republican administration followed in his footsteps and comparatively few Democrats were removed for political reasons.—Eugene Guard.
