POST HOLE DIGGERS

HILLIARD & MCGINNIS' UNPAID WORKMEN MAKE DEMAND FOR MONEY.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 21.—Ninety employees of Hilliard & McGinnis, the local contractors who are in financial difficulties, called at the Mayor's office this morning, requesting that some steps be taken by the city to give them the money which the contractors owe them. The spokesman of the employees said that many of them were without money and had families in need, and unless they could secure the money they would be forced to go hungry. The company owes the men from \$5 to \$100 each.

George McCord, secretary of the Mayor, arranged a conference between the Mayor, the contractors, a representative of the bonding company which furnished the bonds for the company covering the contracts with the city, the City Attorney and a committee of the employees for this afternoon, when an effort will be made to arrange some plan whereby the men will be paid what is owed them before Christmas. The contractors have a large amount of unfinished work, including several sewer and street-paving jobs, and if it is determined that they are unable to continue the work, the bonding company will be asked to complete the jobs and pay the workmen.

OREGON NEWS.

President Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural College announces that beginning in September, 1913, the equivalent of three years' high school work will be required for admission to the college. This was decided by the board of regents. Of this year's freshman class 254 are high school graduates, 45 have had three years' school work, and 102 came with but two years' credits. The board of regents holds that these figures are sufficient justification for raising the standard.

With scarcely half an hour's deliberation, the jury in the case against E. E. Wedemeyer, charged with being a member of the Portland vice clique, returned a verdict of guilty Friday. He will be sentenced Monday.

Frank Seymour, alias Parker, charged with complicity, together with Mike Spanos, in murdering George Dedaskalos, in Medford some months ago, was on Friday found guilty of murder in the first degree. Spanos had previously been convicted.

Word has been received here of the death of Dr. B. P. Hammel, formerly of Roseburg. He started two weeks ago from his home in San Francisco, in company with his wife, for Syracuse, N. Y., but died on the train and was taken off at Ogden, Utah, where the remains were cremated. Dr. Hammel invested heavily in Bohemia mining property a number of years ago and lost heavily. He was at one time worth a million or more, but lost most of his money through unfortunate investments. Of late years he had traveled up and down the Coast as one of a party of medical specialists.

Maggie Adams, mother of the Tillamook tribe of Indians, died at her home at East Garibaldi Thursday. She was supposed to be 109 years of age. Eleven children survive her.

GENERAL NEWS.

North Yakima, Wash., went wet 24.03 to 23.66 Friday. Seventy-five per cent of the registration voted. More than 1000 challenges were made and two were arrested for alleged illegal voting. A recount will be asked.

Characterization of the Arkansas penitentiary under the lease system as a "burning, seething hell, consuming human beings, who are being fed into it in a manner which results in nothing but making fortunes for contractors," Governor Donaghey, Friday issued a statement in defense of his action last Monday in issuing pardons to 314 state convicts. According to a newspaper compilation, based on the state records, 43 of those pardoned were convicted of murder or manslaughter; 111 of grand larceny; four assault; five robbery; 32 forgery; 23 burglary; 26 assault to kill, and 76 crimes ranging from hog stealing to bigamy.

The complaint in the long expected suit of the Federal Government against the Southern Pacific Railroad, involving title to \$250,000,000 worth of supposedly mineral bearing lands in Fresno County, Cal., was filed at Los Angeles Friday in the United States District Court for the southern district of California. Other suits are to follow, in which the Government will contest the ownership of a total of \$750,000,000 worth of lands, according to U. S. D. Townsend, special assistant to the Attorney-General, who arrived there Thursday. The suit is brought under the provisions of the act of Congress passed July 27, 1866, requiring the Department of the Interior to exempt mineral bearing lands in leasing patents to railroads. The Government will contend that of 440,000 acres of land on the main line of the Southern Pacific Railroad in California, 45,225 acres are mineral bearing and must revert to the public domain.
