FIVE INDICTMENTS AGAINST TORGERSON.

After He Pleads Guilty, Cneching Federal Reward, He Must Go Back to Red Bluff.

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 20.—Formal indictment for crimes charged against him and to which he confessed was made against John Torgerson, postoffice, store and station robber, of Jackson County, in a return by the United States grand jury this morning. Torgerson confessed to entering the Medford, Talent, Gold Hill and Rogue River postoffices, and these constitute the basis for four of the five counts of the indictment. The fifth count charges the theft of a letter carrier's key from the Medford postoffice.

As soon as the requisition papers come from California and Governor West issues the necessary requisition papers Torgerson will be taken to Red Bluff, Cal., by Sheriff Jud W. Floyd to answer to a charge of murder. United States District Attorney John McCourt last week decided that Torgerson should be turned over to answer to the murder charge, but waited before making the announcement until an indictment could be returned here.

Before he is taken to California, Torgerson will in all probability be permitted to plead guilty to the five Federal indictments in order that the officers responsible for his arrest can secure the maximum reward offered for him. On each of the five Federal indictments there will be a reward of from \$50 to \$200 if Torgerson is "convicted," which has its equivalent in a plea of guilty. In addition, \$400 will be paid at Red Bluff as soon as the prisoner is turned over to the civil authorities there. Estimating that the Federal Government will pay \$500 reward when Torgerson pleads guilty to the Portland indictments, there will be a total of \$900 to be divided between the trio of officers who brought about his capture. These are Chief of Police McLenn, of Grants Pass; Chief of Police B. Fenton, of Roseburg, and Southern Pacific Detective P. E. Kelly.

The three postoffices in California which Torgerson confessed to robbing are Redding, Biggs and Los Molinos. From the first named he got over \$200 in money and at each of the other two he cleaned up about \$15 in money and stamps.

Mud and the Direct Market.

The city of Aurora, Ill., opened a city market, designed to bring farmers and consumers together for direct selling. About 1,000 housewives flocked to the spot on the opening day, to be met by one solitary farmer. He had driven eight miles with two chickens, twelve dozen eggs and a barrel of apples. The roads for miles around Aurora had been thick with mud, and the market had not been sufficiently advertised to persuade the farmers that a trip over such roads would be justified. The necessity of the market is one of several things needed before the grower can spend time to sell his own product in small lots.

An Up to Date Town Hall.

The town of Spring Valley, Wis., has shown its enterprise by erecting a municipal building that is an improvement on the old style of town hall. It contains quarters for the public library and for a town and country club, an engine house and an opera hall, which is also used for public meetings of all kinds. A large dining room and kitchen are also included. The building is of concrete and presents a substantial and handsome appearance.

Points For the Thinking Farmer.

Now is an excellent time to lay that concrete walk that you promised your wife to make last winter, when the mud was ankle deep. These are excellent months for odd jobs on the farm.

No kind of manure, either animal excrement or fertilizers, will take the place of good, thorough tillage. Plow the land at the right time and to the right depth, then work it down to a mellow seed bed with disk and roller, and harrow.

A brick wall or foundation, while substantial enough, looks rather old fashioned now. The concrete or cement block foundation is the modern type and, like most modern things, is an improvement over that which preceded it. A concrete foundation is also a permanent one and a saving.
