In the 1911 session H. B. 186 was passed by the Roseburg assembly faction of the Legislature. It authorized the state land board to contract for the drainage of lakes, marshes and swamps, the reclamation of such submerged lands, and its sale to the person or corporation reclaiming them.

The bill was vetoed by the Governor because it did not provide for the sale of the lands in small tracts to actual settlers, and because it enabled land corporations to secure large tracts at small cost and hold

them for speculative purposes, retarding development.

The Legislature in its first efforts to "put the Governor in a hole" overrode the veto at the behest of its author, Senator Thompson, who is said to represent large land corporations in Lake County. There are 273,000 acres of such land involved.

The law creates a land monopoly, because the state board is forced to deed the reclaimed land to the party draining it. The parties securing the land, also secure the water they drain or pump off, which they are enabled to sell for reclamation purposes, and thus secure a virtual monopoly of lands surrounding the lakes and swamps.

Under the law, the claimer gets the land at his own price, for there is no competition—and if the board fixes the price higher than suitable, the reclamation stops. The claimer is not required to give bonds to carry out the contract, and no penalty for failure to complete agreement.

A bill has been introduced to repeal this law. It is H. B. 578. By passing it the Legislature will have a chance to redeem itself with the people. If it fails, the Legislature will have succeeded in putting itself "in a hole" instead of the Governor, for the referendum will be invoked and individual legislators be made to explain why they voted to give away the public domain.

WOMEN'S WORK IN NEW ROCHELLE

How Beautiful New York Suburb Was Cleaned Up.

CHILDREN WERE A BIG HELP

Taught In Schools the Need of Town Improvement, They Spurred on Their Parents to the Work—Civic Pride Has Come to Stay.

Judged by their accomplishments in the last ten months, the members of the civic section of the Woman's club of New Rochelle are as capable as municipal housekeepers as they are in their individual household fields. Since this civic section was organized it has done much to clean up New Rochelle than any other betterment organization. Figuratively speaking, it has washed New Rochelle's face, combed its hair, dressed it in clean garments and is taking effective steps to keep it from being annoyed by mosquitoes and infected by flies.

The first thing the Woman's club civic section attempted was to clean

up the town. New Rochelle, beautiful as it is when looked at from the point of view of the average visitor, used to have many unswept and untidy corners. Various back yards, back streets and vacant lots were like the "junk rooms" in a big house—places in which all sorts of unsightly trifles were allowed to accumulate. These municipal housekeepers, after looking over their common habitation, began a vigorous campaign to get people interested in sprucing up—to arouse civic pride, in fact. In this work the boys and girls of the town, the school children, were invaluable. They spurred on their parents.

It was not long before the agitation produced results. The streets and vacant lots were cleared of papers and all sorts of debris. A passion for cleanliness seemed to sweep over New Rochelle. Photographs were taken before the work began and after it was completed. The contrasting pictures showed still greater enthusiasm. Singularly enough—contrary even to ordi-

ness, the spirit of cleanliness seems to have established itself in New Rochelle, even in places where it was an unwelcome guest.

To promote all these movements for the betterment of New Rochelle the citizens of the place took an important part. So essential is the interest and enthusiasm of the children to the rebuilding of the perfect city and the making of good citizens that a great deal of attention has been paid to developing means for training the children in these efforts. With the realization of these endless possibilities in the future of tomorrow the public school women of New Rochelle are organizing children's civic clubs in the schools of the city.

GENERAL NEWS.

Municipal "blue laws" forbidding butcher shops and moving-picture shows to be open on Sunday were sustained by the Illinois Supreme Court. The decisions were on appeals from the enforcement of city ordinances of Springfield.

Prohibition of prosecution of labor unions and farmers' organizations under the Sherman anti-trust law by the Department of Justice was written into the sundry civil appropriation bill Thursday by the House. By a vote of 30 to 22 an amendment offered by Representative Hamill of New Jersey was adopted providing no part of an appropriation of \$300,000 authorized for the enforcement of the anti-trust law should be expended to prosecute any voluntary organization of working men. A similar amendment applying to farmers' co-operative organizations offered by Representative Roddenberry of Georgia, was adopted.

The lower house of the Michigan Legislature has passed the Glassner eugenics bill which provides that every person seeking to marry must submit to physical examination and obtain a certificate of good health before a license can be granted. The bill now goes to the Senate.

"Izzy the Painter," a confession that he had fired 300 houses at the behest of a New York "arson trust" bore fruit Thursday in the conviction of Robin J. Rubin, an insurance adjuster. The jury returned a verdict of guilty of second degree arson after twenty minutes' deliberation. Rubin faces a term of imprisonment up to 25 years.

A jury in the Superior Court at Seattle Thursday awarded \$22,200 to Mrs. Anna L. Valentine, wife of L. L. Valentine, Chicago furniture manufacturer, because the door of a Northern Pacific car was slammed on her little finger, necessitating amputation at the middle knuckle.

Lieutenant-Governor O'Neill of Indiana caused a sensation in the State Senate Wednesday when he interrupted the Rev. E. R. Henry, of the Emmanuel Baptist Church of Indianapolis, who was making the opening prayer and said: "Stop making a political speech." The minister had prayed for the separation of the "rain traffic" from the state and for the "coming of the day when Indiana would refuse to sell to men the right to make other men drunkards." The Lieutenant-Governor vigorously banged the marble slab with his gavel and commanded the minister to stop. He ordered the Journal to be read and Rev. Henry left the chamber immediately.
