The proper way to bake a ham for Easter dinner: Procure a ham weighing ten to twelve pounds; cover with a thick paste made of flour and water; place in an earthen dish or enameled pan and bake in a moderately heated oven. When done, take off the crust carefully, and peel off the skin; place on a platter, fat side up; put a frill of cut paper around the knuckle and garnish with cut vegetables; bake four hours. One-half cup butter; 1 cup sugar; yolks of 2 eggs, beaten light; 1 cup sifted flour; 2 level teaspoonsful K C Baking Powder; 1 cup cold water; whites of 2 eggs, beaten dry.

One-fourth cup sifted flour; 1 teaspoonful salt; 1 cup hot milk; 1 egg, beaten light; 1 cup sugar; 1 teaspoonful vanilla extract; 1 ounce chocolate.

Mix flour and salt with a very little cold milk; stir into the hot milk and cook ten minutes; add the chocolate and stir until it is melted and evenly blended with the flour mixture, then beat in the egg mixed with the sugar, and lastly the vanilla.
