J. P. MORGAN'S SON GETS MOST OF HIS VAST ESTATE.

Will Reveal That Man Whose Life Was Spent in Making Money Possessed a Soul.

NEW YORK, April 29. "I commit my soul into the hands of my Savior in full confidence that, having redeemed it and washed it in his most precious blood, he will present it faultless before the throne of my Heavenly Father, and I entreat my children to maintain and defend, at all hazard, and at any cost of personal sacrifice, the blessed doctrine of the complete atonement for sin through the blood of Jesus Christ, once offered, and through that alone."

This is the extraordinary and striking utterance which begins the last will and testament of John Pierpont Morgan.

Son Gets All But \$20,000,000.

The amount of trusts and bequests named by specific sums is under \$20,000,000, but the entire residue of the estate is left to J. P. Morgan, Jr., who is designated by his father to become the chief heir, not only to his fortune, but to his many charitable and artistic activities.

The value of the estate is roughly estimated at \$100,000,000, consisting of real estate, insurance, bank, railroad, industrial and other stocks worth \$10,000,000, and art collections conservatively estimated at \$50,000,000.

To his three daughters, Morgan bequeathed \$5,000,000 each, to his two sons-in-law \$1,000,000 each, and to his wife their two homes and a trust fund sufficient to give her an annual income of \$100,000.

ANTI-ALIEN LAW PASSED IN JAPAN YEARS AGO.

TOKIO, April 19. Despite rabid and popular clamor for immediate action, the government and conservative newspapers today take the view that war with the United States is impossible even if the California alien land bills are passed. The official view is that the California bill, even if allowed to pass, will be considerably toned down and that its enforcement will be lax. The responsible newspapers are ignoring street demonstrations.

Japan's foreign land ownership law, passed in 1910, is somewhat similar to the bill pending in the California legislature, but it never has been strictly enforced. It is predicted, however, that its enforcement will be rigid if the California bill is passed.

Lewis, proprietor of the restaurant further down the street, near the depot, that bears his name. The three will reopen tomorrow under the personal and permanent management of Mrs. L. L. Lewis and her sister-in-law, Miss Susie Lewis.

The new owners announce giving a strictly first class service, a guarantee hardly necessary in view of Miss Susie Lewis' connection with the business, her ability being so well known here. Many of the successful banquets held in this city for years past have been under her skillful guidance and her high reputation in cuisine service means that Everybody's Cafe will continue to be one of the best patronized eating houses in the city. Through a premature blast of several tons of rock at the Trencher quarries, three miles south of Dayton, Oregon, Saturday, one man was killed outright and two others seriously injured, one of whom may not recover. The dead man is William P. Lancaster, 28, who leaves a wife and one child. His father, H. A. Lancaster, aged 78, had his right leg shattered, also sustaining other severe injuries. Amputation of the injured limb will be necessary. Ed McDaniel, who was acting as powder man, was badly hurt about the arms and face, but will recover.

A state food inspector was in Roseburg today on the usual tour. He found no serious defects, so far as reported. Some vanilla butter was found to be somewhat under weight, but the matter was not deemed sufficiently serious to merit more than an earnest warning to be more careful hereafter. The state law is very specific as regards the weight of butter and a merchant who offers for sale a roll of square of butter weighing less than 16 oz. 25 cents is subject to a fine of not less than \$25. In view of this law, it was hard enough to blame for refusing to accept butter that is short weight.

The committee on the House Lodge Rally Day to be held in this city on Wednesday, May 21, are outlining plans for the day's events and the initiation of a large class of new members this evening. The day's program will include music and addresses followed by a picnic dinner probably at the scenic grounds in West Roseburg. Some events for the afternoon are also under consideration. It is expected that arrangements will be made to hold the initiation ceremonies at the outdoor polo bowls, held in the evening, and the dinner will be served at the Maccafee hall. Several unique features are expected for this occasion.

Circuit Court was in session today, arguments being heard by Judge Hamilton in the case of P. S. Younce vs. Nels Anderson and H. K. Sears. This motion was brought by Younce, who is a resident of this county in an endeavor to have a deed declared to be a mortgage. The property involved is a piece of timber land located on Rice Creek and formerly owned by Anderson. The allegations are that Anderson owed Younce and was also indebted to S. J. Jones, of Roseburg. That he decided the property to Jones who afterwards sold it to Sears. The plaintiff (Younce) now seeks to have the deed from Anderson to Jones declared only a mortgage. Against this Sears appears as an innocent purchaser. The court took the case under advisement. The case of Mrs. Hazel Northrup, one of the heirs of the A. E. Oquist estate, receiving an alleged interest in that estate, will be heard before Judge Hamilton on Wednesday.
