"RUM BOATS" DEFEY

DIY LAW IN MAINE.

BANGOR, Maine, May 21.—In an effort to prohibit, literally, liquor laden "schooners from crossing the bar," and to make a sincere effort to enforce the provisions of the Webb law, state authorities recently induced the railroad transportation companies to refuse to bring in beer or liquor by rail. Regular steamship companies followed suit, and the prospects for a "dry" time appeared good, and prohibitionists were pleased, believing that at last the state was to be conducted along the lines proposed by the statute.

Some liquor dealers had laid in large stocks and were not affected, but others with short supplies saw ruin staring their business in the face and set about to evade the law. As a result, wildcat schooners and "trail" vessels are reported to have unloaded large cargoes recently.

Sheriff Jarrard has been making an attempt to capture the "rum boats," so-called, but there are so many engaged in the work that unless he gets aid from the Governor the task will be too much for one officer and his deputies to undertake.
