Thursday's Program. Baby Parade. All persons taking part in this parade will assemble on East Douglas street opposite the courthouse at 9:45 a. m. promptly. The parade starts promptly at 10 a. m.

The line of march for this parade will be from the courthouse west on Douglas to Jackson, south on Jackson to Cass, counter-marching on Jackson to Commercial Club room where Eugene examinations will be made.

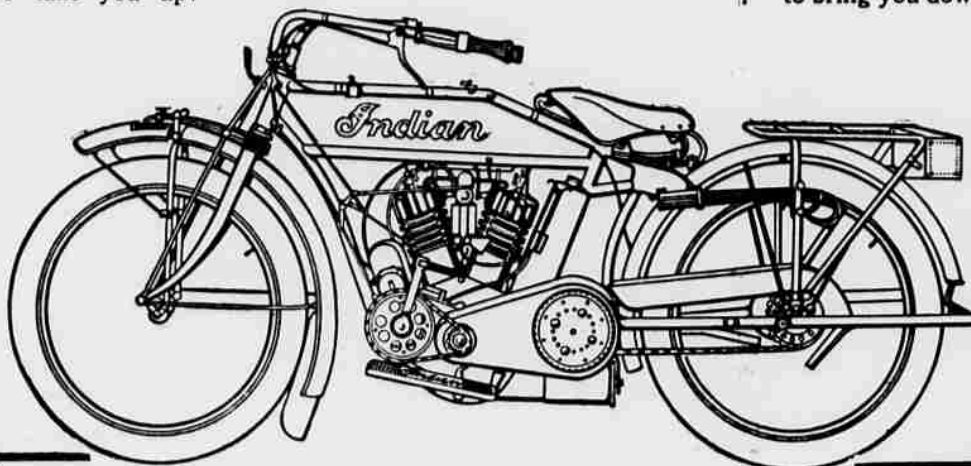

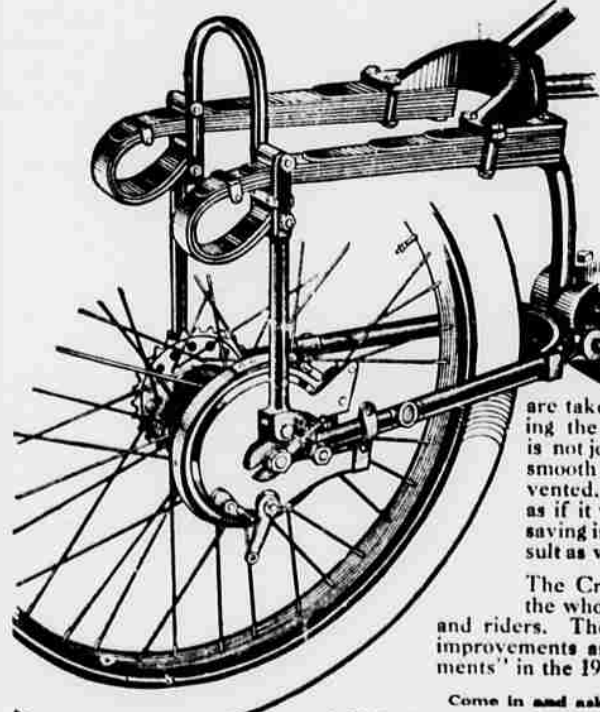
