CLOSING DAY'S EVENTS AT W. C. T. U. CONVENTION.

SUTHERLIN, June 20.—The Thursday morning session of the 17th annual convention of the W. C. T. U., which convened in Sutherlin, opened at 10 o'clock with the usual good attendance. Mrs. Jennie Kemp led a very inspiring devotional meeting, which was followed by additional reports from the various unions.

Mrs. Harford then gave a talk on the mission of flowers, and how they brighten the home of the poor and the afflicted. She also suggested a number of ways that the W. C. T. U. could do little acts of kindness.

A report of the L. T. L. was sent by the superintendent of that department and read by Mrs. Marsters.

Mrs. Jenkins, of Wilbur, evangelistic superintendent, gave an encouraging report. Each union had splendid reports from their mothers' meetings, telling what helpful suggestions had been given to young mothers by those more experienced in the rearing of children.

A synopsis of the lecture given by Prof. Groves at the W. C. T. U. institute which was held in Roseburg in March, was then given for the benefit of those who had not the privilege of hearing this instructive talk on the effort of narcotics on the school boy.

The election of officers then followed. A motion was made and carried that all white ribbons be made members of the convention. Mrs. French, Jr., and Mrs. Denny were appointed tellers of the election.

Mrs. Ida Marsters received the unanimous vote of the convention for county president. Mrs. Orman, of Sutherlin, was elected cor. secretary, and Mrs. E. H. Duke, of Roseburg, was elected recording secretary. Mrs. Helen Riddle, of Roseburg, was elected county treasurer by acclamation. Mrs. Riddle was made a life member of the W. C. T. U. A motion was then made and carried that Mrs. Riddle be sent a letter of greeting and a badge from the convention. A motion was made and carried that the president appoint Mrs. W. F. Hamilton as vice president.

Noon-tide prayer conducted by Mrs. Brown, closed the morning session.

The afternoon session opened at 1:30, when Mrs. Harford had charge of devotionals. Then followed a paper on temperance, contributed by Mrs. H. H. Strong and read by Miss Ensign. This paper proved very interesting and helpful.

Then followed another paper on anti-narcotics, read by Mrs. Jewett. This was excellent inasmuch as it set forth some startling facts on the evil effects of narcotics on the youthful body and mind. These facts can easily be proven by watching the change in the moral character and mental capabilities of the boy who uses cigarettes, tobacco or booze during his school days.

A talk by Prof. E. J. Orman on fresh air and pure food versus intemperance was both entertaining and instructive as he explained how the life of the cells of the body are fed by pure food and fresh air and

strengthened for the work they have to do. He also showed that the lack of fresh air and pure food is one cause of intemperance.

Mrs. Reed rendered a solo to the delight of the convention.

Mrs. Brown gave a talk on Chautauqua work, bringing out many different ways of making the W. C. T. U. meetings more interesting.

Mrs. Ida Marsters gave a talk on "The work most needed to be done by the W. C. T. U.," urging each member to be more faithful in performing their duties, especially those who are superintendents of certain departments.

Mrs. Harford then read resolutions of thanks to Sutherlin for entertainment during the convention. These were adopted.

The meeting was then closed with prayer by Mrs. Eddy, of Roseburg.

The evening session, which was the last meeting of the convention, met at the Gem Theater, the chief feature being the golden medal contest.

The Sutherlin orchestra gave several numbers, which added much to the program.

Mrs. Barnes, of Roseburg, Supt. of the medal contest, introduced the contestants, four in number. They were: Merrill Casebeer, Edenbower; Teddie Jewett, Roseburg; Katherine Merrill, Roseburg; Beulah Bamby, Sutherlin. Miss Bamby proved the fortunate one, and that her speech was much appreciated was evidenced by the storm of applause that followed the announcement of the victor's name. All the other contestants did exceedingly well, and Mrs. Jennie Kemp, after presenting the medal to Miss Bamby, then presented each of the other aspirants with a handsome bouquet.

A number of Sutherlin young people gave musical numbers and Miss Ruth Eddy, of Roseburg, rendered a very pleasing solo.

That Sutherlin is both a generous and hospitable little city was evidenced by her actions during this convention.

A large delegation from the local Union accompanied the delegates to the train, each having a feeling of encouragement and good fellowship obtained from the work of the convention.

GERMS IN THE BLOOD.

Why Fever and Chills Alternate When a Person Has Malaria.

When the germs of malaria—real live animals these, belonging to the order protozoa—enter the blood with the saliva of the biting mosquito they instantly attack the red corpuscles. Each one eats its way into a corpuscle and after a brief rest divides himself into sixteen. What is left of the corpuscle is now dead. It breaks down, and the sixteen new germs—plasmidia, as the doctors call them—are set free in the blood. Each of these instantly seeks out a new red corpuscle, which it attacks in the same way.

This process, in the ordinary malaria, takes just forty-eight hours. When the germs are eating the red corpuscles the temperature of the body is increased, causing fever. When the multiplied germs are discharged into the blood the whole body feels as if chilled. This causes the shivers and shakes that usually come every alternate day and that have given us the common name "chills and fever."

So when you have the chill you may know that your broken down red corpuscles are discharging myriads of germs into your blood, and when the chill gives way to fever you may know that these germs are busy attacking your red corpuscles.—New York World.

A GLIMPSE OF SMYRNA.

Its Greatest Business Street is Only Fifteen Feet Wide.

Let us in imagination go ashore at Smyrna from one of the great black steamships of the Messageries Maritimes. We land on a noisy, bustling quay alongside of which runs a little one horse railway. Great ships from most of the leading ports of the world are tied up to the quay by their sterns. On the other side of the broad street, the only one in Smyrna to which this adjective can be applied, are large warehouses and one or two pretentious hotels.

Passing through a cross street, we come to the great business artery of the city, the so called "Frank street," which has doubtless obtained its name from the fact that so many Franks, a generic name for foreigners, do business on it.

This street is only fifteen feet wide, and yet it is the chief business thoroughfare of a city of a quarter of a million inhabitants. Two people stretching out their arms and touching hands in the middle could span the street, and yet through it hurries a constant stream of foot passengers, dashing cabs, stately camels, donkeys and donkey boys, beasts of burden and men of burden, carrying every conceivable article that people of the orient or the occident might want, for this is one of the chief cities in the world where east and west meet on a common footing.—Christian Herald.

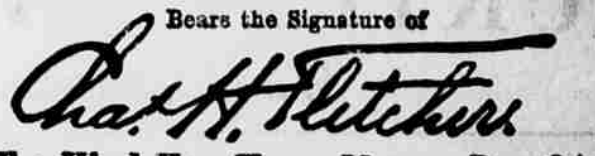
