NOTICE TO BRIDGE CONTRACTORS.

Sealed bids will be received by the County Clerk of Douglas County, Oregon, up to 9:00 a. m. on the 12th day of July, 1913, for the construction of the following bridge:

Oak street bridge across the South Umpqua River, within the corporate limits of the City of Roseburg, Douglas County, Oregon.

Four 175 foot steel spans, Camel back or Curved Chord Pratt Truss design, approximately 100 feet of frame wood truss approaches; four solid diamond shaped concrete masonry piers and one concrete abutment. The above bridge to have a clear roadway of 20 feet and a clear head room of 13 feet.

A foot walk six feet in width with gas pipe railing shall be constructed on the north truss; the south truss shall be designed symmetrical with the north one.

The design shall be for the following loading:

The bridge floor and its supports

shall be designed for a live load of 100 pounds per square foot on bridge and 80 pounds per square foot on walks.

Bidders must submit plans with

plans. The plans must be plain and

detailed in regard to stresses and

size of members.

Bids for truss approaches to be

by the final foot.

Bidders must visit the site and

satisfy themselves as to local conditions.

The County Clerk assuming no

All bids must be accompanied by

a certified check in an amount equal

to five per cent of the bid. En-

velopes in which bids are enclosed

must be endorsed with the name of

the bridge for which the bid is made. Profiles, plans, specifications, will be on file in the County Clerk's office on and after June 28th, 1913.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the County Court of Douglas County, Oregon, until 12 M., July 12, 1913, for the furnishing of all labor and material necessary for the construction of a rock macadam road, the said work to be strictly in accordance with the plans and specifications on file in the County Clerk's office of said county after June 28, 1913.

Blank forms of proposal can be had at the clerk's office and must be used by the contractors in submitting their bids. No plans or specifications are to be sent out, but may be seen at the County Clerk's office. The County Engineer will meet contractors at Comstock, Oregon, on July 10th, 1913, to go over the proposed work. The County Court will furnish the use of a rock crusher and power to the successful bidder.

The work consists of the construction of a rock macadam permanent highway No. 1, with all bridges, cross culverts, excavation, grading, etc., etc. Said work is located in Sections 9 and 10, Township 21 South, Range 1 West, W. M., near the Douglas-Lane county line.
