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BANDITS KILL THREE

Passengers on Great Northern Train Shot by Robbers

WAS NEAR BELLINGHAM, WASH

Poses are Numerous and Active and Capture is Expected—Reward of \$15,000 Offered For Each

(Special to The Evening Review). ST. PAUL, Feb. 21.—"The hold-up and killing of three passengers at Bellingham was one of the most atrocious crimes I've ever heard of," said James Gruber, general manager of the Great Northern Railroad. The railroad company will pay a reward of \$5000 each for the capture of the robbers, either dead or alive. He added: "I have instructed the posses to continue the search until the murderers are brought to justice."

Dozen Poses in Search. BELLINGHAM, Wash., Feb. 21.—All means of escape of the two bandits who last night held up the Great Northern passenger train at Samish Station, one of whom killed Thomas Wadsworth, Robert Lee and H. R. Adkinson, passengers who attempted to capture him, are being guarded by a dozen posses of armed men. The officers hope the desperadoes will be caught before night. A reward of \$5000 for each is offered by the railroad company, and this is influencing many to join in the man hunt. Detectives Keith and Davis have arrived with a number of men and joined in the search. The combined forces make a formidable array. The bodies of the murdered men are held in the morgue awaiting word from relatives as to their disposal.

Reward is \$30,000. SEATTLE, Feb. 21.—President Louis Hill, of the Great Northern R. R., has offered a reward of \$30,000 for the apprehension, dead or alive, of the Bellingham train bandits.

Details of Robbery. BELLINGHAM, Wash., Feb. 20.—When three passengers on Great Northern passenger train No. 358, bound for Vancouver, B. C., undertook to resist one of a pair of robbers who entered the day coach when the train was running along the edge of the bay nine miles south of here to-night at 7:30 p. m., the robber pulled an automatic pistol and shot the men dead in their tracks. The dead men are:

Thomas S. Wadsworth, a Canadian Pacific conductor of Vancouver, B. C.

R. L. Lee, of Bremerton, Wash.

H. R. Adkinson, a traveling salesman, of Vancouver, B. C.

It is believed the two robbers got on the train at Burlington, a few miles south of the place of the hold-up. They were seen to leave the smoking car and enter the vestibule between it and the day coach, where they tied white handkerchiefs about their faces. One of the men then entered the day coach and walked to the rear door, a second one stepped just inside the coach.

As the man reached the rear door and started to lock the door the three men who were killed leaped to their feet and started grappling with the robber. At that minute the bandit who was at the forward end of the coach began shooting into the ceiling of the car and putting out the lights. MURDERED LIKE DOG

Gen. Villa so Charged on Death of Wm. Benton

ACTION BY EUROPEAN POWERS

May Result From This Affair—Consul at Juarez Insists That Villa Acted Within His Official Right

(Special to The Evening Review). WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—"Wm. Benton was murdered like a dog by General Villa," read Senator Fall, of New Mexico, in the Senate today, from a telegram received from Chairman Dudley, of El Paso, where a mass meeting was held last night.

"It is almost certain that Villa did it personally," the telegram continued. "There is no evidence that Benton was the aggressor. Everything indicates that it was a cold blooded murder."

Powers May Demand Action. MEXICO CITY, Feb. 20.—Gossip is current here tonight that certain European powers again are planning to urge the United States to assume a more active policy in restoring peace in Mexico. Many persons expressed the belief today that the Benton incident might be seized upon as an opportunity to impress such a view on the Washington Government.

Various diplomats intimated today that they would use the killing of Benton as the basis of reports to show their helplessness when it comes to protecting their nations in the greater part of Mexico. Says Execution Was Legal. WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—Consul Edwards, of Juarez, has telegraphed a report to Secretary Bryan, saying that after carefully investigating, he found that Wm. Benton was legally tried by a court martial and convicted of participating in a plot to kill General Villa. He said he was convinced that Villa acted within his rights on convening the court martial. The text of Edwards' message was not published. Bryan said it contained other information not publishable. A copy was furnished to the English ambassador, who cabled it to London. It is unknown whether this will satisfy the British government. Bryan is hopeful of averting a crisis at this time.

Two More Missing. EL PASO, Feb. 21.—No word has been received from John Lawrence and his friend, named Curtis, Englishmen, who went to Juarez Wednesday to look for Wm. Benton. Their friends fear they have also met Benton's fate. Gustav Bauch, an American, who was arrested at Juarez charged with being a spy, has not been located. It is rumored that he was shot, but the rebels denied this. Some believe the rebels have removed them to Chihuahua City.

Will Attack Torreon. CHIHUAHUA CITY, Feb. 21.—General Villa left today for Escalon to take charge of the Torreon attack, which is scheduled for tomorrow or Monday.

MINE AT CANYONVILLE LIKE BONANZA FIND.

Ross and Donohue Seem to Have Struck It Rich—Get \$100 to the Pan of Ore.

On Tuesday Mr. Ross brought in nine sacks of picked ore, 825 pounds, for shipment to the Selby Smelting Company, of San Francisco. He said:

"We do not know how much of a mine we have. I am positive that we have taken out more than \$3000 already, and all we have done so far is simply to uncover the seam for about 50 feet. From one panfull Monday we got more than \$100. How much this shipment of 825 pounds of ore will yield, I have no idea. I have never handled before, but from what miners say and from what I have been shown of gold, it will not surprise me to learn that this ore we are shipping will carry values of \$10,000 to the ton. This, of course, is from the rich seam.

"The larger body of ore which covers it to the thickness of about three feet, I feel sure will run more than \$100 to the ton. We have tons of this on the dump and can mortar gold in considerable quantities out of all of it. As I said, we have no idea of how much of a mine we have. We have simply been stripping the face of it so far. Mr. Donohue and myself have been working it all alone. We are not trying to sell or to attract buyers, for we do not know what we have at this time. Today I was shown a glass of rough gold and quartz which I was told contained \$200. We can pick out flour sacks of the same kind at our mine."

STORM IS TERRIFIC

More Deaths Have Resulted in Southern California

HUNDREDS FORCED FROM HOMES

Los Angeles is Cut off From Communication Except by Wireless and Business is at Standstill There

(Special to The Evening Review). LOS ANGELES, Feb. 21.—Four more persons are known to have met death in the storm which has been raging over Southern California for 48 hours. The dead: R. W. Hamlin, drowned at Santa Barbara; Miss Grace Sprague, drowned at Carpinteria; J. C. Rockwell, drowned at Carpinteria, and a Mexican named Gonzales, drowned at Los Angeles. Other reports of fatalities at 11 a. m. were still unverified. At least 50 homes along the Arroyo Seco, between here and Pasadena, were washed away by the flood, and hundreds of other people were forced to leave their homes. All the bridges over the stream, except two, were washed away. Except for the wireless, Los Angeles is cut off from outside communication both by rail and wire. Hundreds of homes were abandoned in the city, and business is at a standstill. The principal business streets are inundated and impassable, and scores of basements are flooded. The loss from this source is many thousands of dollars. The storm has wrought havoc in six counties. A terrific storm at sea is also reported.
