SUTHERLIN VALLEY.

James Mahoney has been appointed city marshal and went on the job the first of the week.

The Sutherland Tennis Club reorganized Monday night with a large membership. Cecil Carr was elected president and M. C. Bond secretary and treasurer.

Mark N. Tisdale, T. J. Arday and F. E. Smith have each purchased an Overland automobile, and the machines are expected to arrive here within a few days.

Mr. and Mrs. Jay Booth expect to leave this week for Portland for a brief visit, after which they will go to Oklahoma, where Mr. Booth has some property interests.

The Sun is informed that plans calling for a two-story concrete block or brick building on Central avenue, 50x75 feet, are being figured on by local contractors.

The J. F. Luse Co. has just completed pruning the large acreage of orchard tracts in this valley which they are caring for. The large force of men which has been engaged in this work are now spraying the trees, which not only protect them from pests but also keeps the valley free from disease. The company finds that very few trees will need replanting.

At a meeting of the Riddle Good Roads Association held Monday evening a resolution was adopted asking the County Court to have a new survey made of the road through Canyon Creek canyon made, so as to put that road in passable condition for 1915. Another resolution was also passed memorializing the court to take steps toward securing the permanent survey of the Pacific Highway through Douglas County.

A petition asking the County Court to construct a wooden bridge across Cow Creek at the C. H. Lake place was circulated during the past week and signed by a large number of citizens. A one-truss span will be all that will be required, and the bridge would prove a great convenience to the residents of the upper part of the valley.
