DRAIN AND VICINITY.

Henton Mires and John A. Emmett have been appointed as the two additional commissioners.

Tom Krewson has contracted to put in a concrete culvert and to fill in by grading the street in East Drain near the Wimberly place.

Oso King and wife, of Days Creek, arrived on Monday to locate on their 15-acre tract in lower south drain, which they bought about a year ago from the Drain Land Co. Mr. King expects to build a house on the place and make other substantial improvements.

It is now an assured fact that Drain will have a cannery and that we will have it this season. The association has purchased two lots situated about three blocks west of the business street and on the Pacific Highway. Upon these lots a building 48x60 will be erected, estimates on which are now being received. Work on the building will be started soon. Upon its completion the necessary machinery will be installed and the cannery will be ready for business. The business men and others have responded to the call for larger support from the town in a way which leaves no doubt in the minds of the directors as to their being back of the enterprise. The \$1000 asked of them was raised without difficulty and we believe it will be possible to raise a larger amount should it be necessary.—Nonpareil.

MILITIA MAY BE CALLED

IN EVENT OF TROUBLE.

War Department Plans for Call for 250,000 Men—Oregon's Quota is 1548.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The War Department has worked out plans for an instance of a call for volunteers for invasion in Mexico if necessary. It is thought the first call will be for 250,000 men. This will include the military reserves.

Authorization for the call is necessary from Congress under an act to provide for temporarily increasing the military establishment of the United States in times of war. The President is expected to ask authorization to raise a volunteer army.

The volunteers would be apportioned as far as practical among the several states and territories and the District of Columbia, according to population, and will enlist to serve for a period of two years unless sooner discharged.

Under this call each state's share of the volunteer army of 250,000 will be as follows:

MEXICO'S CONSUL IN

PORTLAND RESIGNS.

PORTLAND, April 20.—Because he feels that his duty as an American citizen comes first, Frank A. Spencer, Mexican consul for Oregon and Idaho, this morning telegraphed his resignation to Porfirio y Rojas, minister of foreign affairs, at Mexico City.

The resignation is to become effective at the pleasure of the Mexican government and Mr. Spencer's only statement was that he did not care to have any connection with a government towards which his own was belligerently disposed.

Mr. Spencer, who is the manager for Allen & Lewis, was appointed consul in 1895, and has been the dean of the Portland consular corps, following the death of British Consul Laidlaw. He was appointed by President Porfirio Diaz. At that time De la Barra was secretary of foreign relations and Mr. Spencer's exequatur was issued by President Grover Cleveland and was signed by Secretary of State Richard Olney.

CONDUCTOR KILLED

BY S. E. CAR BANDIT.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 20.—Conductor C. H. Seymour of the California street cable line died today of a bullet wound inflicted by a robber who attempted to hold up his car shortly before midnight. The robber, who said his name was Donald Anderson, was captured by two plain clothed men who were riding on the front end of the car.

The attempted robbery occurred on California street, between Webster and Fillmore. The bandit swung himself on the back platform, ordered the conductor to throw up his hands, and when Seymour refused, shot him in the jaw and dropped from the car. The two policemen gave chase and the capture followed.
