QUEENS ARE CROWNED

Thousands of People Witness Interesting Ceremonies

GRAND PARADE IS A FEATURE

Local Fraternal Organizations Parade the Business Streets of the City—Band Concerts and Vaudeville Pleasures

Favored with weather as fair as ever graced an event of gaiety, Roseburg's Sixth Annual Strawberry Carnival opened this morning under the most favorable conditions. The morning hours were given over to band concerts and vaudeville stunts, while this afternoon occurred the crowning of the queens and the grand fraternal parade. The parade was one of the best ever seen in Roseburg and was witnessed by a great throng of people that lined either side of the business streets.

It was a typical Roseburg celebration—payment of homage to two of her greatest products, roses and strawberries, and nature provided for the occasion a day that could not have been grander, because it was perfect. The hundreds of visitors from neighboring cities and towns were cordially welcomed on every hand, and the reception committees have seen that all of these have been made to feel at home.

The business portion of the city is in holiday attire, with festoons of bunting suspended from telegraph poles, and featured by the "Red, White and Blue." Many of the leading business houses have decorated their street windows in a very attractive manner and the word "welcome" greets the visitors wherever they go.

Everything points to the three biggest days in Roseburg's history. The cloudless skies and the beautiful sunlight truly exemplify a day of typical Roseburg weather—weather that contributes in no small measure to the production in Douglas County of the first strawberries in the state each year and a profusion of roses that cannot be excelled anywhere. While many other sections of the state are still expectant as to its strawberry crops and roses, Roseburg today is making liberal displays of both. It is Roseburg's era of celebration and she is doing it with all the energy and pride of her citizenship and with open hospitality toward her most welcome guests. The spirit of carnival is to be seen everywhere and nothing except a down-pour of rain can hamper the festivities.

It is not enough to briefly state that there were band concerts during the morning hours, for the two musical organizations, the O. A. C. band of 22 pieces and the Riddle band of 18 pieces, are entitled to commendation. The music dispensed by these organizations was inspiring and excited much favorable comment at the hands of those who listened. The bands played in all sections of the business district and no partiality was shown by the committees in charge. It was a case in which every merchant in Roseburg received a square deal. Another feature of the morning program was Boyd and Ogil's performing goats. This attraction, which was presented in front of the postoffice on Jackson street, and near the exhibit building, on Sheridan street, provoked much laughter and comment. This attrac-

READY FOR BUSINESS

Mediators Hold Conference With Opposing Factions

LINDSEY TALKS WITH PRESIDENT

United States is Ready to Move Its Army on a Moments Notice, is the Latest Washington Report

NIAGARA FALLS, May 21.—All preliminary formalities were disposed of today and the mediators are now ready for business. The mediators had their first talk with the Mexican envoys at noon. The conference lasted almost an hour. They expect to have an interview with the Americans tonight, and a second talk with the Mexicans tomorrow. By these interchanges of views it is hoped that a satisfactory agreement will soon be reached.

Line Ready for War.
WASHINGTON, May 21.—Despite the silence of the War Department, it has been learned that the Government has its entire transport fleet equipped to accommodate the army and ready to sail to Galveston on an hour's notice. It is said these preparations are merely precautionary. Bryan says that about ten days will be required to determine whether war will be necessary.

LINDSEY AT WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, May 21.—When received by the President at noon, Judge Lindsey begged the chief executive to use the regular troops and force the mineowners of Colorado to arbitrate with the strikers. Lindsey was accompanied to the White House by Mrs. Pearl Jolly, Mrs. Mary Potrucci and Mrs. Sarah M. Thomas, survivors of the Ludlow horror. The conditions in the strike zone were painted to the President in ghastly colors.

FOUR GIRLS ARE UNDER ARREST

Famous Becker Trial Reaches a Close in New York at Noon Today—Bank Robber is Under Arrest

PORTLAND, Ore., May 21.—Warrants were issued today for the arrest of Dr. J. O. Nibley, Dr. Kenneth Long, and a third man charged with contributing to the delinquency of minors, in connection with the Friars' Club crusade at Milwaukie.

Four girls, who are alleged to have visited the Friars' Club are in custody of Miss Baldwin, of the department of safety, and will be held as witnesses against the men under arrest. It is stated they visited the Friars' Club and were served with liquor.

Will Close Friars' Club.
SALEM, Ore., May 21.—As the result of allegations to the effect that two girls, both under age, were found drinking intoxicants with men at the Friars' Club at Milwaukie, Governor West today ordered Adjutant-General Finzer to close the club and keep it closed. The Governor said the club would have to remain closed until the end of his term.

The First Parade.
A great throng of people lined the streets this afternoon, when immediately following the crowning of the queens occurred the first parade of the carnival. While the parade was not as large as some of those of previous years, it was highly commendable and was a credit to those in charge.

The procession was headed by S. C. Harriman, marshal of the day, followed by a squad of local militiamen. Then came the queen's decorated float of white bunting and pink roses, drawn by four horses. Surrounding the queen were her pretty maids. Directly behind this float came the prettily decorated float of the children's queen. Surrounding the little queen were her maids and flower girls.

Next in line was the O. A. C. band. Following came Mike DeVaney and Little daughter, Florence, in a private conveyance drawn by two ponies. Next in line was 50 members of the Moose lodge, followed by members of the local lodge of Yeomen. Then came members of the Improved Order of Redmen, dressed in true Indian attire. Following was the Riddle band. Probably the prettiest float in today's parade was that entered by the "Merry-Go-Round" Society of Winston. The float was built on an automobile and was beautifully decorated with white bunting and a profusion of red and pink roses. 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GARDINER MAN WALKS TO PORTLAND TO GIVE EVIDENCE IN COURT

PORTLAND, Ore., May 21.—Because he had been summoned as the chief witness in a larceny case against J. B. Walker and did not have money enough to pay his transportation to Portland, George Spencer left Gardiner, Ore., on foot, six days ago, and by walking a little more than 40 miles a day was able to reach the county courthouse at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, just half an hour after the case had been continued because of his absence.

Spencer had walked approximately 250 miles, had subsisted on what food was given him, and had slept in the open, in barns and vacant shanties. In fact, at any place where his fatigue became too great to admit of further progress.

Spencer, who is a prisoner paroled from Kelly Rutte for good behavior, has been given lodging in the county jail until tomorrow, when the case against Walker will be called before Circuit Judge Morrow.

Spencer and Walker were jointly indicted for the larceny of a lot of leather goods from a front street store in October, 1913. Spencer pleaded guilty, was sentenced to the reformatory at Kelly Rutte for six months, and was paroled for good conduct after he had done 60 days time. Walker refused to admit his guilt and asked for a jury trial.

BIG CARNIVAL SHOOT

Was Held on Rifle Range Yesterday Afternoon

EXCELLENT SCORES RECORDED

R. B. Mathews Wins Five Prizes—Luncheon is Served on Grounds at Noon—Shoot is Well Attended

The merchants' shoot of the Roseburg Gun Club, held yesterday at their grounds near Shady Point, was a huge success. Each of the ten contests was an interesting event, the majority having to be shot off on account of ties in which often as many as five or six participated. Each event was open to all comers and there were no handicaps nor disqualifications.

Three prizes were offered for the best scores in each event, they being the donations of local merchants. The biggest winner was R. B. Mathews, taking four firsts, including the final event, in which six prizes were offered on a basis of 25 birds. The nine other events were of 15 birds. N. A. Rickard, of Corvallis, had the best record at the end of the day's shooting, making a straight run of 44 birds, and his percentage of birds shot being 89 for the day. He also had the distinction of not losing a single shoot off.

A large crowd of spectators were on hand, and seemed to enjoy the sport as much as the shooters. Alex. Ferguson, of Allen & Lewis, of Portland, furnished the coffee, which was supplemented by refreshments by the Gun Club, and made the occasion one to be remembered. On account of the success of the meet, the members of the gun club are especially grateful for the encouragement given by the merchants in their liberal prizes and interest. WITNESSES ARE HERE

Morrison Campbell Case Before the Grand Jury

MRS. CAMPBELL IS A WITNESS

Investigation of Becker Homicide May Be Completed Late This Afternoon—Arthur Mode May Appear Before the Grand Jury

The grand jury, which convened in formal session at the courthouse this morning, has begun an investigation into the case of the state vs. Morrison Campbell, who is charged with shooting and killing John Becker, near the latter's home at Cleveland, on April 17.

Although there were no eye-witnesses to the tragedy, the state has summoned a half dozen persons before the grand jury to testify. It is claimed by the prosecution that these witnesses will give evidence tending to establish the relations that existed between Becker and Morrison prior to the homicide.

Campbell, who is in the county jail awaiting disposition by the grand jury, may be allowed to testify, according to the interested attorneys. Campbell will allege, it is said, that he was attacked by Becker and was compelled to shoot his victim in self-defense. Mrs. Campbell, who arrived in town this morning, will appear as a witness in her husband's behalf.

Although the case at issue is one of the most important criminal actions to attract the attention of the local court for several years, witnesses are few and the investigation of the grand jury may be completed today. District Attorney Brown is conducting the examination of witnesses before the grand jury.

Witnesses have also arrived here to testify before the grand jury in the investigation of the charges against Arthur Mode, of Kellogg, who is accused of a statutory offense. A woman living near Kellogg will be the chief witness against Mode, according to the District Attorney.

As soon as the grand jury disposes of the actions above noted, evidence will be taken in the cases of Ben Henning and Arthur Miller, who are accused of entering and robbing the residence of Will Q. Brown, at Riddle.

Several other minor complaints will probably be investigated by the grand jury this term.

LAW DECLARED VOID

"Hip Pocket" Ordinance Branded as Unconstitutional

ALBANY CASE HEARD BY JUDGE

In Rendering Decision Judge Kelly Holds That Liquor May Be Sold and Purchased Under Certain Conditions

ALBANY, May 21.—Circuit Judge Kelly yesterday decided that the "hip pocket" ordinance, which makes it unlawful for anyone to carry intoxicating liquors through the streets, other than in consignment packages, unconstitutional and void, when he sustained a demurrer to the complaint in the case of the city of Albany against Walter Marks. The demurrer was interposed by Attorney W. S. Raley, who represented the defendant.

Marks was arrested about three weeks ago and three bottles of beer were found on him. A charge of violating the provisions of the ordinance was preferred in the police court. He was tried and convicted before Judge Van Tassel. A demurrer to the verdict was filed but overruled. Then the case was appealed to the Circuit Court.

"This ordinance provides," said Judge Kelly in announcing his decision, "that any person or persons who shall convey or haul through any street, alley, avenue or other public place within the city of Albany shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor. There are no exceptions provided for in the ordinance."

"The local option law of the state of Oregon accords the privilege of the sale of intoxicating liquor under certain conditions, such as in cases of actual sickness, upon a physician's prescription, from one registered pharmacist to another registered pharmacist and of pure alcohol for scientific purposes and of wine to church officials for sacramental purposes."

"The constitution of Oregon prescribes, after giving municipalities the right to regulate and prohibit sales of liquor, that such municipalities shall within their limits be subject to the provisions of the local option law. The ordinance does not make an exception for the transportation of liquor in the cases permitted by the local option law nor does it even provide that the carrying of the liquor must be with unlawful intent."

"The state of facts was agreed upon in this case but there was no mention of the reason for which the defendant was carrying the liquor he admits was in his possession. It was urged that the defendant could come in and show that the purpose for which he was carrying the liquor was for one of the exceptions allowed by the local option law, but this would be putting the burden of proof upon the defendant and that is not expected of a defendant in a criminal case."

In announcing the decision Judge Kelly cited the case of Ex Parte Kameta in 36 Oregon 251, and of In Re Wong Hane, 108 California, 680.

It is understood that the so-called "suitcase" ordinance, now pending before the Roseburg city council, was copied from the Albany measure.

Although Roseburg was visited by a somewhat unusual winstorm late this afternoon, the monetary damage was slight. The 100 foot flag pole in the court yard was blown down with a crash, and only missed striking a little girl by a few inches. Trees were stripped of their foliage and other minor damage resulted. The carnival decorations withstood the storm, with a few exceptions in the business district, where they were loosened from their fastenings. The wind followed a sweltering heat of two days, and was followed by a torrential rain.

L. H. Moore, the local S. P. Agent, left today for San Francisco, where he will receive treatment in the company's hospital for several weeks. His place will be filled in here by L. P. Neuner, one of the assistants. Mr. Moore has been suffering from a particular form of malady for some time which now causes him to take a rest. He will be accompanied by his wife.
