

WINE COMPANIES ARE FLEEDED BY STRANGER WHO LEAVES COUNTRY

The local officers are conducting a quiet search for a man giving his name as White, who on Monday passed worthless checks aggregating \$70 on the Sutherland Wine Company, at Sutherland, and James Crouch, of Oakland.

White arrived in Oakland several weeks ago and readily secured employment on the ranch of H. E. Kruger. He worked there until Sunday when he took leave during the temporary absence of Mr. and Mrs. Kruger. With him he took a number of blank bank checks and a rifle belonging to Mr. Kruger. Leaving the Kruger ranch, White went to Oakland, where he purchased a quantity of liquor from James Crouch. In return he gave a worthless check which was readily honored. The check had a face value of about \$25, and White received about \$20 in cash.

White then went to Sutherland, where he purchased a barrel of bottled beer, with instructions to have the same shipped to Oakland. For this purchase he gave a check in the sum of \$15, receiving something over \$10 in change.

White then departed, and has since succeeded in escaping capture. The checks were drawn on the bank of E. G. Young & Company, of Oakland, and were purported to have been signed by Mrs. Kruger. When the checks reached the depository they were declared forgeries and the officers were notified.

It is believed that White is now enroute to California, or some other southern state.

When White departed from Sutherland he left a suitcase, partially filled with old clothes, in the saloon of the Sutherland Wine Company. This suitcase was turned over to Sheriff Quinn by Mr. Pearson this morning. People who know White claim he often boasted of his fighting ability and displayed a number of bullet scars, which he said were souvenirs of early combats in the west.

CANYONVILLE DEFEATS RIDDLE BALL TEAM.

Canyonville baseball players defeated Riddle on the home grounds at baseball last Sunday afternoon, with a score of 10 to 7. Swarts, of Riddle, pitched for the victors, while Mattice, of Glendale, played third with the Canyonville team.

Cooper, of Glenbrook, was in the box for Riddle, and the loss of the game was due to the lack of support on the part of his team mates, which was only to be expected from their lack of seasoned practice. Riddle led off with three scores in the first inning, shutting out Canyonville until the third, when errors on the part of the Riddle players let two men cross the home plate. In the next inning, Canyonville by hard hitting counted four more. In the sixth Johnny Cornutt landed a Herculean drive over center field for a home run, and in the seventh Riddle scored three more, giving the home team a lead of one tally, 6 to 7. In the eighth chapter Riddle's hope of winning was blasted by a costly error which let in two more runs for Canyonville, and in the same inning two of the visitors crossed the plate, giving them a total of 10, while Riddle was unable to score again.

In the ninth inning Cornutt went in the box for Riddle, and fanned three. No man should have been on a base in this inning, but for Mellor, right fielder, dropping a little fly which Cook batted into his mitt.

While baseball is largely a matter of opinion, except for actual results of the game, there is no question in the minds of many that Elmer Cooper is some pitcher. Give him the same support that Swarts had in Sunday's game and he would have won his game. Cooper is hard on the catcher. Martin was out of practice, and Cooper did not dare to put on the speed, which he has and is to spare. Local fans are eager to see him pitch a game with a stonewall behind the bat. Elton Hollenbaugh is the backstop for Cooper, and if Riddle goes to Roseburg next Saturday with that arrangement, with Will Willis and Kimmel also from the Canyonville team, their opponents will know that they have had a game.
