CITIZENS OF RIDDLE ENJOY ENTERTAINMENT BY REBEKAH LODGE.

(Riddle Tribune). With Stuller Hall crowded to standing room, the members of Rebekah lodge presented their home talent drama last Saturday evening, and the effort is pronounced by all who attended to have been one of the most enjoyable entertainments ever presented in the town.

The piece was a three act comedy drama, entitled "Oak Farm," and so ably did each member of the cast portray their roles that there was unabating interest through the entire performance. The excellence of the production was a pleasant surprise to everyone who attended, and the public is not chary in bestowing generous praise upon all of those who took part.

Briefly the story is, Silas Weatherby, owner of Oak Farm, mortgages the farm to Jonathan Prune, the village postmaster, in order to provide funds for his son Donald to attend college. The postmaster proves to be a scoundrel, intercepting letters from the son to his father and sweetheart, in the effort to foreclose the mortgage and take the home from the family. In this he is of course thwarted, as the son becomes rich through a lucky mining strike, and returns home in the nick of time to rescue his family from their financial plight.

Benj. Huntington, Jr., school supervisor for this part of Douglas County, and Republican candidate for county clerk on the Republican ticket by virtue of an almost unanimous party vote received in last Friday's primaries, most ably played the part of the kind hearted old farmer. Many professionals would fail to have rendered the part as well. Graden C. Moore had the role of the son who attended college, while Frank Weaver, in the humorous character of the hungry school boy, a younger brother, brought down the house with his native born drollery. Tom Yokum was the postmaster, the heavy villain, and during his soliloquy his friends sent him up by Tom Howard a gorgeous basket of roses, in the basket being, and dear little live lamb, like Mary had, with a bottle of milk. The presentation was the feature of the performance, and the demonstration became so great that the curtain went down for a brief time in order that the players might get their bearings before continuing the performance.

Austin Wilson essayed the role of the village physician, who vied with L. A. Dean, the school master, in the effort to win the hand and affections of Cynthia Warner, a spinster, reputed to be wealthy, which part was taken by Miss Ethel Ball. Both were finally dissuaded from their love making, when Silas Weatherby told them that Cynthia was as poor as a church mouse, but both were disconcerted upon learning that she was really wealthy, and that she was to marry a prominent banker. Mr. Dean also doubled on the part of a traveling salesman, who could furnish anything in the line of storms from a light shower to a hurricane, tornado or earthquake.

Mrs. Weatherby, Silas' wife, was probably the most difficult of all the roles in the piece, and was charmingly rendered throughout by Miss Florence Cateforth. Miss May Yokum had the role of Helen Turnbull, niece of Silas, and was Donald's sweetheart. Her rendition of the part of a sincere and cultured young woman was ably sustained throughout several difficult scenes. Miss Alta Wilson is receiving a full mead of praise for her rendition of the part of Sally Smart, an ignorant country girl, and no one can conceive of how the part could have been done more effectively. Our readers who did not see the performance may feel that we are making an effort to throw a big bunch of bouquets to these young people who presented this performance, simply because they are home people. We wish to assure them that anything we have said above is written with all sincerity, for it is a fact that there are scores of traveling companies which fail to show the talent which these local members of the Rebekah lodge displayed in this little drama.

The proceeds amounted to over \$60, the admission price being only 25 and 15 cents. The money will be used by the lodge to purchase paraphernalia. Between acts the audience was entertained by piano duets by Mrs. Fred Ball and Miss Ethel Ball, and a vocal solo by Miss Helena Tidde.
