PAPERS ARE GRADED

More Than 100 Applicants Successful in Examinations

SIXTY-TWO PARTLY SUCCESSFUL

More Applicants Write at Recent Examinations Than Ever Before—Another Examination to Be Held in June

At the last eighth grade examination held in Douglas County on May 7 and 8, there were many more applicants than have ever written at any examination in this county before, being in all 715; 297 of whom wrote on the entire list of subjects, and of this number 193 were successful and will receive diplomas.

Sixty-two others passed in all but one or two subjects, and will by the rules governing eighth grade examinations be allowed to write on the remaining subjects at the next regular examination, which will be held on June 4 and 5, 1914.

At the June examination all who are entitled to write at this examination and all who have since completed the eighth grade work may write for diplomas.

Many Attend Ball Game. It is understood that several hundred people are in attendance at the opening ball game between the U. of O. team of Eugene and the All-Stars of this city, at the North Roseburg grounds this afternoon. At the hour of going to press the game was still in progress.

The Strawberry Exhibit. Visitors, as well as home folks, are not overlooking the strawberry exhibit during the carnival. The exhibit is being held in a tent on Jackson street, south of its intersection with Cass. In response to requests sent out by the carnival management, berries began to arrive from all sections of the county early this morning, and by noon the exhibit far exceeded in size those of former years. And that is not all—berries were still arriving late this afternoon. The berries now on display represent almost every variety produced in the Umpqua Valley, and no little work will be encountered in awarding the prizes. In all, the display far surpasses the expectations of the carnival committee.

The tented shows are well patronized, as are the local theaters, which have prepared special programs for the occasion. A number of the larger attractions are stationed on the Catholic property, at the corner of Chadwick and Washington streets.

Tonight's Program. At promptly 7 o'clock this evening there will be a free public exhibition of performing goats in front of the Grand Hotel on Cass street. This attraction will be well worth your attention. While this performance is in progress the Riddle band will enter a program near the exhibit building on Sheridan street, later giving concerts in other sections of the city.
