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HUSBAND TESTIFIES

Mme. Caillaux Was Accused of Stealing Letters

COUPLE WERE LATER DIVORCED

Threatened Baseball Strike Full Flat—Injunction Was Varied By Order of the Supreme Court

(Special to the Evening Review).
PARIS, July 21.—Joseph Caillaux, former premier, was the star witness at today's session of the trial of his wife, Mme. Caillaux, for the killing of Editor Calmette, of the Le Figaro. Next in importance to the testimony of Caillaux was the reading of a deposition from President Poincaré, dealing with incidents which led up to the shooting and ending dramatically with a description of the president's efforts to prevent the tragedy at the identical time Mme. Caillaux was entering the reception room of the Le Figaro. Caillaux told the court that he was first married in 1906 to Mme. Gueydan. He said the marriage was not happy, but he wouldn't tell why. Matters reached a crisis in 1910, he said. A package of letters had been purloined from her husband's desk. They were from Caillaux to his present wife. Caillaux offered his first wife the choice of divorce or reconciliation, but insisted on the return of the letters. His wife chose reconciliation and returned the letters, and they were married. Caillaux declared his wife swore there was no photograph or copy of the purloined letters in existence. The couple were again estranged and divorced in March, 1911. In October, when Caillaux was premier, his chief of cabinet informed him that his divorced wife had offered to a newspaper man certain letters for publication, and one of them was the "Tonjo" communication published later in the Le Figaro.

STRIKE FALLS FLAT.

NEW YORK, July 21.—The threatened strike of the American and National League players is believed to have been averted by action of a meeting of the American League managers, which authorized the release of infielder Kraft, around whom the storm centered, to the Newark International League club at a valuation placed on his services by the Nashville Southern Association club, whose claim was upheld by the National commission. It is against the National Commission's ruling sustaining Nashville's right to use Kraft that the player's fraternity rebelled. President Fultz, of the fraternity, later announced there would be no strike now, as disposition of Kraft was agreeable to the players.

BUFFALO, July 21.—Supreme Court Justice Russell today vacated the temporary injunction obtained by organized baseball officials restraining Hal Chase, the sensational first baseman, who jumped from the Chicago Americans to the Buffalo Federals, from playing with Buffalo. The decision is regarded as a most important victory secured by the Federals in their fight against the Nationals and Americans. Many similar cases depended on the outcome of the Chase injunction.

BICYCLE WAS STOLEN BY AN UNKNOWN MAN EARLY THIS MORNING

The officers are today searching for a bicycle which was stolen by some unknown person from in front of the Model bakery just before 7 o'clock this morning. Naylor, who is employed at the bakery, had stepped inside for a basket of bread which he intended to deliver and when he came out the wheel was gone. He said he did not believe he was in the bakery more than five minutes at the most.
The theft was reported to Marshal Williams and Sheriff Quine this morning, but up to 2 o'clock this afternoon no trace of the wheel had been found. Another wheel was recently stolen from the porch of O. C. Baker, in North Roseburg.
The officers are of the opinion that the Naylor bicycle was stolen by some transient and is being used as a means of getting out of the country. All officers in the county have been notified to watch for the missing wheel, and the thief will probably be apprehended.

RAILROAD MEETING

Was Held at the Commercial Club Last Evening

COMMITTEEMEN WERE PRESENT

Another Meeting Will Be Held Soon When Further Action in the Project Will Be Taken

The Roseburg railroad committee at a meeting held last night in the Commercial Club parlors, had a protracted and enthusiastic session at which time the many details of the papers about to be filed in the city council for the railroad bond issue were discussed and decisions arrived at.

It will require another meeting of the committee, which will be held in a couple of days, in order to perfect all the details, but the committee wishes to announce that one thought will be carried through all of the proceedings including the authority that will be vested in the permanent railroad commission, and that is that not one cent of the bond issue will be expended until the commission has contracted, with reliable bond securities, for the completion of the entire railroad to Coos Bay within a certain specified time, and including continuous operation for a specified period of years.

With this assurance on the part of the committee and the impossibility to legally expend any of the money except under these conditions, namely, the completion and operation of the railroad to Coos Bay in its entirety, the citizens of Roseburg are fully protected against any useless expenditures or frittering away of money, and can well afford to invest double or treble the amount contemplated in the bond issue if it guarantees a railroad through to the coast, when it is considered the factories and payrolls that will thereby be located in the city of Roseburg, with their attending prosperity, increase of population and property values.

LOCATED BY OFFICER

Stolen Automobile Found at Yoncalla This Morning

OWNED BY HORN BROOK MAN

Driver of Car Could Not Be Located By Officers Today—Left Yoncalla Last Night

Securing his information through an article published in Monday evening's issue of the Daily Review, Deputy Sheriff Daugherty, of Yoncalla, this morning located the touring car which the officers allege was recently stolen here by a man named Lynch. The machine was owned by M. E. Edwards, of Hornbrook, Cal., and was being driven from California to Eugene at the time alleged theft occurred.

When Daugherty received Monday night's Review he recalled the fact that he had noticed a stranger about Yoncalla who possessed an automobile. He visited the Yoncalla garage and after brief inquiry ascertained that the machine taken by Lynch was there pending repairs. From what he could learn, Lynch arrived there two or three days ago and intended to leave as soon as the car was repaired. Lynch also probably had seen a copy of The Review, for he was nowhere to be found this morning.

As soon as Mr. Daugherty learned that the missing car was there he communicated with Deputy Sheriff Fred Stewart, of Roseburg. Mr. Stewart, in turn, wired Mr. Edwards, at Hornbrook, Cal., that his car had been located and would be turned over to him on his arrival here.

Whether or not any effort will be made to locate Lynch had not been determined this afternoon. Mr. Edwards apparently desires his machine more than the satisfaction of sending the alleged culprit to jail for a term of years. Should Mr. Edwards want the alleged thief located, however, the officers will continue their search for him throughout the Northwest.

The car, which is of the touring type, is said to be in bad condition, and plainly evidences harsh treatment during the past few weeks. The officers believe that Lynch was trying to get away with the car but on account of a defect was compelled to delay at Yoncalla.

The machine was repaired in a local garage on July 6, and had not been heard of since until this morning, when it was located by Deputy Sheriff Daugherty.
Lynch, who is accused of stealing the automobile, was located at Yoncalla this afternoon, when he filed a suit against Mr. Edwards and attached the car in question. Lynch claims that Edwards owes him \$400 for services. Further complications in the controversy came on hour later when Sheriff George Quine received a telegram from Mr. Edwards, at Hornbrook, to arrest Lynch and hold him pending such time as he could arrive here. Edwards will probably reach here tomorrow or Thursday.

TWO PARK SITES MAY BE SUBMITTED TO VOTERS AT CITY ELECTION

In expectation that the city is seriously considering the purchase of the John Nachter property, in West Roseburg, for park purposes, at a price of \$12,500, several local people have decided to confer with J. C. Alexander in hope that he, also, will make a proposition to sell his park site to the city. The property has its advantages, and there is some difference of opinion as to which site would prove the more valuable to the city.

The council Monday night ordered the purchase of this park could also be submitted to the voters at the same election, thereby giving them a choice between the two favorite tracts.

Mr. Alexander could not be seen today, and consequently it is not known the exact price he asks for his property. In the event the two sites are submitted to a vote of the people, the one receiving the most votes will be purchased and improved.

Roseburg has long needed a park and the members of the council feel that the time has arrived when some definite action should be taken by them in the direction of acquiring suitable land. To this end they are now considering the purchase of the Nachter tract.

DEER SEASON OPENS ON AUG. 1—REMAINS OPEN UNTIL OCTOBER 31

August 1 to October 31, three long months, will be the open season for deer. With the opening day less than two weeks off, not a few sportsmen are skinning up the old weapon and are preparing to invade the stronghold of the little creatures.

That a splendid season is promised is indicated by the reports from the mountain districts of the county saying that deer were never more plentiful than now. Especially are there plenty of deer in Cow Creek, where 20 of their number were recently seen grazing on the hillside by a passing train crew.
Only three male deer are permitted to each hunter during the season. Any mutilation of the carcass so as to conceal the sex is a violation of the law. Hunters should remember that they cannot hunt and fish on the same license, but must have both hunters' and anglers' licenses if they wish to engage in both sports.

Will the season pass off quietly without the death of a single hunter? This is the question that is uppermost in the minds of many people. This would not be impossible if the sportsmen would heed the instructions printed upon the license, and wear red garments, that could be distinguished at a distance.

It would be a good thing for every hunter to carefully study the instructions printed on the backs of all licenses, whether they have previously studied them or not. To those who have studied them it would serve to refresh their memory. Some mighty good hints are given.

LARGE HOP CROP.

SALEM, Or., July 21.—It is estimated that the hop crop of Oregon this year will about equal that of last year, which was about 151,000 bales. The quality is reported very good.

"Dear Sir:—
"At a recent meeting of the board of trustees of the Roseburg Commercial Club, it was found that the membership of the club was not as numerous nor as active as it should be, and to remedy this condition, it was decided to appoint a special membership committee of 49 of the most active members of the club, who should investigate this matter and devise means of increasing the active membership by at least one hundred. There are easily twice that number of citizens who should become members of the club, and the greater part of them will do so if they are properly approached. It has been suggested that each member of the committee pledge himself to get five new members, and this should not be a hard undertaking. By compiling a list of all of those who are deemed prospective members, and allotting each member of the committee a certain number, the entire list would be covered, and the required number obtained.

HINDUS WILL FIGHT

Barricades Built By Foreigners Last Night

McDERMOTT GIVES UP SEAT

Material Concessions Said to Have Been Granted By Carranza—May Recognize Government

(Special to the Evening Review).

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 21.—The cruiser Rainbow dropped anchor at 8:30 a. m. near the Komagata Maru, the Hindu prison ship. Terrified, the Hindus rushed to the deck, expecting quick annihilation. Two 12-inch guns are now trained on the Komagata. In addition to the regular crew of the cruiser, nearly 1000 men were taken from shore to the Rainbow. The Hindus, during the night, built barricades along the ship's rail of heavy lumber. Their blacksmiths are busily engaged in fashioning weapons. They will be given the alternative of leaving peacefully. Whether they will accept remains to be seen. Ball cartridges were issued to the soldiers on the pier.

REPRESENTATIVE RESIGNS.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Representative McDermott, of Illinois, under charges of lobbying, sent a message to Governor Danne resigning his seat in Congress. In a statement from the floor of the House, McDermott denied all charge of misconduct in connection with the lobby investigation. Representative Floyd of the committee which investigated the lobby charges against McDermott, declared he was guilty of gross impropriety. McDermott also tendered his resignation to Speaker Clark. He said he would return to Chicago and seek re-election from his district in the stockyards section.

WILL RECOGNIZE GOVERNMENT.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—That General Carranza has agreed to material concessions to Acting President Carbajal, of Mexico, in which he would have the Washington administration's unqualified support, was admitted in official circles today. If Carranza and Carbajal come to terms, it is stated the United States will unquestionably recognize the new Mexico government immediately.

A PECULIAR ACCIDENT.

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TALK OF CITY PARK

Alexander Property May Also be Considered

WILL SURVEY NACHTER TRACT

Matter of Parish House Dancing Party Again Postponed—Contract Awarded For Paving on Court Street

The task having proven too much for select committees, and by a final act of the Mayor having been placed in the hands of the city council as a whole, all parties interested in the controversy between Rev. C. W. Baker and Marshal T. J. Williams, in regard to the latter's action recently in stopping an alleged private dance at the Parish house, last night expected to see a settlement or at least a report from the council, who has had charge of the matter for the past week. But disappointment was again the result and another week must elapse before it is known whether the marshal must make a public apology for his act or be declared an official who simply performed his duty.

Although a report was not made, it was the intention, so it is understood, that the council would report that the request of Rev. Baker be denied. It was not presented for the reason that Councilman Fullerton was absent, and he had asked, so Councilman Bullwinkle stated, that the matter be held up until his return. Mayor Rice had risen to tender his seat to Councilman Clark, whom he had appointed chairman of the committee of the whole, when he was interrupted by Councilman Bullwinkle's motion for delay and with its passage the report was not read. Many of the council are of the opinion that the committee of the whole should act as a jury and hear the testimony of all concerned and they believe this may be the outcome before the case is concluded.

Park Matter Discussed.

The proper procedure in acting on the proposition of John Nachter, who offers to sell the city approximately 25 acres of land above the river channel in West Roseburg, for a city park, was another question which proved puzzling to the council Monday night. It was finally ordered that the land should be surveyed by the city engineer to determine exactly the area, with which as a basis a contract might later be made. According to Mr. Nachter's figures the tract contains 25 acres, about four of which is in the dry channel of the river. Some of the councilmen believe that considerable more lies in the river.

Attorney George Neuner was present and represented Mr. Nachter, and according to a note which he read, purported to have authority from both Mr. and Mrs. Nachter to enter into any contract with the city concerning the sale of the property. Mr. Neuner then read a tentative contract, setting forth the terms by which the property would be withheld from sale until after the people had voted on the park proposition at the regular election in October. He stated that his client wished an agreement to the effect that the council would accept the plan and use reasonable dispatch to get it before the people in the event it proved to be as represented.

Having some misunderstanding previously in arranging a contract, Councilman Hamilton was adverse to entering any such agreement at present. He said the council was bound to act in accordance with the people's vote and could not refuse to act after the election. Prior to that time he said the council must act as it deemed for the best interests of the city. Mr. Neuner said that as the property was to be kept off the market for several months, Mr. Nachter was entitled to some guarantee on the part of the city. All he asked, he explained, was reasonable dispatch and assurance that the matter would be given consideration. He was willing to allow a very reasonable time for the sale of the bonds if they should be voted. Mayor Rice said he saw nothing to fear in the plan suggested by Attorney Neuner, and believed he was entitled to such consideration as he requested from the council. That the amount of land might be definitely known, which was a big obstacle to forming any agreement at present, Councilmen
