Great Battlefield Will Probably be in the Vicinity of Brussels, With French and Germans Opposing—Antwerp is Reported in State of Siege

A General Encounter Between the Germans, in Belgium, and the Allies' Main Body is Expected by the French War Office—London War Office Reported That Brussels Had Been Captured—Insurance Bill Passed

bloux, Namur and Dinant, to Neuf-chateau. Back of this line it is thought the Liege forts might still be holding out. Otherwise eastern Belgium is completely under the Kaiser's control.

General Encounter is Expected. PARIS, Aug. 21.—An encounter between the Germans in Belgium and the allies' main body is believed to be expected by the French war office. Except that the German cavalry were in possession, few details are known concerning the occupation of Brussels. There is a civil guard, and all citizens were disarmed. The German commander has promised to protect the town. It is assumed the Kaiser's infantry occupied Brussels today, leaving the cavalry free to proceed southward.

French Pushing An Advance. PARIS, Aug. 21.—The Germans in Alsace are reported in retreat on Strassburg and toward the Rhine. The French, it is said, are pushing an advance.

Capture of Brussels Confirmed. LONDON, Aug. 21.—The war office has confirmed reports that the German captured Brussels.

AUTOMOBILE LEAVES ROAD NEAR SUMMIT OF ROBERTS MOUNTAIN

While attempting to round a sharp curve near the summit of Roberts Mountain this afternoon, a Hudson automobile, occupied by F. M. York, Jones Howell and Emory Murphy, of Carlton, Yamhill County, left the road and lunged down the steep embankment for a distance of nearly 50 feet. Mr. York sustained a severe injury to the wrist and was brought here late this afternoon for medical attention. He was cared for at the offices of Drs. Seely, Sother & Stewart. Fortunately Mr. Howell and Mr. Murphy escaped with a few minor bruises about the body.

The machine, which is of the touring variety, landed at the base of a huge tree, and is badly wrecked. Had the tree not been in the path of the machine it would have doubtless continued its wild flight down the embankment for a long distance. The auto party were enroute for Klamath Falls and Crater Lake, where they intended to spend a few days with friends. According to Mr. York, who was at the wheel of the car, he was rounding the curve at moderate speed, and he is unable to determine the cause of the accident. He believes, however, that something went wrong with the steering gear or some other part of the machinery.

The car will probably be brought here tomorrow and repaired. Mr. York called his wife by telephone this afternoon and informed her of the accident. He says he will leave for his home tomorrow.

FRANK MICELLI WAS BAPTISED BY POPE PIUS; VISITED POPE RECENTLY

PORTLAND, Aug. 21.—To have been baptized by Pope Pius X and to have been a personal friend of his for many years during his rise in the Catholic Church, is an honor claimed by Frank Micelli, a Portland attorney, 517 East Forty-ninth street North.

Mr. Micelli was born at Riese, in Northern Italy, in the Pope's village, and was baptized by him in 1866. At that time Mr. Micelli's mother was a close personal friend of Pope Pius, then a priest.

"I always knew the Pope as Father Sarto or Bishop Sarto, having left that part of the world before he passed into his higher positions. When I was born in Italy, Idaho, were personal friends, and Father Sarto took a great interest in me. I was baptized by him in 1866, and for years knew him as a priest in the church to which my mother was attached. In 1887 I was confirmed by him when he was Patriarch of Venice.

"On September 6, 1912, with my wife, I went to Rome and met the Pope. We were received very cordially. He inquired about my mother as soon as I met him and seemed pleased to learn that she was well. He remembered her very well and we had quite a chat.

"When I was a boy Father Sarto, as we knew him, probably was the closest to our hearts. We all knew and loved him because of his kindly and fatherly disposition and manner. It has been a long time since these things took place, but I still can remember them well.

"It was a great shock to me to learn of his death. I have always remembered Father Sarto as a wonderful man and a man to whom we all looked as a good and practical adviser and guardian. I consider that he was one of the greatest men the Catholic Church has ever had."

RILEY COOLEY CASE

Was Investigated By Curry Co. Grand Jury Today

INDICTMENT IS IMPROBABLE

Attorney W. W. Cardwell Received a Message From Gold Beach Thursday That Detective Doyle Had Not Arrived There

That the grand jury of Curry County will probably refuse to return an indictment charging Riley Cooley, of San Francisco, with the crime of murder, was the substance of a message received by Attorney W. W. Cardwell from Gold Beach Thursday night. Mr. Cardwell had intended to leave for Curry County today, but upon receipt of the message decided to remain here pending further developments.

According to advices received from Gold Beach, neither Stephen Doyle, the Spokane detective, who was responsible for the arrest of Cooley, nor Mr. Higgins, the Spokane banker, on whom the state relied to furnish important evidence, have arrived at Gold Beach. It is the general opinion there that neither of these witnesses will make an appearance in the case, and as a result an indictment will not be returned. Cooley's arrest occurred in San Francisco about eight months ago, when Detective Doyle arrested him there and brought him to Roseburg. From here he was taken to Curry County, where he furnished bonds in the sum of \$50,000 without difficulty.

Cooley was charged by the warrant of arrest with murdering Thomas VanPelt, in the isolated Chico district of Curry County, in the year 1898. His arrest followed the posting of large rewards by the state for the apprehension and conviction of persons involved in a number of "Oregon's unsolved murder mysteries."

Attorney Cardwell stated this morning that he did not believe there was any chance of an indictment being returned against Cooley, and for that reason he would remain here pending developments. In the event Cooley should be indicted, however, Attorney Cardwell will leave for Curry County Saturday or Sunday. The grand jury convened there this morning, while the regular term of court begins next Monday.

LOCAL FORESTRY OFFICE WILL HEREAFTER CARE FOR RAILROAD LANDS

The recent act of Congress appropriating \$25,000 for the protection of the Oregon & California Railroad lands in Oregon and Washington, greatly increased the work of the local forestry force, since all the Oregon & California Railroad lands within Douglas and Coos counties have been placed under the direct jurisdiction of the Roseburg office.

Deputy Supervisor George A. Bonebrake has been appointed inspector to take full charge of the railroad lands within Douglas and Coos counties. The state supervising wardens of these counties are also co-operating with the forest service in this protective work. W. J. Lander, state supervising warden for Douglas County, will leave with Mr. Bonebrake tomorrow for points in western Douglas County, from which place Mr. Bonebrake will proceed into Coos County to complete the organization of his forces there. Up to the present time 16 additional forest guards have been placed in the field and are now engaged in patrolling these lands.

MARSHFIELD PEOPLE WERE KILLED WHEN AUTOMOBILE LEFT HIGHWAY

NORTH BEND, Or., Aug. 20.—Five persons were killed outright today when an auto driven by J. Blufford Davis went through the railing on the county bridge across Pony Point and dropped 20 feet.

One other person was slightly injured and one escaped unscathed. The dead are: J. Blufford Davis, wealthy rancher of North Coos River; Chris Peterson, Marshfield, saloonkeeper; James Wasson, fisherman, of Marshfield; John Negron, a Williamamuch inlet rancher, and William Worth, also a rancher of the same place.

The party had started for South inlet on a pleasure trip. Mr. Davis was driving. When approaching the bridge, where there is a sharp turn, Davis lost control of the steering gear and the car plunged through the railing, throwing its seven passengers, only two of whom lived.

George Wasson and Jack King, the five who were killed were pinned under the car and either killed outright or drowned. George Wasson, the only one unhurt, held Jack King's head above water until help arrived, and King was saved with only a few bruises. George Wasson could not explain how he escaped and only knew he was thrown from the car as it turned over.

The accident happened at the bridge where Pony inlet narrows and the tide was in at the time, about two feet of water being in the stream. The sharp turn was responsible for an accident two years ago, but it happened at the approach. Although the car turned turtle, none of the four occupants were hurt at that time.

Stewart Leggat and Miss Alberta Squires were married by Rev. C. A. Rexroad at 10 o'clock last night in the highway near Woodville under most romantic circumstances, says the Butte, Montana, Miner. The marriage was performed by the light of the moon and two brightly shining automobile lamps, while the bride and groom and pastor stood on a lap robe and the witnesses formed a circle surrounding them.

Mr. Leggat and his bride yesterday went to Boulder intending to be married, but after procuring the license could find no minister. They searched high and low, but unavailingly. Just before the train left for Butte they gave up their search and climbed aboard the train for this city. Arriving here they went to Rev. Mr. Rexroad's home, presented their license, but were again disappointed when the pastor told them that it was of no value in Silver Bow County.

A hunt was then started for a deputy clerk, who, when found, agreed to issue them a license, but by this time the principals decided that they would make use of their original permit, and so decided to charter an automobile and have the ceremony performed in Jefferson County. Rev. Mr. Rexroad agreed to accompany them. Mar-Lane B. Coase, an intimate friend of the young couple, offered his services as chauffeur, and Miss Beatrice Squires, sister of the bride, went along as bridesmaid. In order to make sure that all of the legal requirements would be met, the automobile drove for about three miles after the county border had been passed. They then stopped and the lap robe was spread on the ground in front of the automobile, and on this the ceremony was performed. The papers were signed and all then came back to Butte.

SUCCESSOR TO THE LATE POPE WILL BE NAMED BY THE COLLEGE OF CARDINALS

Cardinal Della Volpe is at Present at the Head of the Roman Catholic Church—Will Retain Official Insignia Until a New Pope Can Be Elected

THE POPE'S BODY WILL BE VIEWED BY POOR AND RICH Alike

Reports Published in Morning Papers to the Effect That Anna Sarto, Sister of Pope Pius, Was Dead, Were Without Foundation, According to Late Telegraphic Reports—Pope's Body Will Be Embalmed

POPE'S SISTER IS NOT DEAD.

New York, Aug. 21.—Reports published in morning newspapers to the effect that Anna Sarto, sister of Pope Pius, had died yesterday from grief, are unfounded, according to telegraphic advices received from the Vatican today. Although grieved over the loss of her brother, Anna Sarto is in no serious danger at the present time.

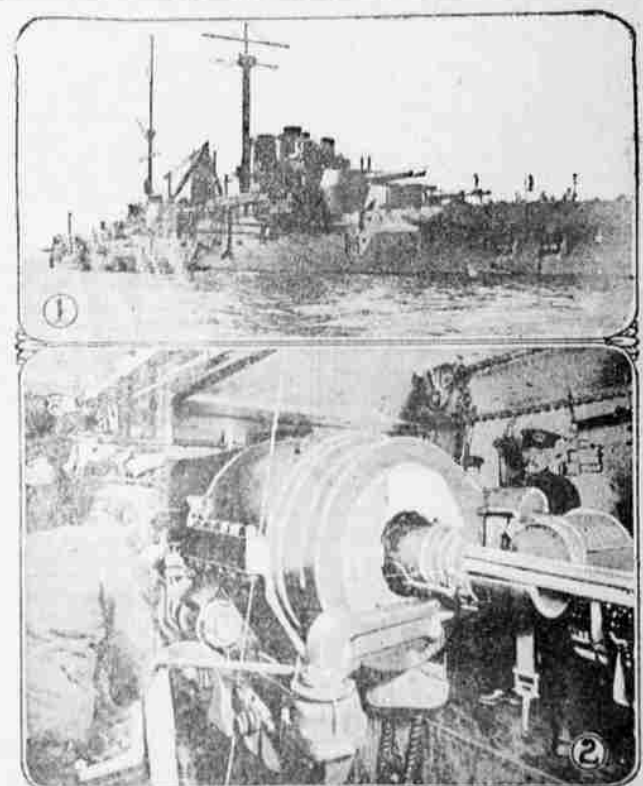
Rome, Aug. 21.—Cardinal Della Volpe is at the head of the Roman Catholic Church. As Cardinal Camerlengo, the papal authority passed automatically into his hands following Pius' death. He took formal possession of the fisherman's ring, the insignia of office, on Thursday. He will retain the position until a new Pope has been elected by the college of cardinals. At 9 o'clock the Pope's body was removed from the Vatican throne room to the chapel of sacrament at St. Peter's. This violated a tradition and a precedent, but the Pope said he did not wish his corpse to remain the customary three days in the throne room for exclusive visits by the cardinals, nobility, diplomats and other privileged classes, but desired it exposed immediately for the rich and the poor to see.

POPE'S BODY IS EXPOSED.

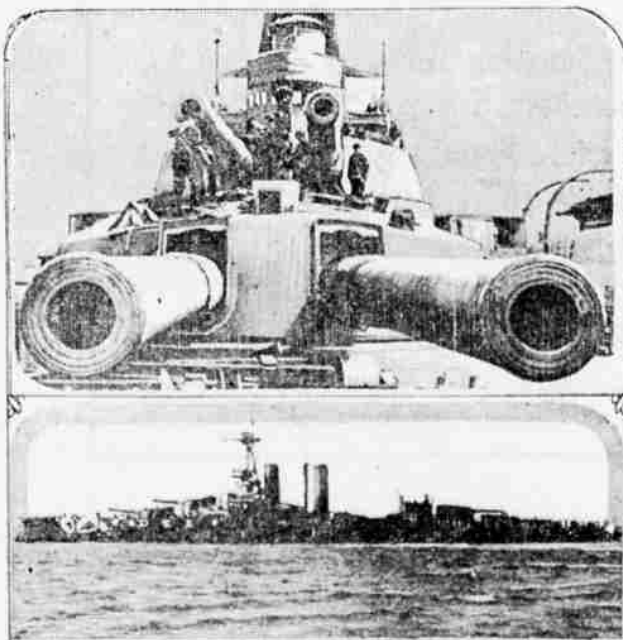
Rome, Aug. 21.—The Pope's body was exposed to public view in the chapel of sacrament only six hours, as it is not yet embalmed, and was then placed in a temporary tomb at St. Peter's to await further ceremonial.

CARRANZA IN MEXICO.

Mexico City, Aug. 21.—Occupation of Mexico City by Carranza is complete. He entered the capital at noon Thursday and was proclaimed provisional president. He was given an enthusiastic reception by crowds on the streets.
